3 (a) PROHIBITING ADJOURNMENT.—The House of 4 Representatives or Senate may not adjourn for a period 5 of more than 3 days during a fiscal year unless, at the 6 time the period of adjournment begins, the House or Sen-7 ate (as the case may be)—

8 (1) has adopted a concurrent resolution on the9 budget for such fiscal year; and

10 (2) has approved each regular appropriation bill 11 for such fiscal year or, to the extent that it has not 12 approved such a bill, has approved a continuing res-13 olution to provide funding for the entire fiscal year 14 for the projects and activities covered by such bill. 15 (b) REGULAR APPROPRIATION BILL DEFINED.—In this section, the term "regular appropriation bill" means 16 17 any annual appropriation bill making appropriations, otherwise making funds available, or granting authority, for 18 19 any of the following categories of projects and activities: 20(1) Agriculture, rural development, Food and 21 Drug Administration, and related agencies pro-22 grams.
