A BILL

To establish a commission to commemorate the sesquicentennial of the American Civil War.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Civil War Sesqui-
- 5 centennial Commission Act".
- 6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS AND PURPOSE.
- 7 (a) FINDINGS.—Congress makes the following find-
- 8 ings:
- 9 (1) The American Civil War was a defining ex-
- perience in the development of the United States.

- (2) The people of the United States continue to struggle with issues of race, civil rights, heritage, and the politics of federalism, which are legacies of the Civil War and Reconstruction.
 - (3) There is a resurgence of interest in the Civil War that is evidenced by the multitude of publications, exhibits, reenactments, research organizations, Internet and multimedia resources, historic parks, and preservation associations focused on the Civil War.
 - (4) The years 2010 through 2015 mark the sesquicentennial of the period beginning with the election of Abraham Lincoln and concluding with the end of the Civil War. Notable milestones during this period include the following:
 - (A) On November 6, 1860, Abraham Lincoln was elected President of the United States.
 - (B) On December 20, 1860, in a special convention, the South Carolina Legislature voted to secede from the Union following the election of Lincoln. In the early months of the following year, Mississippi, Florida, Alabama, Georgia, Louisiana, and Texas seceded and formed the Confederate States of America.

- (C) In April 1861, Confederate forces fired on Fort Sumter, the first shots fired in the Civil War. In response, President Lincoln or-dered the blockade of all Confederate ports and called for 75,000 volunteers to enlist in the Union Army. Four more Southern States—Vir-ginia, Arkansas, Tennessee and North Caro-lina—seceded in the months following the at-tack on Fort Sumter.
 - (D) The Civil War spawned numerous campaigns, battles, and engagements, including Bull Run, the Monitor versus the Merrimac, the Peninsula Campaign, Shiloh, the Capture of New Orleans, the Shenandoah Valley Campaign, Seven Pines, Seven Days, Antietam, Fredericksburg, Chancellorsville, Gettysburg, the Siege of Vicksburg, Chickamauga, Chattanooga, Wilderness, the Siege at Petersburg, the Capture of Atlanta, the March to the Sea, Nashville, and Appomattox.
 - (E) In January 1863, President Lincoln issued the Emancipation Proclamation, freeing all slaves in States considered to be in rebellion against the Federal Government.

1	(F) On June 28, 1864, President Lincoln
2	repealed all fugitive slave laws.
3	(G) On January 31, 1865, the United
4	States Congress passed the 13th Amendment to
5	the Constitution, abolishing slavery and invol-
6	untary servitude.
7	(H) On April 9, 1865, Confederate General
8	Robert E. Lee surrendered at Appomattox
9	Courthouse.
10	(I) On April 14, 1865, President Lincoln
11	was shot by Confederate sympathizer John
12	Wilkes Booth while attending a play at Ford's
13	Theater, and died the next day.
14	(J) In April and May 1865, Confederate
15	Generals Joseph Johnson and E. Kirby Smith
16	leaders of the remaining organized Confederate
17	Forces, surrendered, formally ending the South-
18	ern Resistance.
19	(K) By the end of the Civil War, an esti-
20	mated 600,000 Union and Confederate soldiers
21	had been killed and over 471,000 wounded
22	making the Civil War the bloodiest war in the
23	history of our Nation.
24	(5) The sesquicentennial of the Civil War pre-
25	sents a significant opportunity for Americans to re-

- call and reflect upon all aspects of that conflict and its legacy in a spirit of reconciliation and honest reflection, through exploration, interpretation, and discussion.
- 5 (6) The sesquicentennial of the Civil War pre-6 sents a significant opportunity to preserve and pro-7 mote the remaining battlefields and historic sites re-8 lating to the Civil War before the battlefields and 9 sites are lost to future generations.
- 10 (b) Purpose.—The purpose of this Act is to estab-11 lish a Civil War Sesquicentennial Commemoration Com-12 mission to—
 - (1) ensure a suitable national observance of the sesquicentennial of the Civil War that includes recognition of the historic, social, legal, cultural, and political forces that caused the American Civil War and influenced its course and outcomes;
 - (2) explore the causes of the Civil War to gain a better understanding of the reasons that the democratic framework of the United States failed to resolve the sectional issues without resorting to war;
 - (3) fully examine and reflect upon the consequences of the Civil War, subjects which Congress directed the National Park Service to address in National Park Service programs and materials begin-

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- 1 ning in 1999, including the Reconstruction era and
- 2 the aftermath, the subsequent constriction of equal
- 3 rights for African-American citizens, and the ulti-
- 4 mate achievement of civil rights for the descendants
- of enslaved peoples almost a century later;
- 6 (4) collaborate with and assist States and na-
- 7 tional organizations with programs and activities for
- 8 the observance of the sesquicentennial of the Civil
- 9 War;
- 10 (5) assist in ensuring that any observance of
- the sesquicentennial of the Civil War is inclusive and
- appropriately recognizes the experiences and points
- of view of all people affected by the Civil War; and
- 14 (6) provide assistance for the development of
- programs, projects, and activities on the Civil War
- that have lasting educational value.
- 17 SEC. 3. CIVIL WAR SESQUICENTENNIAL COMMEMORATION
- 18 **COMMISSION.**
- 19 The Secretary of the Interior shall establish a com-
- 20 mission to be known as the Civil War Sesquicentennial
- 21 Commemoration Commission (hereafter in this Act re-
- 22 ferred to as the "Commission").
- 23 SEC. 4. COMPOSITION OF THE COMMISSION.
- 24 (a) In General.—The Commission shall be com-
- 25 posed of 25 members as follows:

1	(1) Government members.—The Commission
2	shall include—
3	(A) 2 Members of the Senate appointed by
4	the President pro tempore of the Senate, in
5	consultation with the majority leader and the
6	minority leader of the Senate;
7	(B) 2 Members of the House of Represent-
8	atives appointed by the Speaker of the House of
9	Representatives, in consultation with the minor-
10	ity leader of the House;
11	(C) the Secretary of the Interior or the
12	designee of the Secretary;
13	(D) the Secretary of the Smithsonian In-
14	stitution, or the designee of the Secretary;
15	(E) the Secretary of Education, or the des-
16	ignee of the Secretary;
17	(F) the Secretary of Defense, or the des-
18	ignee of the Secretary;
19	(G) the Chairman of the National Endow-
20	ment for the Humanities, or the designee of the
21	Chairman;
22	(H) the Chairman of the National Endow-
23	ment of the Arts, or the designee of the Chair-
24	man;

1	(I) the Archivist of the United States, or
2	the designee of the Archivist;
3	(J) the Librarian of Congress, or the des-
4	ignee of the Librarian; and
5	(K) the Director of the National Park
6	Service, or the designee of the Director.
7	(2) Private members.—The Commission shall
8	include—
9	(A) 5 members appointed by the President
10	from among individuals who are representative
11	of the corporate and nonprofit communities;
12	and
13	(B) 7 individuals appointed by the Presi-
14	dent from among persons who by reason of edu-
15	cation, training, and experience, are experts on
16	the Antebellum, Civil War, and Reconstruction
17	eras and the preservation, interpretation, and
18	presentation of those eras to the public, includ-
19	ing—
20	(i) 5 individuals with expertise in his-
21	tory or related academic disciplines ger-
22	mane to the Civil War, including—
23	(I) individuals representing the
24	museum community, in particular his-
25	tory museums and historical societies.

1	such as the National Civil War Mu-
2	seum;
3	(II) individuals with expertise in
4	art history, historic preservation, or a
5	related field;
6	(III) individuals with expertise in
7	anthropology, cultural geography, so-
8	ciology, or a related field; and
9	(IV) individuals with expertise in
10	political science, law, economics, or a
11	related field;
12	(ii) 1 individual with expertise in the
13	preservation of Civil War historic sites and
14	battlefields; and
15	(iii) 1 individual representing State
16	Civil War sesquicentennial efforts.
17	(b) Terms.—
18	(1) GOVERNMENT MEMBERS.—If any member
19	of the Commission who was appointed as an officer
20	designated under subsection (a)(1) leaves such of-
21	fice, the member may continue as a member of the
22	Commission for not longer than the 30-day period
23	beginning on the date the member leaves such office

1 (2)MEMBERS.—Private Private members 2 under subsection (a)(2) shall be appointed for the 3 life of the Commission. 4 (c) Vacancies.—Any vacancy in the Commission 5 shall not affect its powers, and shall be filled in the same manner as the original appointment. 6 7 (d) Initial Appointments.—The appointment of 8 the members of the Commission shall be made not later than 90 days after the date of the enactment of this Act. 10 SEC. 5. GENERAL PROVISIONS. 11 (a) Meetings.— 12 (1) Initial meeting.—Not later than 60 days 13 after the date on which all members of the Commis-14 sion have been appointed, the members appointed 15 under subparagraphs (A) and (B) of section 4(a)(2)16 shall call the first meeting of the Commission. 17 (2) Subsequent meetings.—The Commission 18 shall hold subsequent meetings at the call of the 19 Chairperson. 20 (b) CHAIRPERSON AND VICE CHAIRPERSON.—At the 21 initial meeting, the Commission shall elect a Chairperson 22 and a Vice Chairperson from among its voting members. 23 (c) QUORUM.—A majority of voting members shall constitute a quorum, but a lesser number may hold meet-

1	(d) Voting.—
2	(1) In general.—The Commission shall act
3	only on an affirmative vote of a majority of the vot-
4	ing members of the Commission.
5	(2) Nonvoting members.—The individuals
6	appointed under subparagraphs (A) and (B) of sec-
7	tion 4(a)(1) shall be nonvoting members, and shall
8	serve only in an advisory capacity.
9	SEC. 6. DUTIES OF THE COMMISSION.
10	(a) Activities Related to the Sesquicenten-
11	NIAL.—The Commission shall—
12	(1) plan, develop, and carry out programs and
13	activities appropriate to commemorate the sesqui-
14	centennial of the Civil War, including activities in
15	recognition of the historic, social, legal, cultural, and
16	political forces that—
17	(A) caused the Civil War; and
18	(B) influenced the course and outcomes of
19	the Civil War;
20	(2) encourage interdisciplinary examination of
21	the Civil War;
22	(3) facilitate Civil War-related activities
23	throughout the United States;
24	(4) encourage civic, historical, educational, eco-
25	nomic, preservation, and other organizations

- throughout the United States to organize and participate in activities to expand the understanding and appreciation of the significance of the Civil War;
 - (5) coordinate and facilitate the public distribution of scholarly research, publications, and interpretations of the Civil War;
 - (6) coordinate with and provide technical assistance to States, units of local government, and non-profit organizations (including State and local sesquicentennial commemoration entities) to further the commemoration of the sesquicentennial of the Civil War;
 - (7) coordinate and facilitate commemoration activities of Federal agencies relating to the sesquicentennial of the Civil War;
 - (8) develop programs and facilities to ensure that the sesquicentennial commemoration of the Civil War results in a positive legacy and long-term public benefit;
 - (9) encourage and facilitate the preservation of Civil War historic sites and battlefields as a lasting legacy of the sesquicentennial commemoration;
 - (10) plan, develop, and carry out programs and activities to use funds raised from individuals, foun-

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- dations, and corporations for sesquicentennial activities at the national level;
 - (11) at its discretion, provide funds to State and local programs to carry out activities that advance the goals of the Commission; and
 - (12) encourage the development and conduct of programs designed to involve the international community in activities that commemorate the Civil War.

(b) Plans and Report.—

(1) STRATEGIC PLAN AND ANNUAL PERFORM-ANCE PLANS.—The Commission shall prepare a strategic plan in accordance with section 306 of title 5, United States Code, and annual performance plans in accordance with section 1115 of title 31, United States Code, for the activities of the Commission carried out under this Act.

(2) Reports.—

(A) Annual Report.—The Commission shall submit to Congress an annual report that contains a list of each gift, bequest, or devise with a value of more than \$250, together with the identity of the donor of each such gift, bequest, or devise.

1	(B) Final Report.—Not later than Sep-
2	tember 30, 2016, the Commission shall submit
3	to Congress a final report that contains—
4	(i) a summary of activities of the
5	Commission;
6	(ii) a final accounting of funds re-
7	ceived and expended by the Commission;
8	and
9	(iii) the findings and recommenda-
10	tions of the Commission.
11	SEC. 7. GRANT PROGRAM.
12	(a) Grants Authorized.—The Chairman of the
13	National Endowment for the Humanities shall award
14	grants under this section for the uses described in sub-
15	section (b).
16	(b) Use of Grants.—Grants awarded under this
17	section shall be used for appropriate activities relating to
18	the sesquicentennial of the Civil War.
19	(c) Consideration.—In awarding grants under this
20	section, the Chairman of the National Endowment of the
21	Humanities shall consider and give priority to programs
22	carried out by institutions of higher education, museums,
23	nonprofit organizations, professional associations, and
24	State sesquicentennial commissions with a national scope,
25	that support the duties of the Commission described in

- 1 section 6, including programs that concentrate on the role
- 2 of African-Americans in the Civil War.
- 3 SEC. 8. POWERS OF THE COMMISSION.
- 4 The Commission may, for the purpose of carrying out
- 5 this Act—
- 6 (1) solicit, accept, use and dispose of gifts, be-
- quests, or devises of money or property, both real
- 8 and personal, for the purpose of aiding or facili-
- 9 tating the work of the Commission;
- 10 (2) authorize any voting member or employee of
- the Commission to take any action that the Commis-
- sion is authorized to take under this Act;
- 13 (3) procure supplies, services, and property, and
- make or enter into contracts, leases, or other legal
- agreements to carry out this Act (except that any
- 16 contracts, leases, or other legal agreements entered
- into by the Commission shall not extend beyond the
- date of the termination of the Commission); and
- 19 (4) use the United States mails in the same
- 20 manner and under the same conditions as other
- 21 Federal agencies.
- 22 SEC. 9. PERSONNEL MATTERS.
- (a) Compensation of Members.—Members of the
- 24 Commission shall serve without compensation.

1 (b) Travel Expenses.—Members of the Commis-2 sion shall be allowed, as the Secretary of the Interior de-3 termines appropriate to carry out this Act, travel ex-4 penses, including per diem in lieu of subsistence, at rates 5 authorized for an employee of an agency under subchapter I of chapter 57 of title 5, United States Code, while away from the home or regular place of business of the member 8 in the performance of the duties of the Commission. 9 (c) Staff.— 10 (1) In General.—The Chairperson may ap-11 point a Director and such additional staff as are 12 necessary to enable the Commission to perform its 13 duties. 14 (2) Confirmation of director.—The ap-15 pointment of the Director shall be subject to the ap-16 proval of the Commission. 17 (3) Compensation.— 18 (A) Nonapplicability of civil service 19 LAWS.—Except as provided in subparagraph 20 (B), the Director and staff may be appointed 21 without regard to the provisions of title 5, 22 United States Code, governing appointments in 23 the competitive service, and may be paid with-24 out regard to the provisions of chapter 51 and

subchapter III of chapter 53 of that title relat-

- ing to classification and General Schedule pay
 rates.
- 3 (B) MAXIMUM RATE OF PAY.—The rate of
 4 pay for the Director and other staff shall not
 5 exceed the rate payable for level V of the Exec6 utive Schedule under section 5316 of title 5,
 7 United States Code.
- 8 (d) Detail of Government Employees.—At the 9 request of the Commission, the head of any Federal agen10 cy may detail, on a reimbursable or nonreimbursable basis,
 11 any of the personnel of the agency to the Commission to
 12 assist the Commission in carrying out the duties of the
 13 Commission under this Act.
- (e) SUPPORT SERVICES.—Upon the request of the Commission, the Secretary of the Interior, acting through the Director of the National Park Service, shall provide to the Commission, on a reimbursable basis, the administrative support services necessary for the Commission to carry out its responsibilities under this Act.
- 20 (f) Volunteer and Uncompensated Services.—
 21 Notwithstanding section 1342 of title 31, United States
 22 Code, the Commission may accept and use voluntary and
 23 uncompensated services as the Commission determines
 24 necessary.

- 1 (g) Procurement of Temporary and Intermit-
- 2 TENT SERVICES.—The Chairperson of the Commission
- 3 may procure temporary and intermittent services under
- 4 section 3109(b) of title 5, United States Code, at daily
- 5 rates for individuals which do not exceed the daily equiva-
- 6 lent of the annual rate of basic pay prescribed for level
- 7 V of the Executive Schedule under section 5316 of such
- 8 title.
- 9 (h) Nonapplicability of Charter Require-
- 10 MENT.—Section 14(b) of the Federal Advisory Committee
- 11 Act (5 U.S.C. App.) shall not apply to the Commission.
- 12 (i) TERMINATION.—The Commission shall terminate
- 13 on the date that is 90 days after the date on which the
- 14 Commission submits its final report under section 6(b)(2).
- 15 SEC. 10. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.
- 16 (a) In General.—There is authorized to be appro-
- 17 priated to carry out this Act (other than section 7)
- 18 \$500,000 for each of fiscal years 2012 through 2016.
- 19 (b) Grants.—There is authorized to be appropriated
- 20 \$3,500,000 to the National Endowment for the Human-
- 21 ities to provide grants under section 7, to remain available
- 22 until expended.
