A BILL

To remove the limit on the anticipated award price for contracts awarded under the procurement program for women-owned small business concerns, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-

- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Fairness in Women-
- 5 Owned Small Business Contracting Act of 2012".

1	SEC. 2. PROCUREMENT PROGRAM FOR WOMEN-OWNED
2	SMALL BUSINESS CONCERNS.
3	Section 8(m) of the Small Business Act (15 U.S.C.
4	637(m)) is amended—
5	(1) in paragraph (2)—
6	(A) in subparagraph (A), by striking "who
7	are economically disadvantaged";
8	(B) in subparagraph (C), by striking
9	"paragraph (3)" and inserting "paragraph
10	(4)";
11	(C) by striking subparagraph (D); and
12	(D) by redesignating subparagraphs (E)
13	and (F) as subparagraphs (D) and (E), respec-
14	tively; and
15	(2) by adding at the end the following:
16	"(7) Sole source contracts.—A contracting
17	officer may award a sole source contract under this
18	subsection to a small business concern owned and
19	controlled by women under the same conditions as a
20	sole source contract may be awarded to a qualified
21	HUBZone small business concern under section
22	31(b)(2)(A).".
23	SEC. 3. STUDY AND REPORT ON REPRESENTATION OF
24	WOMEN.
25	Section 29 of the Small Business Act (15 U.S.C. 656)
26	is amended by adding at the end the following:

1	"(o)	STUDY	AND	Report	ON	REPRESENTATION	OF
2	WOMEN.—	_					

"(1) STUDY.—The Administrator shall periodically conduct a study to identify any United States industry, as defined under the North American Industry Classification System, in which women are underrepresented.

"(2) Report.—Not later than 5 years after the date of enactment of this subsection, and every 5 years thereafter, the Administrator shall submit to the Committee on Small Business and Entrepreneurship of the Senate and the Committee on Small Business of the House of Representatives a report on the results of each study under paragraph (1) conducted during the 5-year period ending on the date of the report."

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
