Mrs. GILLIBRAND introduced the following bill; which was read twice and referred to the Committee on Energy and Natural Resources

# A BILL

- To authorize the Secretary of the Interior to conduct a special resource study of the Hudson River Valley, New York.
  - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
  - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

### **3** SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Hudson River Valley
- 5 Special Resource Study Act".

#### 6 SEC. 2. DEFINITIONS.

- 7 In this Act:
- 8 (1) SECRETARY.—The term "Secretary" means
  9 the Secretary of the Interior.

(2) STUDY AREA.—The term "study area"
 means the counties in New York that abut the Hud son River that flows from Rogers Island at Fort Ed ward to the southern-most boundary of Westchester
 County, New York.

#### 6 SEC. 3. FINDINGS.

7 Congress finds as follows:

8 (1) The Hudson River Valley possesses nation9 ally significant and unique cultural, historical, nat10 ural, recreational and scenic resources.

(2) The Hudson River Valley is home to a robust and growing tourism and recreation industry
that is an important component of the regional economy.

15 (3) Throughout history, the Hudson River Val-16 ley has played a crucial role in the development of 17 our Nation, starting from the vibrant Native Amer-18 ican communities that first inhabited the land, to 19 Henry Hudson's voyage up the river later named for 20 him in the vessel Half Moon in 1609 and later with 21 the American Revolution, the debate on our Con-22 stitution, the first successful steamboat voyage by 23 Robert Fulton in 1807, the Industrial Revolution, 24 the establishment of the Erie Canal and growth of metropolitan New York, and the inception of the
 modern labor and environmental movements.

3 (4) The Hudson River Valley gave birth to im4 portant movements in American art, architecture
5 and literature.

6 (5) The Hudson River Valley encompasses a
7 rich array of sensitive natural resources ranging
8 from the River itself and its vast estuarine district,
9 to its wetlands, refuges, parks, forests, farmlands,
10 preserves, cliffs, valleys, and wildlife.

(6) The depictions and descriptions of the Hudson River Valley's renowned scenery and natural resources played a central role in the recognition of
the value of the landscape and the development of
an American esthetic and environmental ideal.

16 (7) A 1996 National Park Service study called
17 the Hudson River Valley "the landscape that defined
18 America".

(8) The Hudson River Valley has been the subject of multiple State and Federal inventories, studies, and plans that should greatly assist a National
Park Service special resource study.

#### 23 SEC. 4. AUTHORIZATION OF STUDY.

(a) IN GENERAL.—As soon as funds are made avail-able for this purpose, the Secretary shall complete a study

of the Hudson River Valley in the State of New York to
 evaluate—

3 (1) the national significance of the area; and 4 (2) the suitability and feasibility of designating 5 the area as a unit of the National Park System. 6 (b) STUDY GUIDELINES.—In conducting the study 7 under subsection (a), the Secretary shall— 8 (1) use the criteria for the study of areas for 9 potential inclusion in the National Park System included in section 8 of Public Law 91-383, as 10 11 amended by section 303 of the National Parks Om-12 nibus Management Act of 1998 (Public Law 105– 13 391; 112 Stat. 3501); and 14 (2) closely examine park unit models, in par-15 ticular national river and recreation areas, as well as 16 other landscape protection models, that— 17 (A) encompass large areas of non-Federal 18 lands within their designated boundaries; 19 (B) promote increased heritage tourism 20 and economic development; 21 (C) foster public and private collaborative 22 arrangements for achieving National Park Serv-23 ice objectives; and 24 (D) protect and respect the rights of pri-25 vate land owners, as well as municipalities.

#### 1 SEC. 5. REPORT.

Not later than 24 months after the date that funds
are first made available for this purpose, the Secretary
shall submit to the Committee on Natural Resources of
the House of Representatives and the Committee on Energy and Natural Resources of the Senate a report on the
findings, conclusions, and recommendations of the study
authorized by this Act.

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
