Mrs. FEINSTEIN (for herself and Ms. AYOTTE) introduced the following bill; which was read twice and referred to the Committee on Health, Education, Labor, and Pensions

A BILL

To require breast density reporting to physicians and patients by facilities that perform mammograms, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “Breast Density and
5 Mammography Reporting Act of 2014”.

6 **SEC. 2. FINDINGS.**

7 The Congress finds as follows:

1 (1) The National Cancer Institute estimates
2 that 1 in 8 women in the United States will develop
3 a cancer of the breast in their lifetime.

4 (2) The Centers for Disease Control and Pre-
5 vention reports that breast cancer is the number one
6 cause of cancer death among Hispanic women, and
7 the number two cause of cancer death among White,
8 Black, Asian/Pacific Islander, and American Indian/
9 Alaska Native women.

10 (3) Individuals receiving mammograms are not
11 currently required to receive medical summaries or
12 reports from their mammogram providers which ad-
13 dress breast density or its correlation to masking the
14 presence of breast cancer on mammograms, despite
15 the fact that the radiologist interpreting the mam-
16 mogram makes an assessment of the patient's breast
17 density.

18 **SEC. 3. BREAST DENSITY REPORTING BY FACILITIES THAT**
19 **PERFORM MAMMOGRAMS TO PHYSICIANS**
20 **AND PATIENTS.**

21 (a) IN GENERAL.—Clause (ii) of section 354(f)(1)(G)
22 of the Public Health Service Act (42 U.S.C.
23 263b(f)(1)(G)) is amended—

24 (1) in each of subclauses (III) and (IV), by
25 striking “and” at the end; and

(2) by adding at the end the following:

“(V) the report under subclause (I) and the summary under subclause (IV) shall include information about breast density, as specified by the Secretary based upon—

“(aa) current scientific knowledge;

“(bb) technological advances; or

“(cc) other updated medical procedures where the use of such screening developments is consistent with the practice of medical experts in the field;

“(VI) the summary under subclause (IV) shall convey the effect of breast density in masking the presence of breast cancer on mammography, using the provider’s qualitative assessment of breast density; and

“(VII) the summary under subclause (IV) shall include language, developed by the Secretary in consultation with leading experts and leading cancer organizations, communicating that individuals with dense

1 breasts should talk with their physicians
2 about—

3 “(aa) any questions or concerns
4 regarding the summary; and
5 “(bb) whether the individuals
6 would benefit from additional tests.”.

7 (b) RULE OF CONSTRUCTION.—This section and the
8 amendments made by this section shall not be construed
9 to alter in any way Federal requirements relating to finan-
10 cial obligations of any person in connection with health
11 insurance.

12 **SEC. 4. ENHANCING RESEARCH RELATING TO BREAST DEN-**
13 **SITY.**

14 Title III of the Public Health Service Act is amended
15 by inserting after section 354 of such Act (42 U.S.C.
16 263b) the following:

17 **“SEC. 354A. ENHANCING RESEARCH RELATING TO BREAST**
18 **DENSITY.**

19 “The Secretary shall expand and intensify the pro-
20 grams and activities of the Department of Health and
21 Human Services for conducting or supporting—

22 “(1) applied research on breast density;
23 “(2) research on the cost-effectiveness, effec-
24 tiveness, and feasibility of reimbursement models for
25 supplemental imaging relating to breast density; and

1 “(3) research in support of clinical guidelines
2 and best practices concerning use of mammograms
3 and supplemental screening for women with dense
4 breasts.”.
