A BILL

To require the Secretary of the Interior to conduct certain offshore oil and gas lease sales, to provide fair and equitable revenue sharing for all coastal States, to formulate future offshore energy development plans in areas with the most potential, to generate revenue for American infrastructure, and for other purposes.

3	SEC. 101. OUTER CONTINENTAL SHELF LEASING PROGRAM.
4	Section 18(a) of the Outer Continental Shelf Lands Act
5	(43 U.S.C. 1344(a)) is amended by adding at the end the
6	following:
7	"(5)(A) In each oil and gas leasing program
8	under this section, the Secretary shall make available
9	for leasing and conduct lease sales including—
10	"(i) at least 50 percent of the available un-
11	leased acreage within each outer Continental
12	Shelf planning area considered to have the larg-
13	est undiscovered, technically recoverable oil and
14	gas resources (on a total btu basis) based upon
15	the most recent national geologic assessment of
16	the outer Continental Shelf, with an emphasis on
17	offering the most geologically prospective parts of
18	the planning area; and
19	"(ii) any State subdivision of an outer Con-
20	tinental Shelf planning area that the Governor
21	of the State that represents that subdivision re-
22	quests be made available for leasing.
23	"(B) In this paragraph the term 'available un-
24	leased acreage' means that portion of the outer Conti-
25	nental Shelf that is not under lease at the time of a

1	proposed lease sale, and that has not otherwise been
2	made unavailable for leasing by law.
3	"(6)(A) In the 2012–2017 5-year oil and gas
4	leasing program, the Secretary shall make available
5	for leasing any outer Continental Shelf planning
6	areas that—
7	"(i) are estimated to contain more than
8	2,500,000,000 barrels of oil; or
9	"(ii) are estimated to contain more than
10	7,500,000,000,000 cubic feet of natural gas.
11	"(B) To determine the planning areas described
12	in subparagraph (A), the Secretary shall use the doc-
13	ument entitled 'Minerals Management Service Assess-
14	ment of Undiscovered Technically Recoverable Oil
15	and Gas Resources of the Nation's Outer Continental
16	Shelf, 2006'.".
17	SEC. 102. DOMESTIC OIL AND NATURAL GAS PRODUCTION
18	GOAL.
19	Section 18(b) of the Outer Continental Shelf Lands Act
20	(43 U.S.C. 1344(b)) is amended to read as follows:
21	"(b) Domestic Oil and Natural Gas Production
22	GOAL.——
23	"(1) In General.—In developing a 5-year oil
24	and gas leasing program, and subject to paragraph
25	(2), the Secretary shall determine a domestic strategic

1	production goal for the development of oil and nat-
2	ural gas as a result of that program. Such goal shall
3	be—
4	"(A) the best estimate of the possible in-
5	crease in domestic production of oil and natural
6	gas from the outer Continental Shelf;
7	"(B) focused on meeting domestic demand
8	for oil and natural gas and reducing the depend-
9	ence of the United States on foreign energy; and
10	"(C) focused on the production increases
11	achieved by the leasing program at the end of the

21	amount of oil produced per day; and
22	"(B) no less than 10,000,000,000 cubic feet
23	in the amount of natural gas produced per day.
24	"(3) Reporting.—The Secretary shall report
25	annually, beginning at the end of the 5-year period

1 for which the program applies, to the Committee on 2 Natural Resources of the House of Representatives and the Committee on Energy and Natural Resources 3 of the Senate on the progress of the program in meeting the production goal. 7	conduct offshore oil and gas Lease Sale 220 under section
8	8 of the Outer Continental Shelf Lands Act (43 U.S.C.
9	1337) as soon as practicable, but not later than one year
10	after the date of enactment of this Act.
11	(b) Requirement to Make Replacement Lease
12	Blocks Available.—
13	(1) In general.—For each lease block in a pro-
14	posed lease sale under this section for which the Sec-
15	retary of Defense, in consultation with the Secretary
16	of the Interior, under the Memorandum of Agreement
17	referred to in subsection $(c)(2)$, issues a statement
18	proposing deferral from a lease offering due to de-

24	Continental Shelf oil and gas leasing program and
25	the domestic energy resources produced therefrom are

- integral to national security, the Secretary of the Interior and the Secretary of Defense shall work jointly in implementing this section in order to ensure achievement of the following common goals:
 - (A) Preserving the ability of the Armed Forces of the United States to maintain an optimum state of readiness through their continued use of the Outer Continental Shelf.
 - (B) Allowing effective exploration, development, and production of our Nation's oil, gas, and renewable energy resources.
