# A BILL

### **3** SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

- 4 This Act may be cited as the "21st Century Civilian
- 5 Conservation Corps Act".

# 1SEC. 2. ESTABLISHMENT AND OPERATION OF CIVILIAN2CONSERVATION CORPS.

3 (a) ESTABLISHMENT AND PURPOSE.—In order to relieve the acute condition of widespread distress and unem-4 5 ployment existing in the United States and to provide for the restoration of depleted natural resources in the United 6 7 States and the advancement of an orderly program of use-8 ful public works, the President may establish and operate 9 a Civilian Conservation Corps to employ citizens of the 10 United States, who are otherwise unemployed or under-11 employed, in the construction, maintenance, and carrying on of works of a public nature in connection with-12

13 (1) the forestation of lands belonging to the14 United States or a State;

15 (2) the prevention of forest fires, floods, and16 soil erosion;

17 (3) plant pest and disease control;

(4) the construction, maintenance, or repair of
paths, trails, and fire-lanes in units of the National
Park System, public lands, and other lands under
the jurisdiction of the Secretary of the Interior and
units of the National Forest System; and

(5) such other work on Federal or State land
incidental to or necessary in connection with any
projects of the character enumerated in paragraphs

(1) through (4) that the President determines to be
 desirable.

3 (b) ROLE OF FEDERAL AGENCIES.—To operate the 4 Civilian Conservation Corps, the President may utilize ex-5 isting Federal departments and agencies, including the Department of Labor, the Department of Defense, the 6 7 National Guard Bureau, the Department of Interior, the 8 Department of Agriculture, the Army Corps of Engineers, 9 the Department of Transportation, the Department of En-10 ergy, the Environmental Protection Agency, and Federal 11 governmental corporations.

12 (c) INCLUSION OF OTHER LANDS.—The President 13 may extend the activities of the Civilian Conservation Corps to lands owned by a political subdivision of a State 14 15 and lands in private ownership, but only for the purpose of conducting such kinds of cooperation work as are other-16 17 wise authorized by law in preventing and controlling forest fires and the attacks of forest tree pests and diseases and 18 19 such work as is necessary and in the public interest to 20 control floods.

(d) CONTRACT AUTHORITY.—For the purpose of carrying out this Act the President may enter into such contracts or agreements with States as may be necessary, including provisions for utilization of existing State administrative agencies.

(e) ACQUISITION OF REAL PROPERTY.—The Presi dent, or the head of any department or agency authorized
 by the President to construct any project or to carry on
 any public works under this Act, may acquire real prop erty for such project or public work by purchase, donation,
 condemnation, or otherwise.

## 7 SEC. 3. ADMINISTRATION OF CIVILIAN CONSERVATION 8 CORPS.

9 (a) EMPLOYMENT PREFERENCE.—If the President 10 determines that amounts appropriated to carry out a Civilian Conservation Corps under this Act for a fiscal year 11 12 will be insufficient to employ all of the citizens of the 13 United States described in section 2(a) who are seeking or likely to seek employment in the Civilian Conservation 14 15 Corps and continue the employment of current employees who desire to remain in the Civilian Conservation Corps, 16 the President shall employ additional persons in the Civil-17 ian Conservation Corps in the following order of pref-18 19 erence:

20 (1) Unemployed veterans of the Armed Forces
21 and unemployed members of the reserve components
22 of the Armed Forces.

23 (2) Unemployed citizens who have exhausted24 their entitlement to unemployment compensation.

(3) Unemployed citizens, who immediately be fore employment in the Civilian Conservation Corps,
 are eligible for unemployment compensation payable
 under any State law or Federal unemployment com pensation law, including any additional compensa tion or extended compensation under such laws.

7 (4) Other citizens described in section 2(a).

8 (b) HOUSING AND CARE OF EMPLOYEES.—The 9 President may provide housing for persons employed in 10 the Civilian Conservation Corps and furnish them with 11 such subsistence, clothing, medical attendance and hos-12 pitalization, and cash allowance, as may be necessary, dur-13 ing the period they are so employed.

14 (c) TRANSPORTATION.—The President may provide 15 for the transportation of persons employed in the Civilian Conservation Corps to and from the places of employment. 16 17 (d) NON-DISCRIMINATION.—In employing citizens 18 for the Civilian Conservation Corps, no discrimination 19 shall occur in accordance with Federal employment law; 20except that no individual under conviction for crime and 21 serving sentence therefore shall be employed under the 22 provisions of this Act.

#### 23 SEC. 4. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.

24 (a) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—There25 are authorized to be appropriated to the President

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\$16,000,000,000 for each of fiscal years 2012 through
 2015 to establish and operate a Civilian Conservation
 Corps under this Act.

4 (b) USE OF UNOBLIGATED FUNDS APPROPRIATED5 FOR PUBLIC WORKS.—

6 (1) USE OF EXISTING FUNDS.—The President 7 may use any moneys previously appropriated for 8 public works and unobligated as of the date of the 9 enactment of this Act to establish and operate a Ci-10 vilian Conservation Corps under this Act.

(2) USE TO RELIEVE UNEMPLOYMENT.—Not
less than 80 percent of the funds utilized pursuant
to paragraph (1) must be used to provide for the
employment of individuals under this Act.

15 (3) EXCEPTIONS.—Paragraph (1) does not
16 apply to—

17 (A) unobligated moneys appropriated for
18 public works on which actual construction has
19 been commenced as of the date of the enact20 ment of this Act or may be commenced within
21 90 days after that date; and

(B) maintenance funds for river and harbor improvements already allocated as of the
date of the enactment of this Act.

(c) DURATION OF AVAILABILITY.—Amounts appro priated pursuant to the authorization of appropriations in
 subsection (a) or made available under subsection (b) shall
 remain available until expended.

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### 5 SEC. 5. TERMINATION.

6 The authority of the President to establish and oper-7 ate a Civilian Conservation Corps under this Act expires8 on September 30, 2015.

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
