# A BILL

- To include the Point Arena-Stornetta Public Lands in the California Coastal National Monument as a part of the National Landscape Conservation System, and for other purposes.
  - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
  - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
  - 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE; DEFINITIONS.
  - 4 (a) Short Title.—This Act may be cited as the
  - 5 "California Coastal National Monument Expansion Act of
  - 6 2012".
  - 7 (b) Definitions.—In this Act:

- 1 (1)MONUMENT.—The  $\operatorname{term}$ "Monument" 2 means the California Coastal National Monument 3 established by Presidential Proclamation 7264, 4 issued January 11, 2000. (2) Secretary.—The term "Secretary" means 6 the Secretary of the Interior. (3) MAP.—The term "map" means the map 7 8 created by the Bureau of Land Management, enti-9 tled "California Coastal National Monument Addition" and dated April 23, 2012. 10 11 (4)POINT ARENA-STORNETTA **PUBLIC** 12 LANDS.—The term "Point Arena-Stornetta Public 13 Lands" means the Federal lands comprising ap-14 proximately 1,255 acres in Mendocino County, Cali-15 fornia, as generally depicted on the map titled "Cali-16 fornia Coastal National Monument Addition" and 17 dated April 23, 2012. 18 SEC. 2. FINDINGS; PURPOSE. 19 (a) FINDINGS.—Congress finds as follows: 20 (1) The Point Arena-Stornetta Public Lands 21 contain significant natural resources, including im-
- contain significant natural resources, including important wildlife habitat, several riparian corridors, extensive wetlands, ponds and other water sources, cypress groves, meadows, and sand dunes that

- should be preserved for present and future generations.
- (2) The ocean and coastal ecosystems adjacent to the Point Arena-Stornetta Public Lands are internationally recognized as significant centers of coastal upwelling that support the diverse, abundant and productive marine ecosystems and wildlife underlying the local economy and identity of coastal communities.
  - (3) The Point Arena-Stornetta Public Lands tell an important story about California's coastal prehistory and history in the context of the surrounding region and communities.
  - (4) The coastal area surrounding the Point Arena-Stornetta Public Lands was traditionally used by Indian people, including the Pomo Indian tribes.
  - (5) The Point Arena-Stornetta Public Lands are historically associated with adjacent lands managed for the enjoyment of current and future generations, including the Arena Rock Marine Natural Preserve, and Manchester Beach State Park.
  - (6) The Point Arena-Stornetta Public Lands represent a model partnership where future management can be successfully accomplished among the

- Federal Government, State of California, Mendocino
   County, local communities, and private groups.
- 3 (7) Permanent protection of the Point Arena-4 Stornetta Public Lands will provide important eco-5 nomic benefits to surrounding communities, and has 6 broad public support.
  - (8) The Point Arena-Stornetta Public Lands would make a significant addition to the California Coastal National Monument and National Landscape Conservation System administered by the Department of the Interior's Bureau of Land Management.
  - (9) Statutory protection is needed for Point Arena-Stornetta Public Lands to ensure that it remains a part of our historic, cultural, and natural heritage and a source of inspiration for the people of the United States.
- 18 (b) Purpose.—The purpose of this Act is to protect, 19 conserve, and enhance for the benefit and enjoyment of 20 present and future generations the unique and nationally 21 important historical, natural, cultural, scientific, edu-22 cational, scenic, and recreational values of the Point 23 Arena-Stornetta Public Lands, while allowing certain rec-
- 24 reational and research activities to continue.

### 1 SEC. 3. EXPANSION OF CALIFORNIA COASTAL NATIONAL

- 2 **MONUMENT.**
- 3 (a) IN GENERAL.—The boundary of the California
- 4 Coastal National Monument, established by Presidential
- 5 Proclamation 7264, is expanded to include the Federal
- 6 land shown on the map. These lands shall be managed
- 7 under the provisions of Presidential Proclamation 7264.
- 8 (b) Map and Legal Description.—
- 9 (1) As soon as practicable after the date of the 10 enactment of this Act, the Secretary shall file with 11 the Committee on Natural Resources of the House 12 of Representatives and the Committee on Energy 13 and Natural Resources of the Senate a map and 14 boundary description of lands added to the Monu-15 ment by this Act.
  - (2) FORCE AND EFFECT.—The map and boundary description filed under subsection (1) shall have the same force and effect as if included in this section, except that the Secretary may correct any minor errors in the maps and boundary descriptions.
  - (3) AVAILABILITY OF MAP AND BOUNDARY DE-SCRIPTION.—The map and boundary description filed under subsection (1) shall be on file and available for public inspection in appropriate offices of the Bureau of Land Management.

#### 1 SEC. 4. ADMINISTRATION.

- 2 (a) In General.—The Secretary shall manage these
- 3 lands as a part of the California Coastal National Monu-
- 4 ment established under the provisions of Presidential
- 5 Proclamation 7264.
- 6 (b) Management Plan.—Not later than 2 years
- 7 after the date of the enactment of this Act, the Secretary
- 8 shall finalize an amendment to the Monument manage-
- 9 ment for the long-term protection and management of the
- 10 lands added to the Monument by this Act. The plan
- 11 amendment shall be developed with full public participa-
- 12 tion and shall describe the appropriate uses and manage-
- 13 ment of the lands consistent with this Act.
- 14 (c) MOTORIZED AND MECHANIZED TRANSPORT.—
- 15 Except as needed for emergency or authorized administra-
- 16 tive purposes, the use of motorized and mechanized vehi-
- 17 cles in the monument shall be permitted only on roads
- 18 and trails designated for their use.
- 19 (d) Incorporation of Lands and Interests.—
- 20 (1) Authority.—The Secretary may acquire
- 21 non-Federal land or interests in land within or adja-
- cent to the lands added to the Monument by this
- Act only through exchange, donation, or purchase
- from a willing seller.
- 25 (2) Management.—Any lands or interests in
- land within or adjacent to the lands added to the

- 1 Monument by this Act acquired by the United States
- 2 after the date of the enactment of this Act shall be
- 3 added to and administered as part of the Monument.
- 4 (e) Overflights.—Nothing in this Act shall be con-
- 5 strued to—
- 6 (1) restrict or preclude overflights, including
- 7 low-level overflights, military, commercial, and gen-
- 8 eral aviation overflights that can be seen or heard
- 9 within to the lands added to the Monument by this
- 10 Act;
- 11 (2) restrict or preclude the designation or cre-
- ation of new units of special use airspace or the es-
- tablishment of military flight training routes over to
- the lands added to the Monument by this Act; or
- 15 (3) modify regulations governing low-level over-
- 16 flights above the adjacent Gulf of the Farallones Na-
- 17 tional Marine Sanctuary.
- 18 (f) Law Enforcement.—Nothing in this act effects
- 19 the Department of Homeland Security law enforcement
- 20 authorities.
- 21 (g) Native American Uses.—Nothing in this act
- 22 enlarges or diminishes the rights of any Indian tribe or
- 23 Indian religious community.
- 24 (h) Buffer Zones.—

1	(1) In General.—The expansion of the Monu-
2	ment is not intended to lead to the creation of pro-
3	tective perimeters or buffer zones around the lands
4	included in the Monument by this Act.

- 5 (2) ACTIVITIES OUTSIDE THE MONUMENT.—
  6 The fact that activities outside the Monument can
  7 be seen or heard within the lands added to the
  8 Monument by this Act shall not, of itself, preclude
  9 such activities or uses up to the boundary of the
  10 Monument.
- 11 (i) NATIONAL LANDSCAPE CONSERVATION SYS-12 TEM.—The Secretary shall manage the Monument as part 13 of the National Landscape Conservation System.
