3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

4 This Act may be cited as the "Idaho and Montana

5 Wolf Management Act of 2011".

6 SEC. 2. DEFINITIONS.

- 7 In this Act:
- 8 (1) STATE.—The term "State" means each of
- 9 the States of Idaho and Montana.

(2) WOLF.—The term "wolf" means any spe cies, subspecies, or population segment of Canis
 lupus.

4 SEC. 3. PROHIBITION ON TREATMENT OF WOLVES IN 5 IDAHO AND MONTANA UNDER THE ENDAN6 GERED SPECIES ACT OF 1973.

7 Any wolf in Idaho or Montana shall not be treated
8 under any status of the Endangered Species Act of 1973
9 (16 U.S.C. 1531 et seq.), including as an endangered spe10 cies, a threatened species, an essential experimental popu11 lation, or a nonessential experimental population.

12 SEC. 4. STATE MANAGEMENT AUTHORITY.

(a) STATE MANAGEMENT AUTHORITY.—Each State
shall have exclusive jurisdiction over the management of
wolves within the borders of that State.

16 (b) PROTECTION BY STATES.—Nothing in this Act shall preclude any State from providing protections to 17 wolves equivalent to those protections provided by the En-18 dangered Species Act of 1973 (16 U.S.C. 1531 et seq.). 19 20 (c) REIMBURSEMENT BY STATES.—Nothing in this 21 Act shall preclude any State from reimbursing the owner 22 of livestock for any loss of livestock that results from dep-23 redation by wolves, or that derives from wolves, that were 24 introduced into the wild.
