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## A BILL

To direct the President to submit to Congress a report on the long-term costs of Operation Iraqi Freedom, Operation New Dawn, and Operation Enduring Freedom in Iraq and Afghanistan, and for other purposes.

1       *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-  
2       tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3       **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4       This Act may be cited as the “True Cost of War Act  
5       of 2013”.

## 1 SEC. 2. REPORT ON LONG-TERM COSTS OF OPERATION

2                   **IRAQI FREEDOM AND OPERATION ENDURING**3                   **FREEDOM.**

4                 (a) FINDINGS.—Congress makes the following find-

5                 ings:

6                 (1) The United States has been engaged in  
7                 military operations in Afghanistan since October  
8                 2001 as Operation Enduring Freedom and in mili-  
9                 tary operations in Iraq since March 2003 as Oper-  
10                ation Iraqi Freedom and its successor contingency  
11                operation, Operation New Dawn.12                (2) According to the Congressional Research  
13                Service, through fiscal year 2013, Congress has ap-  
14                propriated \$1,500,000,000,000 for the Department  
15                of Defense, for the State Department, and for med-  
16                ical costs paid by the Department of Veterans Af-  
17                fairs. This amount includes \$821,000,000,000 re-  
18                lated to operations in Iraq and \$645,000,000,000  
19                related to operations in Afghanistan.20                (3) Over 90 percent of the funds appropriated  
21                for the Department of Defense for operations in  
22                Iraq and Afghanistan have been provided as supple-  
23                mental or additional appropriations and designated  
24                as an emergency funding requirement.25                (4) The Congressional Budget Office and the  
26                Congressional Research Service have stated that fu-

1       ture costs for operations in Iraq and Afghanistan  
2       are difficult to estimate because the Department of  
3       Defense provides little information on costs incurred  
4       to date and actual expenditure for operations in Iraq  
5       and Afghanistan (because war and baseline funds  
6       are mixed in the same accounts) and because of a  
7       lack of information from the Department of Defense  
8       on many of the key factors that determine costs, in-  
9       cluding personnel levels and the pace of operations.

10                     (5) Over 2,400,000 members of the United  
11       States Armed Forces have served in Afghanistan  
12       and Iraq since the beginning of the conflicts.

13                     (6) Over 4,400 members of the Armed Forces  
14       and Department of Defense civilian personnel have  
15       been killed in Operation Iraqi Freedom, and over  
16       2,100 members of the Armed Forces and Depart-  
17       ment of Defense civilian personnel have been killed  
18       in Operation Enduring Freedom in Afghanistan.

19                     (7) Over 1,715 members of the Armed Forces  
20       have suffered amputations as a result of wounds or  
21       other injuries incurred in Afghanistan or Iraq.

22                     (8) More than 250,000 veterans of military  
23       service in Iraq and Afghanistan have been treated  
24       for mental health conditions, more than 100,000 of  
25       these veterans have been diagnosed with post-trau-

1 matic stress disorder, and approximately 253,330 of  
2 these veterans have a confirmed traumatic brain in-  
3 jury diagnosis.

4 (9) Approximately 54 percent of veterans of  
5 military service in Iraq and Afghanistan have sought  
6 treatment at a Department of Veterans Affairs hos-  
7 pital or medical clinic.

8 (10) The Independent Review Group on Reha-  
9 bilitative Care and Administrative Processes at Wal-  
10 ter Reed Army Medical Center and National Naval  
11 Medical Center identified traumatic brain injury,  
12 post-traumatic stress disorder, increased survival of  
13 severe burns, and traumatic amputations as the four  
14 signature wounds of the current conflicts, and the  
15 Independent Review Group report states that the re-  
16 covery process “can take months or years and must  
17 accommodate recurring or delayed manifestations of  
18 symptoms, extended rehabilitation and all the life  
19 complications that emerge over time from such trau-  
20 ma”.

21 (b) REPORT REQUIREMENT.—Not later than 90 days  
22 after the date of the enactment of this Act, the President,  
23 with contributions from the Secretary of Defense, the Sec-  
24 retary of State, and the Secretary of Veterans Affairs,  
25 shall submit to Congress a report containing an estimate

1 of previous costs of Operation New Dawn (the successor  
2 contingency operation to Operation Iraqi Freedom) and  
3 the long-term costs of Operation Enduring Freedom for  
4 a scenario, determined by the President and based on cur-  
5 rent contingency operation and withdrawal plans, that  
6 takes into account expected force levels and the expected  
7 length of time that members of the Armed Forces will be  
8 deployed in support of Operation Enduring Freedom.

9           (c) ESTIMATES TO BE USED IN PREPARATION OF  
10 REPORT.—In preparing the report required by subsection  
11 (b), the President shall make estimates and projections  
12 through at least fiscal year 2023, adjust any dollar  
13 amounts appropriately for inflation, and take into account  
14 and specify each of the following:

15           (1) The total number of members of the Armed  
16 Forces expected to be deployed in support of Oper-  
17 ation Enduring Freedom, including—

18               (A) the number of members of the Armed  
19 Forces actually deployed in Southwest Asia in  
20 support of Operation Enduring Freedom;

21               (B) the number of members of reserve  
22 components of the Armed Forces called or or-  
23 dered to active duty in the United States for  
24 the purpose of training for eventual deployment  
25 in Southwest Asia, backfilling for deployed

1           troops, or supporting other Department of De-  
2           fense missions directly or indirectly related to  
3           Operation Enduring Freedom; and

4                 (C) the break-down of deployments of  
5                 members of the regular and reserve components  
6                 and activation of members of the reserve com-  
7                 ponents.

8                 (2) The number of members of the Armed  
9                 Forces, including members of the reserve compo-  
10                 nents, who have previously served in support of Op-  
11                 eration Iraqi Freedom, Operation New Dawn, or Op-  
12                 eration Enduring Freedom and who are expected to  
13                 serve multiple deployments.

14                 (3) The number of contractors and private mili-  
15                 tary security firms that have been used and are ex-  
16                 pected to be used during the course of Operation  
17                 Iraqi Freedom, Operation New Dawn, and Op-  
18                 eration Enduring Freedom.

19                 (4) The number of veterans currently suffering  
20                 and expected to suffer from post-traumatic stress  
21                 disorder, traumatic brain injury, or other mental in-  
22                 juries.

23                 (5) The number of veterans currently in need of  
24                 and expected to be in need of prosthetic care and  
25                 treatment because of amputations incurred during

1 service in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom, Op-  
2 eration New Dawn, or Operation Enduring Free-  
3 dom.

4 (6) The current number of pending Department  
5 of Veterans Affairs claims from veterans of military  
6 service in Iraq and Afghanistan, and the total num-  
7 ber of such veterans expected to seek disability com-  
8 pensation from the Department of Veterans Affairs.

9 (7) The total number of members of the Armed  
10 Forces who have been killed or wounded in Iraq or  
11 Afghanistan, including noncombat casualties, the  
12 total number of members expected to suffer injuries  
13 in Afghanistan, and the total number of members  
14 expected to be killed in Afghanistan, including non-  
15 combat casualties.

16 (8) The amount of funds previously appro-  
17 priated for the Department of Defense, the Depart-  
18 ment of State, and the Department of Veterans Af-  
19 fairs for costs related to Operation Iraqi Freedom,  
20 Operation New Dawn, and Operation Enduring  
21 Freedom, including an account of the amount of  
22 funding from regular Department of Defense, De-  
23 partment of State, and Department of Veterans Af-  
24 fairs budgets that has gone and will go to costs asso-  
25 ciated with such operations.

5 (A) funding for combat operations;

(B) deploying, transporting, feeding, and housing members of the Armed Forces (including fuel costs);

18 (F) payments to other countries for  
19 logistical assistance in support of such oper-  
20 ations.

21 (10) Past, current, and future costs of entering  
22 into contracts with private military security firms  
23 and other contractors for the provision of goods and  
24 services associated with Operation Iraqi Freedom,

1       Operation New Dawn, and Operation Enduring  
2       Freedom.

3               (11) Average annual cost for each member of  
4       the Armed Forces deployed in support of Operation  
5       Enduring Freedom, including room and board,  
6       equipment and body armor, transportation of troops  
7       and equipment (including fuel costs), and oper-  
8       ational costs.

9               (12) Current and future cost of combat-related  
10      special pays and benefits, including reenlistment bo-  
11      nuses.

12               (13) Current and future cost of calling or or-  
13      dering members of the reserve components to active  
14      duty in support of Operation Enduring Freedom.

15               (14) Current and future cost for reconstruction,  
16      embassy operations and construction, and foreign  
17      aid programs for Iraq and Afghanistan.

18               (15) Current and future cost of bases and other  
19      infrastructure to support members of the Armed  
20      Forces serving in Afghanistan.

21               (16) Current and future cost of providing  
22      health care for veterans who served in support of  
23      Operation Iraqi Freedom, Operation New Dawn, or  
24      Operation Enduring Freedom, including—

1                             (A) the cost of mental health treatment for  
2                             veterans suffering from post-traumatic stress  
3                             disorder and traumatic brain injury, and other  
4                             mental problems as a result of such service; and

5                             (B) the cost of lifetime prosthetics care  
6                             and treatment for veterans suffering from am-  
7                             putations as a result of such service.

8                             (17) Current and future cost of providing De-  
9                             partment of Veterans Affairs disability benefits for  
10                             the lifetime of veterans who incur disabilities while  
11                             serving in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom, Op-  
12                             eration New Dawn, or Operation Enduring Free-  
13                             dom.

14                             (18) Current and future cost of providing sur-  
15                             vivors' benefits to survivors of members of the  
16                             Armed Forces killed while serving in support of Op-  
17                             eration Iraqi Freedom, Operation New Dawn, or Op-  
18                             eration Enduring Freedom.

19                             (19) Cost of bringing members of the Armed  
20                             Forces and equipment back to the United States  
21                             upon the conclusion of Operation Enduring Free-  
22                             dom, including the cost of demobilization, transpor-  
23                             tation costs (including fuel costs), providing transi-  
24                             tion services for members of the Armed Forces  
25                             transitioning from active duty to veteran status,

1       transporting equipment, weapons, and munitions  
2       (including fuel costs), and an estimate of the value  
3       of equipment that will be left behind.

4               (20) Cost to restore the military and military  
5       equipment, including the equipment of the reserve  
6       components, to full strength after the conclusion of  
7       Operation Enduring Freedom.

8               (21) Amount of money borrowed to pay for Op-  
9       eration Iraqi Freedom, Operation New Dawn, and  
10      Operation Enduring Freedom, and the sources of  
11      that money.

12               (22) Interest on money borrowed, including in-  
13       terest for money already borrowed and anticipated  
14       interest payments on future borrowing, for Oper-  
15       ation Iraqi Freedom, Operation New Dawn, and Op-  
16       eration Enduring Freedom.
