# H. R. 4425

To amend the Carl D. Perkins Career and Technical Education Act of 2006 to improve the Act.

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## IN THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

Mr. KENNEDY (for himself, Mr. KINZINGER of Illinois, Mr. RODNEY DAVIS of Illinois, and Mr. POLIS) introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on Education and the Workforce

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## A BILL

To amend the Carl D. Perkins Career and Technical Education Act of 2006 to improve the Act.

1       *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-  
2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4       This Act may be cited as the “Perkins Modernization  
5 Act of 2014”.

6 **SEC. 2. PURPOSES.**

7       Section 2 of the Carl D. Perkins Career and Tech-  
8 nical Education Act of 2006 (20 U.S.C. 2301) is amend-  
9 ed—

1                             (1) in paragraph (1), by striking “high skill,  
2                             high wage, or high demand occupations in current or  
3                             emerging professions” and inserting “employment in  
4                             current or emerging in-demand industry sectors or  
5                             occupations”;

6                             (2) by striking “and” at the end of paragraph  
7                             (6); and

8                             (3) by adding at the end the following:  
9                                 “(8) Aligning the skills, certifications, and cre-  
10                             dentials of secondary and postsecondary students  
11                             who enroll in career and technical education pro-  
12                             grams with the skills, certifications, and credentials  
13                             needed by employers in the labor markets served by  
14                             the educational institutions.

15                             “(9) Ensuring that the selection of skills, cer-  
16                             tifications, and credentials acquired by career and  
17                             technical education students is guided by timely  
18                             labor market information.”.

19 **SEC. 3. DEFINITIONS.**

20                             Section 3 of the Carl D. Perkins Career and Tech-  
21                             nical Education Act of 2006 (20 U.S.C. 2302) is amended  
22                             by adding at the end the following:

23                                 “(35) IN-DEMAND INDUSTRY SECTOR OR OCCU-  
24                             PATION.—

1                 “(A) IN GENERAL.—The term ‘in-demand  
2                 industry sector or occupation’ means an indus-  
3                 try sector or occupation that—

4                         “(i) has or is projected to have a sub-  
5                 stantial role or a positive economic impact  
6                 in the economy of the area served by an el-  
7                 igible institution;

8                         “(ii) provides workers with jobs that  
9                 lead to economic self-sufficiency and oppor-  
10                 tunities for advancement; and

11                         “(iii) is documented in labor market  
12                 information collected by State agencies,  
13                 Federal agencies, workforce investment  
14                 boards, or other third-party organizations  
15                 engaged in labor market research.

16                 “(B) DETERMINATION.—The determina-  
17                 tion of whether an industry sector or occupation  
18                 is an in-demand industry sector or occupation  
19                 under this paragraph shall be made using  
20                 State, local, regional, or national labor market  
21                 information collected by State agencies, Federal  
22                 agencies, local entities, workforce investment  
23                 boards, or other third-party organizations en-  
24                 gaged in labor market research. Industry sec-  
25                 tors and occupations may be identified as in-de-

1           mand on a current or an emerging basis, as  
2           labor market information may describe current  
3           workforce demographics and may also identify  
4           projected labor market trends.”.

5 **SEC. 4. ACCOUNTABILITY.**

6           Section 113(b)(2)(B)(iv) of the Carl D. Perkins Ca-  
7 reer and Technical Education Act of 2006 (20 U.S.C.  
8 2323(b)(2)(B)(iv)) is amended by striking “high skill,  
9 high wage, or high demand occupations in current or  
10 emerging professions” and inserting “employment in in-  
11 demand industry sectors or occupations”.

12 **SEC. 5. NATIONAL ACTIVITIES.**

13           Section 114(d) of the of the Carl D. Perkins Career  
14 and Technical Education Act of 2006 (20 U.S.C. 2324(d))  
15 is amended—

16           (1) in paragraph (2)(B)(iii)(II)—

17               (A) by striking “high skill, high wage occu-  
18               pations (including those in which mathematics  
19               and science skills are critical)”;

20               (B) by inserting “in-demand industry sec-  
21               tors or occupations” after “employment in”;  
22               and

23           (2) in paragraph (4)(A)(i)(V)—

24               (A) by striking “high skill, high wage, or  
25               high demand business and industry”;

(B) by inserting “in-demand industry sectors or occupations” after “occupations in”.

### **3 SEC. 6. OCCUPATIONAL AND EMPLOYMENT INFORMATION.**

4 Section 118(c) of the Carl D. Perkins Career and  
5 Technical Education Act of 2006 (20 U.S.C. 2328) is  
6 amended in paragraphs (1), (3), and (4) by striking “high  
7 skill, high wage, or high demand occupations and non-tra-  
8 ditional fields” each place it appears and inserting “em-  
9 ployment in in-demand industry sectors or occupations”.

## 10 SEC. 7. STATE PLAN.

11 Section 122(c) of the Carl D. Perkins Career and  
12 Technical Education Act of 2006 (20 U.S.C. 2342(c)) is  
13 amended—

14 (1) in paragraph (1)—

19 (B) in subparagraph (H)—

20 (i) by striking “entry into high skill,  
21 high wage, or high demand occupations in  
22 current or emerging occupations”; and

23 (ii) by inserting “for employment in  
24 in-demand industry sectors or occupations”  
25 after “or”: and

(C) in subparagraph (I)(iii)—

(i) by striking “high skill, high wage,

or high demand occupations"; and

(ii) by inserting “in-demand industry

sectors or occupations" after "in";

(2) in paragraph (4), by inserting "or into em-

ployment in an in-demand industry sector or occupa-

tion” after “institutions of higher education”;

(3) in paragraph (9)(C)—

(A) by striking “high skill, high wage, or

high demand occupations"; and

(B) by inserting “employment in an in-de-

mand industry sector or occupation” after “fur-

ther learning and for"; and

in paragraph (18)—

(A) by striking “high skill, high wage, or

high demand occupations and non-traditional

fields’’; and

(B) by inserting "employment in in-de-

mand industry sectors or occupations” after

“for”.

13 nical Education Act of 2006 (20 U.S.C. 2355) is amend-  
14 ed—

15 (1) in subsection (b)(9)—

16 (A) by striking “high skill, high wage, or  
17 high demand”; and

18 (B) by inserting “employment opportuni-  
19 ties in in-demand industry sectors or” after  
20 “for”; and

21 (2) in subsection (c)(12)—

22 (A) by striking “high skill, high wage, or  
23 high demand”; and

1                   (B) by inserting “employment opportuni-  
2                   ties in in-demand industry sectors or” after  
3                   “technically for”.
