A BILL

To establish the Blackstone River Valley National Historical Park, to dedicate the Park to John H. Chafee, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*

2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “Blackstone River Val-

5 ley National Historical Park Establishment Act”.

1 **SEC. 2. PURPOSE.**

2 The purpose of this Act is to establish the Blackstone
3 River Valley National Historical Park—

4 (1) to help preserve, protect, and interpret the
5 nationally significant resources that exemplify the
6 industrial heritage of the Blackstone River Valley
7 for the benefit and inspiration of future generations;

8 (2) to support the preservation, protection, and
9 interpretation of the urban, rural, and agricultural
10 landscape features (including the Blackstone River
11 and Canal) of the region that provide an overarching
12 context for the industrial heritage of the Blackstone
13 River Valley;

14 (3) to educate the public about—

15 (A) the nationally significant sites and dis-
16 tricts that convey the industrial history of the
17 Blackstone River Valley; and

18 (B) the significance of the Blackstone
19 River Valley to the past and present of the
20 United States; and

21 (4) to support and enhance the network of part-
22 ners in the protection, improvement, management,
23 and operation of related resources and facilities
24 throughout the John H. Chafee Blackstone River
25 Valley National Heritage Corridor.

1 **SEC. 3. DEFINITIONS.**

2 In this Act:

3 (1) NATIONAL HERITAGE CORRIDOR.—The
4 term “National Heritage Corridor” means the John
5 H. Chafee Blackstone River Valley National Heri-
6 age Corridor.

7 (2) PARK.—The term “Park” means the Black-
8 stone River Valley National Historical Park estab-
9 lished under section 4.

10 (3) SECRETARY.—The term “Secretary” means
11 the Secretary of the Interior.

12 (4) STATES.—The term “States” means—
13 (A) the State of Massachusetts; and
14 (B) the State of Rhode Island.

15 **SEC. 4. BLACKSTONE RIVER VALLEY NATIONAL HISTOR-
16 ICAL PARK.**

17 (a) ESTABLISHMENT.—There is established in the
18 States a unit of the National Park System, to be known
19 as the “Blackstone River Valley National Historical
20 Park”.

21 (b) HISTORIC SITES AND DISTRICTS.—The Park
22 shall include—

23 (1) Blackstone River State Park; and
24 (2) the following resources, as described in
25 Management Option 3 of the study entitled “Black-

1 stone River Valley Special Resource Study—Study
2 Report 2011”:

(A) Old Slater Mill National Historic Landmark District.

5 (B) Slatersville Historic District.

6 (C) Ashton Historic District.

7 (D) Whitinsville Historic District.

8 (E) Hopedale Village Historic District.

9 (F) Blackstone River and the tributaries of

10 Blackstone River.

11 (G) Blackstone Canal.

12 (c) ACQUISITION OF LAND; PARK BOUNDARY.—

1 (3) OTHER RESOURCES.—The Secretary may
2 include in the Park boundary any resources that are
3 the subject of an agreement with the States or a
4 subdivision of the States entered into under sub-
5 section (d)(4).

6 (4) BOUNDARY ADJUSTMENT.—On the acquisi-
7 tion of additional land or interests in land under
8 paragraph (1), or on entering an agreement under
9 paragraph (3), the boundary of the Park shall be ad-
10 justed to reflect the acquisition or agreement by
11 publishing a Park boundary map in the Federal
12 Register.

13 (5) AVAILABILITY OF MAP.—The maps referred
14 to in this subsection shall be available for public in-
15 spection in the appropriate offices of the National
16 Park Service.

17 (6) ADMINISTRATIVE FACILITIES.—The Sec-
18 retary may acquire not more than 10 acres in
19 Woonsocket, Rhode Island for the development of
20 administrative, curatorial, maintenance, or visitor fa-
21 cilities for the Park.

22 (7) LIMITATION.—Land owned by the States or
23 a political subdivision of the States may be acquired
24 under this subsection only by donation.

25 (d) ADMINISTRATION.—

1 (1) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary shall admin-
2 ister land within the boundary of the Park in ac-
3 cordance with—

4 (A) this section; and

11 (2) GENERAL MANAGEMENT PLAN

(ii) in accordance with section 12(b) of the National Park System General Authorities Act (16 U.S.C. 1a-7(b)).

(B) REQUIREMENTS.—The plan shall consider ways to use preexisting or planned visitor facilities and recreational opportunities developed under this section.

2 ing—

- (i) the Blackstone Valley Visitor Center, Pawtucket, Rhode Island;
 - (ii) the Captain Wilbur Kelly House, Blackstone River State Park, Lincoln, Rhode Island;
 - (iii) the Museum of Work and Culture, Woonsocket, Rhode Island;
 - (iv) the River Bend Farm/Blackstone River and Canal Heritage State Park, Uxbridge, Massachusetts;
 - (v) the Worcester Blackstone Visitor Center, located at the former Washburn & Moen wire mill facility, Worcester, Massachusetts;
 - (vi) the Route 295 Visitor Center adjacent to Blackstone River State Park; and
 - (vii) the Blackstone River Bikeway.

1 ated with the purposes for which the Park is estab-
2 lished.

3 (4) COOPERATIVE AGREEMENTS.—

4 (A) IN GENERAL.—To further the pur-
5 poses of this section and notwithstanding chapter
6 63 of title 31, United States Code, the Sec-
7 retary may enter into cooperative agreements
8 with the States, political subdivisions of the
9 States, nonprofit organizations (including
10 Blackstone River Valley National Heritage Cor-
11 ridor, Inc.), and other interested parties—

12 (i) to provide technical assistance, in-
13 terpretation, and educational programs in
14 the historic sites and districts described in
15 subsection (b)(2); and

16 (ii) subject to the availability of ap-
17 propriations and subparagraphs (B) and
18 (C), to provide not more than 50 percent
19 of the cost of any natural, historic, or cul-
20 tural resource protection project in the
21 Park that is consistent with the general
22 management plan prepared under para-
23 graph (2).

24 (B) MATCHING REQUIREMENT.—As a con-
25 dition of the receipt of funds under subpara-

1 graph (A)(ii), the Secretary shall require that
2 any Federal funds made available under a coop-
3 erative agreement entered into under this para-
4 graph are to be matched on a 1-to-1 basis by
5 non-Federal funds.

6 (C) REIMBURSEMENT.—Any payment
7 made by the Secretary under subparagraph
8 (A)(ii) shall be subject to an agreement that the
9 conversion, use, or disposal of the project for
10 purposes that are inconsistent with the pur-
11 poses of this section, as determined by the Sec-
12 retary, shall result in a right of the United
13 States to reimbursement of the greater of—

14 (i) the amount provided by the Sec-
15 retary to the project under subparagraph
16 (A)(ii); or

17 (ii) an amount equal to the increase in
18 the value of the project that is attributable
19 to the funds, as determined by the Sec-
20 retary at the time of the conversion, use,
21 or disposal.

22 (D) PUBLIC ACCESS.—Any cooperative
23 agreement entered into under this paragraph
24 shall provide for reasonable public access to the
25 resources covered by the cooperative agreement.

17 SEC. 5. JOHN H. CHAFEE BLACKSTONE RIVER VALLEY NA-
18 TIONAL HERITAGE CORRIDOR AMENDMENTS.

19 Public Law 99-647 (16 U.S.C. 461 note; 100 Stat.
20 3625) is amended—

(1) in the first sentence of section 2 (110 Stat. 4202), by striking “the map entitled ‘Blackstone River Valley National Heritage Corridor Boundary Map’, numbered BRV-80-80,011, and dated May 2, 1993” and inserting “the map entitled ‘John H.

1 Chafee Blackstone River Valley National Heritage
2 Corridor—Proposed Boundary’, numbered 022/
3 111530, and dated November 10, 2011”;

4 (2) in section 7 (120 Stat. 1858, 125 Stat.
5 155)—

6 (A) in the section heading, by striking
7 “termination of commission” and inserting
8 “termination of commission; designation of local
9 coordinating entity”;

10 (B) by striking “The Commission” and in-
11 serting the following:

12 “(a) IN GENERAL.—The Commission”; and

13 (C) by adding at the end the following:

14 “(b) LOCAL COORDINATING ENTITY.—

15 “(1) DESIGNATION.—The Blackstone River
16 Valley National Heritage Corridor, Inc., shall be the
17 local coordinating entity for the Corridor (referred to
18 in this section as the ‘local coordinating entity’).

19 “(2) IMPLEMENTATION OF MANAGEMENT
20 PLAN.—The local coordinating entity shall assume
21 the duties of the Commission for the implementation
22 of the Cultural Heritage and Land Management
23 Plan developed and approved under section 6.

1 “(c) USE OF FUNDS.—For the purposes of carrying
2 out the management plan, the local coordinating entity
3 may use amounts made available under this Act—

4 “(1) to make grants to the States of Massachusetts
5 and Rhode Island (referred to in this section
6 as the ‘States’), political subdivisions of the States,
7 nonprofit organizations, and other persons;

8 “(2) to enter into cooperative agreements with
9 or provide technical assistance to the States, political
10 subdivisions of the States, nonprofit organizations,
11 Federal agencies, and other interested parties;

12 “(3) to hire and compensate staff, including individuals with expertise in—

14 “(A) natural, historical, cultural, educational, scenic, and recreational resource conservation;

17 “(B) economic and community development; or

19 “(C) heritage planning;

20 “(4) to obtain funds or services from any source, including funds and services provided under any other Federal law or program;

23 “(5) to contract for goods or services; and

24 “(6) to support activities of partners and any other activities that further the purposes of the Cor-

1 ridor and are consistent with the approved manage-
2 ment plan.”;

3 (3) in section 8 (120 Stat. 1858)—

4 (A) in subsection (b)—

7 “(1) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary”; and

(ii) by adding at the end the following:

“(2) COOPERATIVE AGREEMENTS.—Notwithstanding chapter 63 of title 31, United States Code, the Secretary may enter into cooperative agreements with the local coordinating entity designated by paragraph (1) and other public or private entities for the purpose of—

16 “(A) providing technical assistance; or

17 “(B) implementing the plan under section
18 6(c).”; and

(B) by striking subsection (d) and inserting the following:

21 "(d) TRANSITION MEMORANDUM OF UNDER-
22 STANDING.—The Secretary shall enter into a memo-
23 randum of understanding with the local coordinating enti-
24 ty to ensure—

1 “(1) the appropriate transition of management
2 of the Corridor from the Commission to the local co-
3 ordinating entity; and

4 “(2) coordination regarding the implementation
5 of the Cultural Heritage and Land Management
6 Plan.”;

7 (4) in section 10 (104 Stat. 1018, 120 Stat.
8 1858)—

9 (A) in subsection (a), by striking “in which
10 the Commission is in existence” and inserting
11 “until September 30, 2016”; and

12 (B) by striking subsection (c); and

13 (5) by adding at the end the following:

14 **“SEC. 11. REFERENCES TO THE CORRIDOR, INC.**

15 “For purposes of sections 6, 8 (other than section
16 8(d)(1)), 9, and 10, a reference to the ‘Commission’ shall
17 be considered to be a reference to the local coordinating
18 entity.”.

19 **SEC. 6. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.**

20 There are authorized to be appropriated such sums
21 as are necessary to carry out sections 2 through 4.
