# A BILL

To establish the Commission on the Review of the Overseas Military Facility Structure of the United States.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Commission on the
- 5 Review of the Overseas Military Facility Structure of the
- 6 United States Act of 2011".
- 7 SEC. 2. COMMISSION ON REVIEW OF OVERSEAS MILITARY
- 8 FACILITY STRUCTURE OF THE UNITED
- 9 STATES.
- 10 (a) IN GENERAL.—

1	(1) ESTABLISHMENT.—There is established the
2	Commission on the Review of the Overseas Military
3	Facility Structure of the United States (in this sec-
4	tion referred to as the "Commission").
5	(2) Composition.—
6	(A) In General.—The Commission shall
7	be composed of eight members of whom—
8	(i) two shall be appointed by the ma-
9	jority leader of the Senate;
10	(ii) two shall be appointed by the mi-
11	nority leader of the Senate;
12	(iii) two shall be appointed by the
13	Speaker of the House of Representatives;
14	and
15	(iv) two shall be appointed by the mi-
16	nority leader of the House of Representa-
17	tives.
18	(B) QUALIFICATIONS.—Individuals ap-
19	pointed to the Commission shall have signifi-
20	cant experience in the national security or for-
21	eign policy of the United States.
22	(C) DEADLINE FOR APPOINTMENT.—Ap-
23	pointments of the members of the Commission
24	shall be made not later than 45 days after the
25	date of the enactment of this Act.

1	(D) CHAIRMAN AND VICE CHAIRMAN.—
2	The Commission shall select a Chairman and
3	Vice Chairman from among it members.
4	(3) TENURE; VACANCIES.—Members shall be
5	appointed for the life of the Commission. Any va-
6	cancy in the Commission shall not affect its powers,
7	but shall be filled in the same manner as the origi-
8	nal appointment.
9	(4) Meetings.—
10	(A) Initial meeting.—Not later than 30
11	days after the date on which all members of the
12	Commission have been appointed, the Commis-
13	sion shall hold its first meeting.
14	(B) Calling of the Chairman.—The
15	Commission shall meet at the call of the Chair-
16	man.
17	(C) Quorum.—A majority of the members
18	of the Commission shall constitute a quorum,
19	but a lesser number of members may hold hear-
20	ings.
21	(b) Duties.—
22	(1) Study of overseas military facility
23	STRUCTURE.—
24	(A) In general.—The Commission shall
25	conduct a thorough study of matters relating to

1	the military facility structure of the United
2	States overseas.
3	(B) Scope.—In conducting the study, the
4	Commission shall—
5	(i) assess the number of forces re-
6	quired to be forward based outside the
7	United States;
8	(ii) examine the current state of the
9	military facilities and training ranges of
10	the United States overseas for all perma-
11	nent stations and deployed locations, in-
12	cluding the condition of land and improve-
13	ments at such facilities and ranges and the
14	availability of additional land, if required,
15	for such facilities and ranges;
16	(iii) identify the amounts received by
17	the United States, whether in direct pay-
18	ments, in-kind contributions, or otherwise,
19	from foreign countries by reason of mili-
20	tary facilities of the United States over-
21	seas;
22	(iv) assess the feasibility and advis-
23	ability of the closure or realignment of
24	military facilities of the United States
25	overseas, or of the establishment of new

1	military facilities of the United States
2	overseas;
3	(v) consider the findings of the Feb-
4	ruary 2011 Government Accountability Of-
5	fice report, "Additional Cost Information
6	and Stakeholder Input Necessary to Assess
7	Military Posture in Europe", GAO-11-
8	131; and
9	(vi) consider or assess any other issue
10	relating to military facilities of the United
11	States overseas that the Commission con-
12	siders appropriate.
13	(2) Report.—
14	(A) In general.—Not later than 60 days
15	after holding its final public hearing, the Com-
16	mission shall submit to the President and Con-
17	gress a report which shall contain a detailed
18	statement of the findings and conclusions of the
19	Commission, together with its recommendations
20	for such legislation and administrative actions
21	as it considers appropriate.
22	(B) Proposed overseas basing strat-
23	EGY.—In addition to the matters specified in
24	subparagraph (A), the report shall also include
25	a proposal by the Commission for an overseas

basing strategy for the Department of Defense in order to meet the current and future mission of the Department, taking into account heightened fiscal constraints.

(C) Focus on Particular Issues.—The report shall focus on current and future geopolitical posturing, operational requirements, mobility, quality of life, cost, and synchronization with the combatant commands.

# (c) Powers.—

- (1) Hearings.—The Commission may hold such hearings, sit and act at such times and places, take such testimony, and receive such evidence as the Commission considers advisable to carry out this section.
- (2) Information sharing.—The Commission may secure directly from any Federal department or agency such information as the Commission considers necessary to carry out this section. Upon request of the Chairman of the Commission, the head of such department or agency shall furnish such information to the Commission.
- (3) ADMINISTRATIVE SUPPORT.—Upon request of the Commission, the Administrator of General Services shall provide to the Commission, on a reim-

- bursable basis, the administrative support necessary
  for the Commission to carry out its duties under this
  section.
- 4 (4) Mails.—The Commission may use the
  5 United States mails in the same manner and under
  6 the same conditions as other departments and agen7 cies of the Federal Government.
- 8 (5) GIFTS.—The Commission may accept, use, 9 and dispose of gifts or donations of services or prop-10 erty.

# (d) Personnel Matters.—

(1) Compensation of members.—Each member of the Commission who is not an officer or employee of the Federal Government shall be compensated at a rate equal to the daily equivalent of the annual rate of basic pay prescribed for level IV of the Executive Schedule under section 5315 of title 5, United States Code, for each day (including travel time) during which such member is engaged in the performance of the duties of the Commission under this section. All members of the Commission who are officers or employees of the United States shall serve without compensation in addition to that received for their services as officers or employees of the United States.

# (2) Travel.—

(A) EXPENSES.—Members of the Commission shall be allowed travel expenses, including per diem in lieu of subsistence, at rates authorized for employees of agencies under subchapter I of chapter 57 of title 5, United States Code, while away from their homes or regular places of business in the performance of services for the Commission under this section.

(B) MILITARY AIRCRAFT.—Members and staff of the Commission may receive transportation on military aircraft to and from the United States, and overseas, for purposes of the performance of the duties of the Commission to the extent that such transportation will not interfere with the requirements of military operations.

#### (3) Staffing.—

(A) EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR.—The Chairman of the Commission may, without regard to the civil service laws and regulations, appoint and terminate an executive director and such other additional personnel as may be necessary to enable the Commission to perform its duties under this section. The employment of an exec-

- 1 utive director shall be subject to confirmation 2 by the Commission.
  - (B) STAFF.—The Commission may employ a staff to assist the Commission in carrying out its duties. The total number of the staff of the Commission, including an executive director under subparagraph (A), may not exceed 12.
  - (C) Compensation.—The Chairman of the Commission may fix the compensation of the executive director and other personnel without regard to chapter 51 and subchapter III of chapter 53 of title 5, United States Code, relating to classification of positions and General Schedule pay rates, except that the rate of pay for the executive director and other personnel may not exceed the rate payable for level V of the Executive Schedule under section 5316 of such title.
  - (4) Details.—Any employee of the Department of Defense, the Department of State, or the Government Accountability Office may be detailed to the Commission without reimbursement, and such detail shall be without interruption or loss of civil service status or privilege.

1 (5)TEMPORARY AND INTERMITTENT SERV-2 ICES.—The Chairman of the Commission may pro-3 cure temporary and intermittent services under section 3109(b) of title 5, United States Code, at rates 5 for individuals which do not exceed the daily equiva-6 lent of the annual rate of basic pay prescribed for 7 level V of the Executive Schedule under section 5316 8 of such title.

# (e) Security.—

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- (1) Security Clearances.—Members and staff of the Commission, and any experts and consultants to the Commission, shall possess security clearances appropriate for their duties with the Commission under this section.
- (2) Information security.—The Secretary of Defense shall assume responsibility for the handling and disposition of any information relating to the national security of the United States that is received, considered, or used by the Commission under this section.
- 21 (f) TERMINATION.—The Commission shall terminate 22 45 days after the date on which the Commission submits 23 its report under subsection (b).
