A BILL

To direct the Secretary of Veterans Affairs to educate certain staff of the Department of Veterans Affairs and to inform veterans about the Injured and Amputee Veterans Bill of Rights, and for other purposes.

1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-

2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. INJURED AND AMPUTEE VETERANS BILL OF 4 RIGHTS.

(a) DISPLAY.—The Secretary of Veterans Affairs
(b) shall ensure that the Injured and Amputee Veterans Bill
(c) of Rights described in subsection (d) is printed on signage
(c) in accessible formats and displayed prominently and con-

spicuously in each prosthetics and orthotics clinic of the
 Department of Veterans Affairs.

3 (b) EDUCATION OF DEPARTMENT EMPLOYEES.— 4 The Secretary of Veterans Affairs shall ensure that em-5 ployees of the Department of Veterans Affairs who work at prosthetics and orthotics clinics and who work as pa-6 7 tient advocates with veterans who receive care at such clin-8 ics, including Federal recovery coordinators and case man-9 agers, receive training on the Injured and Amputee Vet-10 erans Bill of Rights described in subsection (d).

(c) OUTREACH TO VETERANS.—The Secretary of
Veterans Affairs shall conduct outreach to inform veterans
about the Injured and Amputee Veterans Bill of Rights
described in subsection (d) by—

(1) ensuring that such Bill of Rights is available on the Internet Web site of the Department of
Veterans Affairs; and

(2) conducting other types of outreach targeted
at specific groups of veterans, which may include
outreach conducted on other Internet Web sites or
through veterans service organizations.

(d) INJURED AND AMPUTEE VETERANS BILL OF
RIGHTS.—The Injured and Amputee Veterans Bill of
Rights described in this subsection is a statement that in-

jured and amputee veterans should have, at a minimum,
 the following rights:

3 (1) The right to access the highest quality pros4 thetic and orthotic care, including the right to the
5 most appropriate technology and best qualified prac6 titioners.

7 (2) The right to continuity of care in the transi8 tion from the Department of Defense health pro9 gram to the Department of Veterans Affairs health
10 care system, including comparable benefits relating
11 to prosthetic and orthotic services.

12 (3) The right to select the practitioner that best 13 meets their orthotic and prosthetic needs, whether or 14 not that practitioner is an employee of the Depart-15 ment of Veterans Affairs, a private practitioner who 16 has entered into a contract with the Secretary of 17 Veterans Affairs to provide prosthetic and orthotic 18 services, or a private practitioner with specialized ex-19 pertise.

20 (4) The right to consistent and portable health
21 care, including the right to obtain comparable serv22 ices and technology at any medical facility of the
23 Department of Veterans Affairs across the country.

24 (5) The right to timely and efficient prosthetic25 and orthotic care, including a speedy authorization

1	process with expedited authorization available for
2	veterans visiting from another area of the country.
3	(6) The right to play a meaningful role in reha-
4	bilitation decisions, including the right to receive a
5	second opinion regarding prosthetic and orthotic
6	treatment options.
7	(7) The right to receive appropriate treatment,
8	including the right to receive both a primary pros-
9	thesis or orthosis and a functional spare.
10	(8) The right to be treated with respect and
11	dignity and have an optimal quality of life both dur-
12	ing and after rehabilitation.
13	(9) The right to transition and readjust to civil-
14	ian life in an honorable manner, including by having
15	ample access to vocational rehabilitation, employ-
16	ment programs, and housing assistance.
17	(e) Monitoring and Resolution of Com-
18	PLAINTS.—
19	(1) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary of Veterans
20	Affairs, acting through the veteran liaison at each
21	medical center of the Department of Veterans Af-
22	fairs, shall collect information relating to the alleged
23	mistreatment of injured and amputee veterans.
24	(2) QUARTERLY REPORTS.—For each fiscal
25	quarter, the veteran liaison at each medical center of

the Department shall submit to the Chief Consultant
 of Prosthetics and Sensory Aids of the Department
 a report on any information collected under para graph (1) during that quarter.

5 (3) INVESTIGATION AND ADDRESSING OF COM6 PLAINTS.—The Chief Consultant, in cooperation
7 with appropriate employees of a medical center of
8 the Department, shall investigate and address any
9 information collected under paragraph (1) at that
10 medical center.

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
