# H. R. 6200

To allow the Secretary of Transportation to provide grants to retrain transportation workers.

Ms. EDDIE BERNICE JOHNSON of Texas (for herself, Mr. BARTON, Mr. VEASEY, Mr. ELLISON, and Mr. CAPUANO) introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure

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# A BILL

To allow the Secretary of Transportation to provide grants to retrain transportation workers.

1       *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*  
2       *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3       **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4       This Act may be cited as the “Transportation Work-  
5       force Modernization Act”.

6       **SEC. 2. TRANSPORTATION WORKER RETRAINING GRANT**  
7                   **PROGRAM.**

8       (a) ESTABLISHMENT.—Not later than 1 year after  
9       the date of enactment of this Act, the Secretary of Trans-

1 portation may make grants under this section to institu-  
2 tions of higher education, a consortium of such institu-  
3 tions to establish curriculum for a transportation worker  
4 retraining program, or trade associations and other non-  
5 governmental stakeholders.

6 (b) RESPONSIBILITIES.—The responsibilities of each  
7 grant recipient or consortium of recipients shall include  
8 developing a curriculum to establish a transportation  
9 worker retraining program aimed at training and pre-  
10 paring workers who have been separated from their jobs  
11 for a period determined by the Secretary or have received  
12 notice of impending job loss as a result of being replaced  
13 by automated driving systems of SAE (Society of Auto-  
14 motive Engineers) level 4 or higher. Individuals who apply  
15 and are accepted to a transportation worker retraining  
16 program shall pursue a degree or certification through the  
17 developed coursework or curriculum. Grant recipients may  
18 use funds for studies, pilot programs, as well as testing  
19 new roles for current jobs, including mechanical work, di-  
20 agnostic, and fleet operations management.

21 (c) GENERAL SELECTION CRITERIA.—The Secretary  
22 shall select recipients of grants under this subsection on  
23 the basis of the following criteria:

1                         (1) The demonstrated research and extension  
2                         resources available to a grant recipient for carrying  
3                         out this section.

4                         (2) The capability of a grant recipient to de-  
5                         velop curriculum in the training or retraining of in-  
6                         dividuals described in subsection (b) as a result of  
7                         driverless vehicles.

8                         (3) A grant recipient shall have an established  
9                         transportation program or programs with expertise  
10                         in solving transportation problems through research,  
11                         training, education, and technology and sharing such  
12                         information with other programs.

13                         (4) The demonstrated commitment of the re-  
14                         cipient to carry out a transportation workforce de-  
15                         velopment program through degree-granting pro-  
16                         grams or programs that provide other industry-rec-  
17                         ognized credentials.

18                         (d) FEDERAL SHARE.—The Federal share of a grant  
19                         under this section shall be a dollar for dollar match of  
20                         the costs of establishing and administering the retraining  
21                         program and related activities carried out by the grant  
22                         recipient or consortium of grant recipients.

23                         (e) TRANSPARENCY.—The Secretary shall submit to  
24                         the Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure of

1 the House of Representatives a report describing the over-  
2 all review process under paragraph (3) that includes—

3                 (1) specific criteria of evaluation used in the re-  
4 view;

5                 (2) descriptions of the review process; and

6                 (3) explanations of why recipients were selected.

7                 (f) TRACKING OF CERTAIN INFORMATION.—Not  
8 later than 1 year after grant awards are made under this  
9 section, the Secretary shall implement a reporting or  
10 tracking mechanism to determine—

11                 (1) from which sectors of industry are displaced  
12 transportation workers coming from;

13                 (2) what skills and professions are participants  
14 being retrained for;

15                 (3) how many workers have used the program;

16                 and

17                 (4) relevant demographic information.

18                 (g) DEFINITION OF INSTITUTION OF HIGHER  
19 LEARNING.—For purposes of this Act the term “institu-  
20 tion of higher education” has the same meaning given the  
21 term in section 101 of the Higher Education Act of 1965  
22 (20 U.S.C. 1001).

23                 (h) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—

24                 (1) IN GENERAL.—There is authorized to be  
25 appropriated \$25,000,000 to be used in fiscal years

1       2020, 2021, and 2022 to carry out this section.  
2       Each recipient may receive a one-time grant in an  
3       amount determined by the Secretary of Transpor-  
4       tation.

5                 (2) LIMITATION ON AVAILABILITY OF  
6       AMOUNTS.—Amounts made available to the Sec-  
7       retary to carry out this section shall remain avail-  
8       able for obligation by the Secretary for a period of  
9       3 years after the last day of the fiscal year for which  
10      the amounts are authorized.

11 **SEC. 3. GAO STUDY.**

12       Not later than 1 year after the date of enactment  
13   of this Act, the Comptroller General shall conduct a study  
14   and report to Congress regarding the impact of driverless  
15   vehicle adoption—

16                 (1) on the Nation's workforce;  
17                 (2) on the trucking, freight movement, and per-  
18       sonal transportation industries;  
19                 (3) on lost wages;  
20                 (4) on job loss, including the economic impact  
21       on each region of the United States; and  
22                 (5) on the creation of new jobs and how such  
23       transportation sector jobs would change.
