To require the Secretary of the Treasury to mint coins in commemoration of the centennial of the establishment of Mother's Day.

Mr. MCKINLEY (for himself, Mr. RAHALL, Mrs. CAPITO, Mr. GENE GREEN of Texas, and Mr. KELLY of Pennsylvania) introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on Financial Services

A BILL

To require the Secretary of the Treasury to mint coins in commemoration of the centennial of the establishment of Mother's Day.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

4 This Act may be cited as the "Mother's Day Centen-
5 nial Commemorative Coin Act".

6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.

7 The Congress hereby finds as follows:

1 (1) Anna Jarvis, who is considered to be the
2 founder of the modern Mother's Day, was born in
3 Webster, West Virginia, on May 1, 1864.

4 (2) A resident of Grafton, West Virginia, Anna
5 Jarvis dedicated much of her adult life to honoring
6 her mother, Anna Maria Reeves Jarvis, who passed
7 on May 9, 1905.

8 (3) In 1908, the Andrews Methodist Episcopal
9 Church of Grafton, West Virginia, officially pro-
10 claimed the third anniversary of Anna Maria Reeves
11 Jarvis's death to be Mother's Day.

12 (4) In 1910, West Virginia Governor, William
13 Glasscock, issued the first Mother's Day Proclama-
14 tion encouraging all West Virginians to attend
15 church and wear white carnations.

16 (5) On May 8, 1914, the Sixty-Third Congress
17 approved H.J. Res. 263, designating the second
18 Sunday in May to be observed as Mother's Day, and
19 encouraging all Americans to display the American
20 flag at their homes as a public expression of the love
21 and reverence for the mothers of our Nation.

22 (6) On May 9, 1914, President Woodrow Wil-
23 son issued a Presidential Proclamation directing
24 government officials to display the American flag on
25 all government buildings and inviting the American

1 people to display the flag at their homes on the sec-
2 ond Sunday of May as a public expression of the
3 love and reverence for the mothers of our Nation.

4 **SEC. 3. COIN SPECIFICATIONS.**

5 (a) DENOMINATIONS.—The Secretary of the Treas-
6 ury (hereinafter in this Act referred to as the “Secretary”)
7 shall mint and issue not more than 400,000 \$1 coins, each
8 of which shall—

9 (1) weigh 26.73 grams;
10 (2) have a diameter of 1.500 inches; and
11 (3) contain 90 percent silver and 10 percent
12 copper.

13 (b) LEGAL TENDER.—The coins minted under this
14 Act shall be legal tender, as provided in section 5103 of
15 title 31, United States Code.

16 (c) NUMISMATIC ITEMS.—For purposes of section
17 5136 of title 31, United States Code, all coins minted
18 under this Act shall be considered to be numismatic items.

19 **SEC. 4. DESIGN OF COINS.**

20 (a) DESIGN REQUIREMENTS.—The design of the
21 coins minted under this Act shall be emblematic of the
22 100th anniversary of President Wilson’s proclamation des-
23 ignating the second Sunday in May as Mother’s Day.

24 (b) DESIGNATION AND INSCRIPTIONS.—On each coin
25 minted under this Act, there shall be—

1 (1) a designation of the value of the coin;
2 (2) an inscription of the year “2014”; and
3 (3) inscriptions of the words “Liberty”, “In
4 God We Trust”, “United States of America”, and
5 “E Pluribus Unum”.

6 (c) SELECTION.—The design for the coins minted
7 under this Act shall be—

8 (1) selected by the Secretary after consultation
9 with the Commission of Fine Arts; and
10 (2) reviewed by the Citizens Coinage Advisory
11 Committee established under section 5135 of title
12 31, United States Code.

13 **SEC. 5. ISSUANCE OF COINS.**

14 (a) QUALITY OF COINS.—Coins minted under this
15 Act shall be issued in uncirculated and proof qualities.

16 (b) COMMENCEMENT OF ISSUANCE.—The Secretary
17 may issue coins minted under this Act beginning on Janu-
18 ary 1, 2014, except that the Secretary may initiate sales
19 of such coins before such date.

20 (c) TERMINATION OF MINTING AUTHORITY.—No
21 coins shall be minted under this Act after December 31,
22 2014.

23 **SEC. 6. SALE OF COINS.**

24 (a) SALE PRICE.—Notwithstanding any other provi-
25 sion of law, the coins minted under this Act shall be sold

1 by the Secretary at a price equal to the sum of the face
2 value of the coins, the surcharge required under section
3 7(a) for the coins, and the cost of designing and issuing
4 such coins (including labor, materials, dies, use of machin-
5 ery, overhead expenses, and marketing).

6 (b) BULK SALES.—The Secretary shall make bulk
7 sales of the coins minted under this Act at a reasonable
8 discount.

9 (c) PREPAID ORDERS AT A DISCOUNT.—

10 (1) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary shall accept
11 prepaid orders for the coins minted under this Act
12 before the issuance of such coins.

13 (2) DISCOUNT.—Sale prices with respect to pre-
14 paid orders under paragraph (1) shall be at a rea-
15 sonable discount.

16 **SEC. 7. SURCHARGES.**

17 (a) SURCHARGE REQUIRED.—All sales of coins mint-
18 ed under this Act shall include a surcharge of \$10 per
19 coin.

20 (b) DISTRIBUTION.—Subject to section 5134(f) of
21 title 31, United States Code, all surcharges which are re-
22 ceived by the Secretary from the sale of coins minted
23 under this Act shall be promptly paid by the Secretary
24 as follows:

1 (1) One-half to the St. Jude Children's Re-
2 search Hospital, for the purpose of furthering re-
3 search funded by Hospital.

4 (2) One-half to the National Osteoporosis
5 Foundation, for the purpose of furthering research
6 funded by the Foundation.

7 (c) AUDITS.—The St. Jude Children's Research Hos-
8 pital and the National Osteoporosis Foundation shall be
9 subject to the audit requirements of section 5134(f)(2) of
10 title 31, United States Code, with regard to the amounts
11 received by the respective organizations under subsection
12 (b).
