A BILL

To authorize the Secretary of the Interior to identify and declare wildlife disease emergencies and to coordinate rapid response to those emergencies, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

1 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

2 This Act may be cited as the “Wildlife Disease Emer-
3 gency Act of 2011”.

4 **SEC. 2. PURPOSES.**

5 The purposes of this Act are—

6 (1) to authorize the Secretary of the Interior to
7 identify and declare wildlife disease emergencies;

8 (2) to establish a fund through which the Sec-
9 retary may coordinate rapid response to those emer-
10 gencies; and

11 (3) to prepare for, identify, and address dis-
12 eases adversely affecting wildlife populations and
13 biodiversity through strategic and coordinated ac-
14 tions among Federal, State, and local agencies, In-
15 dian tribes, and nongovernmental organizations.

16 **SEC. 3. DEFINITIONS.**

17 In this Act:

18 (1) **COMMITTEE.**—The term “Committee”
19 means the Wildlife Disease Committee established
20 under section 6(a).

21 (2) **DISEASE.**—The term “disease” means an
22 infectious or noninfectious, pathological condition
23 that—

24 (A) occurs in a susceptible population of
25 wildlife; and

26 (B) is not zoonotic.

1 (3) FUND.—The term “Fund” means the Wild-
2 life Disease Emergency Fund established by section
3 5.

4 (4) INDIAN TRIBE.—The term “Indian tribe”
5 has the meaning given the term in section 4 of the
6 Indian Self-Determination and Education Assistance
7 Act (25 U.S.C. 450b).

8 (5) SECRETARY.—The term “Secretary” means
9 the Secretary of the Interior.

10 (6) STATE.—The term “State” means—
11 (A) each of the several States of the
12 United States;
13 (B) the District of Columbia;
14 (C) the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico;
15 and
16 (D) any other territory or possession of the
17 United States.

18 (7) UNITED STATES.—The term “United
19 States” includes—
20 (A) each of the several States of the
21 United States;
22 (B) the District of Columbia;
23 (C) the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico;
24 and

(D) any other territory or possession of the
United States.

10 (A) is infectious and caused by—
11 (i) a newly discovered pathogen; or
12 (ii) a known infectious disease that is

8 SEC. 4. DECLARATION OF WILDLIFE DISEASE EMERGENCY.

9 (a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary, in consultation
10 with the Governor of a potentially affected State, may de-
11 clare within that State a wildlife disease emergency for
12 a disease that affects wildlife—

13 (1) within the United States; or

17 (b) CONSIDERATIONS.—In making a declaration
18 under subsection (a), the Secretary shall consider—

(1) the level of threat the disease poses to affected wildlife populations, based on—

21 (A) the relative threat to population levels;
22 (B) the relative strength of the contagion
23 and spread of the disease;

(C) the observed rate of morbidity or mortality of the disease; and

(D) the priority of affected species, ecosystems, or habitats, including—

(i) species under—

(I) the Endangered Species Act

of 1973 (16 U.S.C. 1531 et seq.).

(II) the Migratory Bird Treaty

Act (16 U.S.C. 703 et seq.);

(III) the Marine Mammal Protec-

tion Act of 1972 (16 U.S.C. 1361 et

law (including regulations);

(2) the sufficiency of resources available in the Fund;

13 (4) the request of any State Governor to make
14 such a declaration.

15 (c) RESPONSE COORDINATION.—Upon a declaration
16 of a wildlife disease emergency by the Secretary, the Sec-
17 retary shall lead a coordinated response to the emergency
18 that shall include, to the maximum extent practicable, ap-
19 propriate Federal, State, and local agencies, Indian tribes,
20 nongovernmental organizations, or other stakeholders.

21 (d) GRANT PROGRAM.—The Secretary may develop
22 and implement a grant program to provide grants to State
23 wildlife agencies and Indian tribes to coordinate the re-
24 sponse to and address declared wildlife disease emer-
25 gencies.

1 **SEC. 5. WILDLIFE DISEASE EMERGENCY FUND.**

2 (a) ESTABLISHMENT OF FUND.—There is estab-
3 lished in the Treasury of the United States a fund to be
4 known as the “Wildlife Disease Emergency Fund”, to be
5 administered by the Secretary, to be available without fis-
6 cal year limitation, and subject to appropriation, to carry
7 out this Act.

8 (b) TRANSFERS TO FUND.—The Fund shall consist
9 of—

10 (1) such amounts as are appropriated to the
11 Fund; and

12 (2) such amounts as are received by the Sec-
13 retary as donations, gifts, or contributions for the
14 purpose of addressing wildlife disease emergencies.

15 (c) PROHIBITION.—Amounts in the Fund may not be
16 made available for any purpose other than to respond to
17 a wildlife disease emergency declared under section 4.

18 (d) ANNUAL REPORTS.—

19 (1) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 60 days after
20 the end of each fiscal year beginning with fiscal year
21 2011, the Secretary shall submit to the Committee
22 on Appropriations of the House of Representatives,
23 the Committee on Appropriations of the Senate, the
24 Committee on Environment and Public Works of the
25 Senate, and the Committee on Natural Resources of

1 the House of Representatives a report on the operation
2 of the Fund during the fiscal year.

3 (2) CONTENTS.—Each report shall include, for
4 the fiscal year covered by the report, the following:

5 (A) A statement of the amounts deposited
6 into the Fund.

7 (B) A description of the expenditures made
8 from the Fund for the fiscal year, including the
9 purpose of the expenditures.

10 (C) Recommendations for additional authorities to fulfill the purpose of the Fund.

12 (D) A statement of the balance remaining
13 in the Fund at the end of the fiscal year.

14 (e) SEPARATE APPROPRIATIONS ACCOUNT.—Section
15 1105(a) of title 31, United States Code, is amended by
16 adding at the end the following:

17 “(39) a separate statement for the Wildlife Disease Emergency Fund established under section 5 of
18 the Wildlife Disease Emergency Act of 2011, which
19 shall include the estimated amount of deposits into
20 the Fund, obligations, and outlays from the Fund.”.

22 (f) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—There
23 are authorized to be appropriated to carry out this section
24 such sums as are necessary.

1 **SEC. 6. WILDLIFE DISEASE COMMITTEE.**

2 (a) ESTABLISHMENT.—The Secretary may establish
3 a Wildlife Disease Committee to assist the Secretary in
4 increasing the level of preparedness of the United States
5 to address emerging wildlife diseases.

6 (b) DUTIES.—The Committee shall—

7 (1) advise the Secretary on risk assessment,
8 preparation, monitoring, research, and response to
9 wildlife diseases that may significantly impact the
10 health and sustainability of wildlife populations; and
11 (2) as appropriate, draft reports, recommenda-
12 tions, plans, or other documents relating to risk as-
13 sessment, preparation, monitoring, research, and re-
14 sponse to wildlife diseases that may significantly im-
15 pact the health and sustainability of wildlife popu-
16 lations.

17 (c) MEMBERSHIP.—

18 (1) IN GENERAL.—Subject to paragraph (2),
19 members of the Committee shall be appointed by the
20 Secretary from among individuals who are qualified
21 by education, training, or experience in topics such
22 as wildlife health, biology, ecology, wildlife conserva-
23 tion, and natural resource management.

24 (2) INCLUSIONS.—The Committee shall in-
25 clude—

1 (A) qualified individuals who are employed
2 by Federal and State agencies and tribal enti-
3 ties; and

4 (B) qualified individuals who represent
5 *by Federal agencies;*

6 (B) at least 8 qualified individuals who are
7 employed by a State fish and wildlife agency,
8 each of whom shall be employed in a different 1
9 of the 8 regions of the United States Fish and
10 Wildlife Service;

11 (C) qualified individuals employed by other
12 State agencies and tribal entities; and

13 (D) qualified individuals who represent
14 public and private organizations.

15 (d) COMMITTEE CHAIR.—The Secretary, or a des-
16 ignee of the Secretary, shall be the Chair of the Com-
17 mittee.

18 (e) STAFFING AND ASSISTANCE.—The Secretary
19 shall make available to the Committee any staff, informa-
20 tion, administrative services, or assistance the Secretary
21 determines is reasonably required to enable the Committee
22 to carry out the functions of the Committee.

23 (f) RENEWAL.—Notwithstanding section 14 of the
24 Federal Advisory Committee Act (5 U.S.C. App.), the Sec-

1 retary may renew the Committee for any period of time
2 that the Secretary determines to be appropriate.

3 **SEC. 7. RAPID RESPONSE TEAMS.**

4 The Secretary may convene rapid response teams to
5 address any wildlife disease emergency.

6 **SEC. 8. ADMINISTRATION.**

7 Nothing in this Act—

8 (1) limits the authority of the Secretary to re-
9 spond to wildlife disease events that are not declared
10 wildlife disease emergencies under this Act; or

11 (2) limits, repeals, supersedes, or modifies any
12 *wildlife disease emergencies under this Act;*

13 (2) affects the authority, jurisdiction, or respon-
14 sibility of the States to manage, control, or regulate
15 fish and resident wildlife under any State law (in-
16 cluding regulations);

17 (3) grants authority to any public agency to ac-
18 quire private property or conservation easements or
19 otherwise infringe any use of private property; or

20 (4) limits, repeals, supersedes, or modifies any
21 provision of Federal, State, local, or tribal law (in-
22 cluding regulations).

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
