A BILL

- To require the President to transmit to Congress a plan with timeframe and completion date and reports with status updates on the transition of United States military and security operations in Afghanistan to the Government of Afghanistan.
 - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
 - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

1 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

2 This Act may be cited as the "Afghanistan Exit and3 Accountability Act".

4 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.

5 Congress finds the following:

6 (1) On November 29, 2009, in the Final Orders 7 for Afghanistan/Pakistan Strategy, President 8 Barack Obama wrote that sending significant addi-9 tional United States troops in early 2010 would set 10 the conditions for an "accelerated transition to Af-11 ghan authorities beginning in July 2011".

(2) Operation Enduring Freedom in Afghanistan is America's longest conflict, with October 7,
2011, marking the 10-year anniversary of the start
of United States military operations in Afghanistan.

16 (3) Military operations in Afghanistan have cost
17 United States taxpayers \$336,000,000,000 in deficit
18 spending from October 2001 through fiscal year
19 2010, with an additional \$100,000,000,000 appro20 priated in deficit spending for fiscal year 2011.

(4) As of March 15, 2011, over 1,500 members
of the United States Armed Forces have lost their
lives in support of Operation Enduring Freedom in
Afghanistan and over 10,000 have been wounded.

25 (5) In November 2010, the Department of De26 fense reported that suicide rates are soaring among
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veterans, and the backlog at the Department of Vet erans Affairs had reached more than 700,000 dis ability cases, including cases involving post trau matic stress disorder.

5 (6) The combined costs of the wars in Iraq and
6 Afghanistan are currently estimated to account for
7 23 percent of the United States deficit for the period
8 2003 to 2010.

9 (7) Nobel Prize-winning economist and Colum-10 bia University Professor Joseph Stiglitz estimates 11 that the costs of the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan, 12 including interest payments on the money borrowed 13 for these wars and care for wounded soldiers and 14 veterans, are likely to total \$4,000,000,000,000 to 15 \$6,000,000,000.

16 (8) On December 1, 2009, at a speech at the
17 United States Military Academy at West Point,
18 President Barack Obama stated that the United
19 States would begin withdrawing United States
20 Armed Forces from Afghanistan in July 2011.

1SEC. 3. PLAN WITH TIMEFRAME AND COMPLETION DATE2AND REPORTS WITH STATUS UPDATES ON3TRANSITION OF UNITED STATES MILITARY4AND SECURITY OPERATIONS IN AFGHANI-5STAN TO THE GOVERNMENT OF AFGHANI-6STAN.

7 (a) PLAN WITH TIMEFRAME AND COMPLETION 8 DATE REQUIRED.—Not later than 60 days after the date 9 of the enactment of this Act, the President shall transmit 10 to Congress a plan with a timeframe and completion date 11 for the accelerated transition of United States military and security operations (including operations involving 12 13 military and security-related contractors) in Afghanistan to the Government of Afghanistan. 14

(b) REPORT WITH STATUS UPDATES REQUIRED.—
16 Not later than 90 days after the date of transmission of
17 the plan required by subsection (a), and every 90 days
18 thereafter, the President shall transmit to Congress a re19 port setting forth the current status of such plan, includ20 ing the following information:

(1) Progress on completing the redeployment of
United States Armed Forces from Afghanistan and
the accelerated transition of military and security
operations to the Government of Afghanistan.

25 (2) The total number of United States Armed
26 Forces deployed in Afghanistan over the reporting
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(8) The estimated amount of increased deficit
 and increased public debt attributed to continuing
 military operations in Afghanistan accrued during
 the reporting period and projected through 2020, in cluding interest payments on money borrowed for
 OEF and the care and benefits for wounded soldiers
 and veterans.

8 (9) Information on variables that could advance
9 the timetable and increase the rate of redeployment
10 of United States Armed Forces from Afghanistan.

11 SAVINGS FROM ACCELERATED REDEPLOY-(c)12 MENT.—Each report required under subsection (b) shall 13 include the estimated savings, immediate and over 5-year, 14 10-year, and 20-year time periods, were United States 15 military and security operations to be concluded and 16 United States Armed Forces redeployed from Afghanistan 17 within 180 days of the date of each report.

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
