A BILL

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To require the Office of Management and Budget to prepare a crosscut budget for restoration activities in the Chesapeake Bay watershed, to require the Environmental Protection Agency to develop and implement an adaptive management plan, and for other purposes. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

4 This Act may be cited as the "Chesapeake Bay Ac5 countability and Recovery Act of 2011".

6 SEC. 2. CHESAPEAKE BAY CROSSCUT BUDGET.

7 (a) CROSSCUT BUDGET.—The Director, in consulta8 tion with the Chesapeake Executive Council, the chief execu9 tive of each Chesapeake Bay State, and the Chesapeake Bay
10 Commission, shall submit to Congress a financial report
11 containing—

12 (1) an interagency crosscut budget that dis13 plays—

14(A) the proposed funding for any Federal15restoration activity to be carried out in the suc-16ceeding fiscal year, including any planned inter-17agency or intra-agency transfer, for each of the18Federal agencies that carry out restoration ac-19tivities;

20 (B) to the extent that information is avail21 able, the estimated funding for any State res22 toration activity to be carried out in the suc23 ceeding fiscal year;

24 (C) all expenditures for Federal restoration
25 activities from the preceding 2 fiscal years, the

1	current fiscal year, and the succeeding fiscal
2	year; and
3	(D) all expenditures, to the extent that in-
4	formation is available, for State restoration ac-
5	tivities during the equivalent time period de-
6	scribed in subparagraph (C);
7	(2) a detailed accounting of all funds received
8	and obligated by all Federal agencies for restoration
9	activities during the current and preceding fiscal
10	years, including the identification of funds which
11	were transferred to a Chesapeake Bay State for res-
12	toration activities;
13	(3) to the extent that information is available, a
14	detailed accounting from each State of all funds re-
15	ceived and obligated from a Federal agency for res-
16	toration activities during the current and preceding
17	fiscal years; and
18	(4) a description of each of the proposed Federal
19	and State restoration activities to be carried out in
20	the succeeding fiscal year (corresponding to those ac-
21	tivities listed in subparagraphs (A) and (B) of para-
22	graph (1)), including the—
23	(A) project description;
24	(B) current status of the project;

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(C) Federal or State statutory or regulatory
authority, programs, or responsible agencies;
(D) authorization level for appropriations;
(E) project timeline, including benchmarks;
(F) references to project documents;
(G) descriptions of risks and uncertainties
of project implementation;
(H) adaptive management actions or frame-
work;
(I) coordinating entities;
(J) funding history;
(K) cost-sharing; and
(L) alignment with existing Chesapeake
Bay Agreement and Chesapeake Executive Coun-
cil goals and priorities.
(b) Minimum Funding Levels.—The Director shall
only describe restoration activities in the report required
under subsection (a) that—
(1) for Federal restoration activities, have fund-
ing amounts greater than or equal to \$100,000; and
(2) for State restoration activities, have funding
amounts greater than or equal to \$50,000.
(c) Deadline.—The Director shall submit to Congress
the report required by subsection (a) not later than 30 days

after the submission by the President of the President's an nual budget to Congress.

3 (d) REPORT.—Copies of the financial report required
4 by subsection (a) shall be submitted to the Committees on
5 Appropriations, Natural Resources, Energy and Commerce,
6 and Transportation and Infrastructure of the House of Rep7 resentatives and the Committees on Appropriations, Envi8 ronment and Public Works, and Commerce, Science, and
9 Transportation of the Senate.

(e) EFFECTIVE DATE.—This section shall apply beginning with the first fiscal year after the date of enactment
of this Act for which the President submits a budget to Congress.

14 SEC. 3. ADAPTIVE MANAGEMENT PLAN.

(a) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 1 year after the date
of enactment of this Act, the Administrator, in consultation
with other Federal and State agencies, shall develop an
adaptive management plan for restoration activities in the
Chesapeake Bay watershed that includes—

20 (1) definition of specific and measurable objec21 tives to improve water quality, habitat, and fisheries;

- 22 (2) a process for stakeholder participation;
- 23 (3) monitoring, modeling, experimentation, and
 24 other research and evaluation practices:

(4) a process for modification of restoration ac-1 2 tivities that have not attained or will not attain the specific and measurable objectives set forth under 3 4 paragraph (1); and (5) a process for prioritizing restoration activi-5 6 ties and programs to which adaptive management 7 shall be applied. 8 (b) IMPLEMENTATION.—The Administrator shall im-9 plement the adaptive management plan developed under 10 subsection (a). 11 (c) UPDATES.—The Administrator shall update the 12 adaptive management plan developed under subsection (a) 13 every 2 years. 14 (d) Report to Congress.— 15 (1) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 60 days after 16 the end of a fiscal year, the Administrator shall 17 transmit to Congress an annual report on the imple-18 mentation of the adaptive management plan required 19 under this section for such fiscal year. 20 CONTENTS.—The report required under (2)21 paragraph (1) shall contain information about the 22 application of adaptive management to restoration 23 activities and programs, including programmatic and 24 project level changes implemented through the process 25 of adaptive management.

(3) EFFECTIVE DATE.—Paragraph (1) shall
 apply to the first fiscal year that begins after the date
 of enactment of this Act.

4 (e) INCLUSION OF PLAN IN ANNUAL ACTION PLAN AND
5 ANNUAL PROGRESS REPORT.—The Administrator shall en6 sure that the Annual Action Plan and Annual Progress Re7 port required by section 205 of Executive Order 13508 in8 cludes the adaptive management plan outlined in sub9 section (a).

10sec. 4. INDEPENDENT EVALUATOR FOR THE CHESAPEAKE11BAY PROGRAM.

(a) IN GENERAL.—There shall be an Independent
Evaluator for restoration activities in the Chesapeake Bay
watershed, who shall review and report on restoration activities and the use of adaptive management in restoration
activities, including on such related topics as are suggested
by the Chesapeake Executive Council.

18 (b) APPOINTMENT.—

19 (1) IN GENERAL.—The Independent Evaluator
20 shall be appointed by the Administrator from among
21 nominees submitted by the Chesapeake Executive
22 Council.

23 (2) NOMINATIONS.—The Chesapeake Executive
24 Council may submit to the Administrator 4 nominees

for appointment to any vacancy in the office of the
 Independent Evaluator.

3 (c) REPORTS.—The Independent Evaluator shall sub4 mit a report to the Congress every 2 years in the findings
5 and recommendations of reviews under this section.

6 (d) CHESAPEAKE EXECUTIVE COUNCIL.—In this sec7 tion, the term "Chesapeake Executive Council" has the
8 meaning given that term by section 307 of the National
9 Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration Authorization
10 Act of 1992 (Public Law 102–567; 15 U.S.C. 1511d).

11 SEC. 5. DEFINITIONS.

12 In this Act, the following definitions apply:

13 (1) ADAPTIVE MANAGEMENT.—The term "adapt-14 ive management" means a type of natural resource 15 management in which project and program decisions 16 are made as part of an ongoing science-based process. 17 Adaptive management involves testing, monitoring, 18 and evaluating applied strategies and incorporating 19 new knowledge into programs and restoration activi-20 ties that are based on scientific findings and the needs 21 of society. Results are used to modify management 22 policy, strategies, practices, programs, and restoration 23 activities.
