# **AN ACT**

Making appropriations for the Departments of Commerce and Justice, Science, and Related Agencies for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2013, and for other purposes.

1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, 3 That the following sums are appropriated, out of any 4 money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, for the 5 fiscal year ending September 30, 2013, and for other pur-6 poses, namely:

1 TITLE I 2 DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE 3 INTERNATIONAL TRADE ADMINISTRATION 4 OPERATIONS AND ADMINISTRATION 5 For necessary expenses for international trade activities of the Department of Commerce provided for by law, 6 7 and for engaging in trade promotional activities abroad, 8 including expenses of grants and cooperative agreements 9 for the purpose of promoting exports of United States 10 firms, without regard to sections 3702 and 3703 of title 44, United States Code; full medical coverage for depend-11 12 ent members of immediate families of employees stationed 13 overseas and employees temporarily posted overseas; travel and transportation of employees of the International 14 15 Trade Administration between two points abroad, without regard to section 40118 of title 49, United States Code; 16 17 employment of citizens of the United States and aliens by contract for services; rental of space abroad for periods 18 not exceeding 10 years, and expenses of alteration, repair, 19 20 or improvement; purchase or construction of temporary 21 demountable exhibition structures for use abroad; pay-22 ment of tort claims, in the manner authorized in the first 23 paragraph of section 2672 of title 28, United States Code, 24 when such claims arise in foreign countries; not to exceed 25 \$294,300 for official representation expenses abroad; pur-

chase of passenger motor vehicles for official use abroad, 1 2 not to exceed \$45,000 per vehicle; obtaining insurance on 3 official motor vehicles; and rental of tie lines. 4 \$467,737,000, to remain available until September 30, 5 2014, of which \$9,439,000 is to be derived from fees to 6 be retained and used by the International Trade Adminis-7 tration, notwithstanding section 3302 of title 31, United 8 States Code: *Provided*, That, of amounts provided under 9 this heading, not less than \$11,400,000 (increased by 10 \$5,000,000) shall be for China antidumping and countervailing duty enforcement and compliance activities: Pro-11 12 vided further, That the provisions of the first sentence of 13 section 105(f) and all of section 108(c) of the Mutual Edu-14 cational and Cultural Exchange Act of 1961 (22 U.S.C. 15 2455(f) and 2458(c)) shall apply in carrying out these activities; and that for the purpose of this Act, contributions 16 17 under the provisions of the Mutual Educational and Cul-18 tural Exchange Act of 1961 shall include payment for as-19 sessments for services provided as part of these activities.

# OPERATIONS AND ADMINISTRATION

For necessary expenses for export administration and national security activities of the Department of Commerce, including costs associated with the performance of export administration field activities both domestically and

abroad; full medical coverage for dependent members of 1 immediate families of employees stationed overseas; em-2 3 ployment of citizens of the United States and aliens by 4 contract for services abroad; payment of tort claims, in 5 the manner authorized in the first paragraph of section 6 2672 of title 28, United States Code, when such claims 7 arise in foreign countries; not to exceed \$13,500 for offi-8 cial representation expenses abroad; awards of compensa-9 tion to informers under the Export Administration Act of 10 1979, and as authorized by section 1(b) of the Act of June 15, 1917 (40 Stat. 223; 22 U.S.C. 401(b)); and purchase 11 of passenger motor vehicles for official use and motor vehi-12 13 cles for law enforcement use with special requirement vehicles eligible for purchase without regard to any price limi-14 15 tation otherwise established by law, \$101,000,000, to remain available until expended: *Provided*, That the provi-16 sions of the first sentence of section 105(f) and all of sec-17 18 tion 108(c) of the Mutual Educational and Cultural Exchange Act of 1961 (22 U.S.C. 2455(f) and 2458(c)) shall 19 20apply in carrying out these activities: *Provided further*, 21 That payments and contributions collected and accepted 22 for materials or services provided as part of such activities 23 may be retained for use in covering the cost of such activi-24 ties, and for providing information to the public with re-25 spect to the export administration and national security activities of the Department of Commerce and other ex port control programs of the United States and other gov ernments.

# 5 ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS

6 For grants for economic development assistance as 7 provided by the Public Works and Economic Development 8 Act of 1965, for trade adjustment assistance, for the cost 9 of loan guarantees authorized by section 26 of the Steven-10 son-Wydler Technology Innovation Act of 1980 (15 U.S.C. 3721), and for grants, including grants authorized under 11 section 27 of the Stevenson-Wydler Technology Innovation 12 Act of 1980 (15 U.S.C. 3722), \$182,000,000, to remain 13 available until expended; of which \$5,000,000 shall be for 14 15 projects to facilitate the relocation, to the United States, of a source of employment located outside the United 16 17 States; and of which up to \$5,000,000 shall be for loan guarantees under section 26: *Provided*, That the costs for 18 loan guarantees, including the cost of modifying such 19 20 loans, shall be as defined in section 502 of the Congres-21 sional Budget Act of 1974: Provided further, That these 22 funds for loan guarantees under such section 26 are avail-23 able to subsidize total loan principal, any part of which is to be guaranteed, not to exceed \$70,000,000. 24

2 For necessary expenses of administering the eco-3 nomic development assistance programs as provided for by 4 law, \$37,500,000: *Provided*, That these funds may be used 5 to monitor projects approved pursuant to title I of the Public Works Employment Act of 1976, title II of the 6 7 Trade Act of 1974, and the Community Emergency 8 Drought Relief Act of 1977. 9 MINORITY BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT AGENCY 10 MINORITY BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT 11 For necessary expenses of the Department of Com-12 merce in fostering, promoting, and developing minority 13 business enterprise, including expenses of grants, contracts, and other agreements with public or private organi-14 15 zations, \$28,689,000. 16 ECONOMIC AND STATISTICAL ANALYSIS 17 SALARIES AND EXPENSES 18 For necessary expenses, as authorized by law, of eco-19 nomic and statistical analysis programs of the Department 20 of Commerce, \$96,000,000, to remain available until Sep-21 tember 30, 2014. 22 BUREAU OF THE CENSUS 23 SALARIES AND EXPENSES 24 For necessary expenses for collecting, compiling, ana-

25 lyzing, preparing and publishing statistics, provided for by

law, \$253,336,000: *Provided*, That, from amounts pro vided herein, funds may be used for promotion, outreach,
 and marketing activities.

4 PERIODIC CENSUSES AND PROGRAMS

5 For necessary expenses for collecting, compiling, ana-6 lyzing, preparing and publishing statistics for periodic cen-7 suses and programs, provided for by law, \$625,357,000 8 (reduced by \$4,000,000), to remain available until Sep-9 tember 30, 2014: *Provided*, That from amounts provided 10 herein, funds may be used for promotion, outreach, and 11 marketing activities.

#### Administration

#### SALARIES AND EXPENSES

15 For necessary expenses, as provided for by law, of the National Telecommunications and Information Ad-16 ministration (NTIA), \$45,568,000, to remain available 17 until September 30, 2014: Provided, That, notwith-18 19 standing 31 U.S.C. 1535(d), the Secretary of Commerce 20shall charge Federal agencies for costs incurred in spec-21 trum management, analysis, operations, and related serv-22 ices, and such fees shall be retained and used as offsetting 23 collections for costs of such spectrum services, to remain 24 available until expended: Provided further, That the Sec-25 retary of Commerce is authorized to retain and use as off-

setting collections all funds transferred, or previously 1 2 transferred, from other Government agencies for all costs incurred in telecommunications research, engineering, and 3 4 related activities by the Institute for Telecommunication 5 Sciences of NTIA, in furtherance of its assigned functions under this paragraph, and such funds received from other 6 7 Government agencies shall remain available until ex-8 pended.

# 9 PUBLIC TELECOMMUNICATIONS FACILITIES, PLANNING 10 AND CONSTRUCTION

For the administration of prior-year grants, recoveries and unobligated balances of funds previously appropriated are available for the administration of all open
grants until their expiration.

- 15 U.S. PATENT AND TRADEMARK OFFICE16 SALARIES AND EXPENSES
- 17 (INCLUDING TRANSFERS OF FUNDS)

18 For necessary expenses of the United States Patent 19 and Trademark Office (USPTO) provided for by law, in-20cluding defense of suits instituted against the Under Sec-21 retary of Commerce for Intellectual Property and Director 22 of the USPTO, \$2,933,241,000 to remain available until 23 expended: *Provided*, That the sum herein appropriated 24 from the general fund shall be reduced as offsetting collec-25 tions of fees and surcharges assessed and collected by the

USPTO under any law are received during fiscal year 1 2 2013, so as to result in a fiscal year 2013 appropriation 3 from the general fund estimated at \$0: Provided further, 4 That during fiscal year 2013, should the total amount of 5 such offsetting collections be less than \$2,933,241,000 this amount shall be reduced accordingly: *Provided fur-*6 7 ther. That received any amount in excess of 8 \$2,933,241,000 in fiscal year 2013 and deposited in the 9 Patent and Trademark Fee Reserve Fund shall remain 10 available until expended: *Provided further*, That the Director of USPTO shall submit a spending plan to the Com-11 12 mittees on Appropriations of the House of Representatives 13 and the Senate for any amounts made available by the preceding proviso and such spending plan shall be treated 14 15 as a reprogramming under section 505 of this Act and shall not be available for obligation or expenditure except 16 in compliance with the procedures set forth in that section: 17 *Provided further*, That from amounts provided herein, not 18 to exceed \$900 shall be made available in fiscal year 2013 19 20 for official reception and representation expenses: Pro-21 vided further, That in fiscal year 2013 from the amounts 22 made available for "Salaries and Expenses" for the 23 USPTO, the amounts necessary to pay (1) the difference 24 between the percentage of basic pay contributed by the 25 USPTO and employees under section 8334(a) of title 5,

1 United States Code, and the normal cost percentage (as 2 defined by section 8331(17) of that title) as provided by 3 the Office of Personnel Management (OPM) for USPTO's 4 specific use, of basic pay, of employees subject to sub-5 chapter III of chapter 83 of that title, and (2) the present value of the otherwise unfunded accruing costs, as deter-6 7 mined by OPM for USPTO's specific use of post-retire-8 ment life insurance and post-retirement health benefits 9 coverage for all USPTO employees who are enrolled in 10 Federal Employees Health Benefits (FEHB) and Federal Employees Group Life Insurance (FEGLI), shall be trans-11 12 ferred to the Civil Service Retirement and Disability 13 Fund, the FEGLI Fund, and the FEHB Fund, as appropriate, and shall be available for the authorized purposes 14 15 of those accounts: *Provided further*, That any differences between the present value factors published in OPM's 16 17 yearly 300 series benefit letters and the factors that OPM 18 provides for USPTO's specific use shall be recognized as 19 an imputed cost on USPTO's financial statements, where 20applicable: *Provided further*, That, notwithstanding any 21 other provision of law, all fees and surcharges assessed 22 and collected by USPTO are available for USPTO only 23 pursuant to section 42(c) of title 35, United States Code, 24 as amended by section 22 of the Leahy-Smith America 25 Invents Act (Public Law 112–29): Provided further, That within the amounts appropriated, \$2,000,000 shall be
 transferred to the "Office of Inspector General" account
 for activities associated with carrying out investigations
 and audits related to the USPTO.

5 NATIONAL INSTITUTE OF STANDARDS AND TECHNOLOGY

6 SCIENTIFIC AND TECHNICAL RESEARCH AND SERVICES

For necessary expenses of the National Institute of 8 Standards and Technology, \$621,173,000, to remain 9 available until expended, of which not to exceed 10 \$9,000,000 may be transferred to the "Working Capital 11 Fund" *Provided*, That not to exceed \$5,000 shall be for 12 official reception and representation expenses.

13 INDUSTRIAL TECHNOLOGY SERVICES

For necessary expenses for industrial technology services, \$149,000,000, to remain available until expended, of which \$128,000,000 shall be for the Manufacturing Extension Partnership, and of which \$21,000,000 shall be for the Advanced Manufacturing Technology Consortia.

20 CONSTRUCTION OF RESEARCH FACILITIES

For construction of new research facilities, including architectural and engineering design, and for renovation and maintenance of existing facilities, not otherwise provided for the National Institute of Standards and Technology, as authorized by sections 13 through 15 of the

National Institute of Standards and Technology Act (15) 1 2 U.S.C. 278c–278e), \$60,000,000, to remain available until 3 expended: *Provided*, That the Secretary of Commerce shall 4 include in the budget justification materials that the Sec-5 retary submits to Congress in support of the Department 6 of Commerce budget (as submitted with the budget of the 7 President under section 1105(a) of title 31, United States 8 Code) an estimate for each National Institute of Stand-9 ards and Technology construction project having a total 10 multi-year program cost of more than \$5,000,000 and simultaneously the budget justification materials shall in-11 12 clude an estimate of the budgetary requirements for each 13 such project for each of the five subsequent fiscal years. 14 NATIONAL OCEANIC AND ATMOSPHERIC 15 Administration 16 **OPERATIONS, RESEARCH, AND FACILITIES** 17 (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS) 18 For necessary expenses of activities authorized by law for the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, 19 20including maintenance, operation, and hire of aircraft and 21 vessels; grants, contracts, or other payments to nonprofit 22 organizations for the purposes of conducting activities 23 pursuant to cooperative agreements; and relocation of fa-24 cilities, \$2,968,371,000 (increased by \$1,600,000) (reduced by \$542,000) (reduced by \$18,000,000), to remain 25

available until September 30, 2014, except that funds pro-1 2 vided for cooperative enforcement shall remain available until September 30, 2015: Provided, That fees and dona-3 4 tions received by the National Ocean Service for the man-5 agement of national marine sanctuaries may be retained 6 and used for the salaries and expenses associated with 7 those activities, notwithstanding section 3302 of title 31, 8 United States Code: Provided further, That in addition, 9 \$119,064,000 shall be derived by transfer from the fund 10 entitled "Promote and Develop Fishery Products and Research Pertaining to American Fisheries": Provided fur-11 12 ther, That of the \$3,102,435,000 (reduced by \$542,000) 13 (reduced by \$18,000,000) provided for in direct obligations under this heading, \$2,968,371,000 (reduced by 14 15 \$542,000 (reduced by \$18,000,000) is appropriated from the general fund, \$119,064,000 is provided by transfer, 16 17 and \$15,000,000 is derived from recoveries of prior year 18 obligations: *Provided further*, That the total amount avail-19 able for National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administra-20 tion corporate services administrative support costs shall 21 not exceed \$207,013,000: Provided further, That any devi-22 ation from the amounts designated for specific activities 23 in the statement accompanying this Act, or any use of 24 deobligated balances of funds provided under this heading 1 in previous years, shall be subject to the procedures set2 forth in section 505 of this Act.

In addition, for necessary retired pay expenses under the Retired Serviceman's Family Protection and Survivor Benefits Plan, and for payments for the medical care of retired personnel and their dependents under the Dependents Medical Care Act (10 U.S.C. 55), such sums as may be necessary.

# 9 PROCUREMENT, ACQUISITION AND CONSTRUCTION

10 For procurement, acquisition and construction of capital assets, including alteration and modification costs, 11 12 of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, 13 \$1,931,948,000, to remain available until September 30, 2015, except that funds provided for construction of facili-14 15 ties shall remain available until expended: *Provided*, That of the \$1,946,948,000 provided for in direct obligations 16 17 under this heading, \$1,931,948,000 is appropriated from the general fund and \$15,000,000 is provided from recov-18 19 eries of prior year obligations: *Provided further*, That any 20deviation from the amounts designated for specific activi-21 ties in the statement accompanying this Act, or any use 22 of deobligated balances of funds provided under this head-23 ing in previous years, shall be subject to the procedures set forth in section 505 of this Act: Provided further, That 24 25 the Secretary of Commerce shall include in budget jus-

tification materials that the Secretary submits to Congress 1 2 in support of the Department of Commerce budget (as 3 submitted with the budget of the President under section 4 1105(a) of title 31, United States Code) an estimate for 5 each National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration procurement, acquisition or construction project having a 6 7 total of more than \$5,000,000 and simultaneously the 8 budget justification shall include an estimate of the budg-9 etary requirements for each such project for each of the 10 5 subsequent fiscal years.

#### PACIFIC COASTAL SALMON RECOVERY

12 For necessary expenses associated with the restora-13 tion of Pacific salmon populations, \$65,000,000, to remain available until September 30, 2014: Provided, That, 14 15 of the funds provided herein, the Secretary of Commerce may issue grants to the States of Washington, Oregon, 16 17 Idaho, Nevada, California, and Alaska, and to the Federally recognized tribes of the Columbia River and Pacific 18 19 Coast (including Alaska), for projects necessary for con-20 servation of salmon and steelhead populations that are 21 listed as threatened or endangered, or that are identified 22 by a State as at-risk to be so listed, for maintaining popu-23 lations necessary for exercise of tribal treaty fishing rights 24 or native subsistence fishing, or for conservation of Pacific 25 coastal salmon and steelhead habitat, based on guidelines

to be developed by the Secretary of Commerce: *Provided further*, That all funds shall be allocated based on scientific and other merit principles and shall not be available
for marketing activities: *Provided further*, That funds disbursed to States shall be subject to a matching requirement of funds or documented in-kind contributions of at
least 33 percent of the Federal funds.

#### 8 FISHERMEN'S CONTINGENCY FUND

9 For carrying out the provisions of title IV of Public 10 Law 95–372, not to exceed \$350,000, to be derived from 11 receipts collected pursuant to that Act, to remain available 12 until expended.

13 FISHERIES FINANCE PROGRAM ACCOUNT

14 Subject to section 502 of the Congressional Budget 15 Act of 1974, during fiscal year 2013, obligations of direct loans may not exceed \$24,000,000 for Individual Fishing 16 17 Quota loans and not to exceed \$59,000,000 for traditional 18 direct loans as authorized by the Merchant Marine Act 19 of 1936: *Provided*, That none of the funds made available 20 under this heading may be used for direct loans for any 21 new fishing vessel that will increase the harvesting capacity in any United States fishery. 22

DEPARTMENTAL MANAGEMENT

SALARIES AND EXPENSES

3 For necessary expenses for the management of the 4 Department of Commerce provided for by law, including 5 not to exceed \$4,500 for official reception and representation, \$55,000,000: *Provided*, That the Secretary of Com-6 7 merce shall maintain a task force on job repatriation and 8 manufacturing growth and shall produce an annual report 9 on related incentive strategies, implementation plans and 10 program results.

#### OFFICE OF INSPECTOR GENERAL

For necessary expenses of the Office of Inspector
General in carrying out the provisions of the Inspector
General Act of 1978 (5 U.S.C. App.), \$28,753,000.

15 GENERAL PROVISIONS—DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE

16 SEC. 101. During the current fiscal year, applicable 17 appropriations and funds made available to the Department of Commerce by this Act shall be available for the 18 19 activities specified in the Act of October 26, 1949 (15 20 U.S.C. 1514), to the extent and in the manner prescribed 21 by the Act, and, notwithstanding 31 U.S.C. 3324, may 22 be used for advanced payments not otherwise authorized 23 only upon the certification of officials designated by the 24 Secretary of Commerce that such payments are in the 25 public interest.

1 SEC. 102. During the current fiscal year, appropria-2 tions made available to the Department of Commerce by 3 this Act for salaries and expenses shall be available for 4 hire of passenger motor vehicles as authorized by 31 5 U.S.C. 1343 and 1344; services as authorized by 5 U.S.C. 6 3109; and uniforms or allowances therefor, as authorized 7 by law (5 U.S.C. 5901–5902).

8 SEC. 103. Not to exceed 5 percent of any appropria-9 tion made available for the current fiscal year for the De-10 partment of Commerce in this Act may be transferred between such appropriations, but no such appropriation shall 11 12 be increased by more than 10 percent by any such trans-13 fers: *Provided*, That any transfer pursuant to this section shall be treated as a reprogramming of funds under sec-14 15 tion 505 of this Act and shall not be available for obligation or expenditure except in compliance with the proce-16 17 dures set forth in that section: *Provided further*, That the Secretary of Commerce shall notify the Committees on Ap-18 propriations at least 15 days in advance of the acquisition 19 20 or disposal of any capital asset (including land, structures, 21 and equipment) not specifically provided for in this Act 22 or any other law appropriating funds for the Department 23 of Commerce.

24 SEC. 104. Any costs incurred by a department or 25 agency funded under this title resulting from personnel

1 actions taken in response to funding reductions included in this title or from actions taken for the care and protec-2 3 tion of loan collateral or grant property shall be absorbed 4 within the total budgetary resources available to such de-5 partment or agency: *Provided*, That the authority to trans-6 fer funds between appropriations accounts as may be nec-7 essary to carry out this section is provided in addition to 8 authorities included elsewhere in this Act: Provided fur-9 ther, That use of funds to carry out this section shall be 10 treated as a reprogramming of funds under section 505 of this Act and shall not be available for obligation or ex-11 12 penditure except in compliance with the procedures set forth in that section. 13

SEC. 105. (a) Section 105(f) of the Commerce, Justice, Science, and Related Agencies Appropriations Act,
2012 (Public Law 112–55) is amended—

17 (1) by striking "paragraph (2)" and inserting
18 "subsection (e)(2)"; and

19 (2) by striking "this subsection" and inserting20 "subsection (e)".

(b) The requirements set forth by section 105 of the
Commerce, Justice, Science, and Related Agencies Appropriations Act, 2012 (Public Law 112–55), as amended by
subsection (a) of this section, are hereby adopted by reference.

1 SEC. 106. Notwithstanding any other provision of 2 law, the Secretary may furnish services (including but not 3 limited to utilities, telecommunications, and security serv-4 ices) necessary to support the operation, maintenance, and 5 improvement of space that persons, firms, or organizations are authorized, pursuant to the Public Buildings Coopera-6 7 tive Use Act of 1976 or other authority, to use or occupy 8 in the Herbert C. Hoover Building, Washington, DC, or 9 other buildings, the maintenance, operation, and protec-10 tion of which has been delegated to the Secretary from the Administrator of General Services pursuant to the 11 12 Federal Property and Administrative Services Act of 1949 on a reimbursable or non-reimbursable basis. Amounts re-13 14 ceived as reimbursement for services provided under this 15 section or the authority under which the use or occupancy of the space is authorized, up to \$200,000, shall be cred-16 17 ited to the appropriation or fund which initially bears the 18 costs of such services.

SEC. 107. Nothing in this title shall be construed to
prevent a grant recipient from deterring child pornography, copyright infringement, or any other unlawful activity over its networks.

SEC. 108. The Administrator of the National Oceanic
and Atmospheric Administration is authorized to use, with
their consent, with reimbursement and subject to the lim-

its of available appropriations, the land, services, equip-1 ment, personnel, and facilities of any department, agency, 2 3 or instrumentality of the United States, or of any State, 4 local government, Indian tribal government, Territory, or 5 possession, or of any political subdivision thereof, or of 6 any foreign government or international organization, for 7 purposes related to carrying out the responsibilities of any 8 statute administered by the National Oceanic and Atmos-9 pheric Administration.

10 SEC. 109. The Department of Commerce shall pro-11 vide a monthly report to the Committees on Appropria-12 tions of the House of Representatives and the Senate on 13 any official travel to China by any employee of the U.S. 14 Department of Commerce, including the purpose of such 15 travel.

16 This title may be cited as the "Department of Com-17 merce Appropriations Act, 2013".

For expenses necessary for the administration of the Department of Justice, \$110,322,000 (reduced by \$1,000,000) (reduced by \$22,418,000), of which not to exceed \$4,000,000 for security and construction of Department of Justice facilities shall remain available until
 expended.

3 JUSTICE INFORMATION SHARING TECHNOLOGY

For necessary expenses for information sharing technology, including planning, development, deployment and
departmental direction, \$33,426,000, to remain available
until expended.

None of the funds made available to the 7 Department of Justice in this Act may be used for the 8 purpose of transporting an individual who is a prisoner 9 pursuant to conviction for crime under State or Federal 10 law and is classified as a maximum or high security prisoner, other than to a prison or other facility certified by 11 12 the Federal Bureau of Prisons as appropriately secure for 13 housing such a prisoner.

14 SEC. 209. (a) None of the funds appropriated by this 15 Act may be used by Federal prisons to purchase cable tele-16 vision services, to rent or purchase videocassettes, video-17 cassette recorders, or other audiovisual or electronic equip-18 ment used primarily for recreational purposes.

SEC. 210. None of the funds made available under

(b) For fiscal year 2013 and thereafter, the Bureau
of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives shall include
in all such data releases, language similar to the following
that would make clear that trace data cannot be used to
draw broad conclusions about firearms-related crime:

24 (1) Firearm traces are designed to assist law25 enforcement authorities in conducting investigations

by tracking the sale and possession of specific firearms. Law enforcement agencies may request firearms traces for any reason, and those reasons are
not necessarily reported to the Federal Government.
Not all firearms used in crime are traced and not all
firearms traced are used in crime.

7 (2) Firearms selected for tracing are not chosen 8 for purposes of determining which types, makes, or 9 models of firearms are used for illicit purposes. The 10 firearms selected do not constitute a random sample 11 and should not be considered representative of the 12 larger universe of all firearms used by criminals, or 13 any subset of that universe. Firearms are normally 14 traced to the first retail seller, and sources reported 15 for firearms traced do not necessarily represent the 16 sources or methods by which firearms in general are 17 acquired for use in crime.

18 SEC. 515. (a) The Inspectors General of the Department of Commerce, the Department of Justice, the Na-19 tional Aeronautics and Space Administration, the Na-20 21 tional Science Foundation, and the Legal Services Cor-22 poration shall conduct audits, pursuant to the Inspector 23 General Act (5 U.S.C.
