REGULATIONS REGARDING POOLS PROVIDED 2 BY PUBLIC ENTITIES. 3 Section 204 of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (42 U.S.C. 12134) is amended by adding at the 5 end the following: 6 "(d) REGULATIONS REGARDING POOLS PROVIDED BY PUBLIC ENTITIES.— "(1) Definitions.— 8 "(A) 9 COVERED GUIDANCE.—The 10 'covered guidance' means the guidance issued by the Attorney General entitled 'ADA 2010 11 12 Revised Requirements: Accessible Pools - Means 13 of Entry and Exit' (January 2012). "(B) COVERED REGULATION.—The term 14 15 'covered regulation' means the portions of part 16 35 of title 28, Code of Federal Regulations, that were added under the final rule issued by 17 18 the Attorney General entitled 'Nondiscrimina-19 tion on the Basis of Disability in State and 20 Local Government Services' (75 Fed. Reg. 21 56164 (September 15, 2010)). "(C) POOL.—The term 'pool' means a 22 23 swimming pool, wading pool, sauna, steam

room, spa, wave pool, lazy river, sand bottom

- "(C) POOL.—The term 'pool' means a swimming pool, wading pool, sauna, steam room, spa, wave pool, lazy river, sand bottom pool, or other water amusement, within the meaning of part 36 of title 28, Code of Federal Regulations.
- "(2) Prohibition.—Neither the Attorney General nor any other individual or entity shall have authority, under this title or any other provision of Federal law, to administer or enforce a covered regulation (including covered guidance and other related guidance), with respect to a pool at a public accommodation.".
