# A BILL

To require operators of Internet websites that provide access to international travel services and market overseas vacation destinations to provide on such websites information to consumers regarding the potential health and safety risks associated with traveling to such vacation destinations, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "International Travelers
- 5 Bill of Rights Act of 2011".

#### SEC. 2. DEFINITIONS.

2 In this Act:

- (1) COMMISSION.—The term "Commission"
   4 means the Federal Trade Commission.
- 5 (2) COVERED WEBSITE OPERATOR.—The term
  6 "covered website operator" means an individual or
  7 entity that operates an Internet website that pro8 vides access to international travel services. Such
  9 term includes an overseas vacation destination or a
  10 third party that operates an Internet website that
  11 offers international travel services.
  - (3) International travel services.—The term "international travel services" means a service that a consumer can use to reserve lodging at an overseas vacation destination.
  - (4) Overseas vacation destination.—The term "overseas vacation destination" means a resort, hotel, retreat, hostel, or any other similar lodging located outside the United States.
  - (5) UNITED STATES.—The term "United States" means each of the several States, the District of Columbia, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, Guam, American Samoa, and the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands.

5	(a) In General.—A covered website operator shall
6	provide to consumers information on the Internet website
7	of the covered website operator, in a manner the website
8	operator considers appropriate, regarding the potential
9	health and safety risks associated with overseas vacation
10	destinations marketed on such website, if any, including
11	the following:
12	(1) Information compiled by the Department of
13	State, including Department of State country-spe-
14	cific travel warnings and alerts.
15	(2) Information regarding the onsite health and
16	safety services that are available to consumers at
17	each overseas vacation destination, including wheth-
18	er the destination—
19	(A) employs or contracts with a physician
20	or nurse on the premises to provide medical
21	treatment for guests;
22	(B) employs or contracts with personnel
23	other than a physician, nurse, or lifeguard, or
24	the premises who are trained in cardiopulmo-
2.5	nary resuscitation:

- 1 (C) has an automated external defibrillator 2 and employs or contracts with 1 or more indi-3 viduals on the premises trained in its use; and
  - (D) employs or contracts with 1 or more lifeguards on the premises trained in cardiopulmonary resuscitation, if the overseas vacation destination has swimming pools or other waterbased activities on its premises, or in areas under its control for use by guests.
- 10 (b) SERVICES NOT AVAILABLE 24 HOURS A DAY.—
  11 If the onsite health and safety services described in sub12 section (a)(2) are not available 24 hours a day, 7 days
  13 a week, a covered website operator who provides informa14 tion about such services under subsection (a) shall display
  15 the hours and days of availability on its Internet website
  16 in a manner the covered website operator considers appro17 priate.
- (c) MINIMUM REQUIREMENT FOR OBTAINING INFOR19 MATION.—If a covered website operator does not possess,
  20 with respect to an overseas vacation destination, informa21 tion about the onsite health and safety services required
  22 to be displayed on its Internet website under subsection
  23 (a), the covered website operator shall, at a minimum, re24 quest such information from such destination.

## 1 SEC. 4. ENFORCEMENT BY FEDERAL TRADE COMMISSION.
