A BILL

To require the Bureau of the Census to conduct a survey to determine income and poverty levels in the United States in a manner that accounts for the receipt of Federal means-tested benefits, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “Poverty Measurement
5 Improvement Act”.

6 **SEC. 2. IMPROVING THE MEASUREMENT OF POVERTY IN
7 THE UNITED STATES.**

8 (a) DEFINITIONS.—In this section:

1 (1) FEDERAL MEANS-TESTED BENEFIT.—The
2 term “Federal means-tested benefit” means a ben-
3 efit, refundable tax credit, or other form of assist-
4 ance provided under any of the following programs:

5 (A) CASH AND GENERAL PROGRAMS.—

6 (i) Supplemental Security Income.

7 (ii) Earned Income Tax Credit (re-
8 fundable portion).

9 (iii) Additional Child Tax Credit.

10 (iv) Temporary Assistance to Needy
11 Families.

12 (v) Title IV-E Foster Care.

13 (vi) Title IV-E Adoption Assistance.

14 (vii) Social Security Disability Insur-
15 ance.

16 (B) MEDICAL.—

17 (i) Medicaid.

18 (ii) State Children’s Health Insurance
19 Program.

20 (iii) Refundable Premiums and Out of
21 Pocket Subsidies under the Patient Protec-
22 tion and Affordable Health Care Act
23 (PPACA).

24 (C) FOOD.—

(i) Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Food Program (Agriculture).

(ii) Women, Infant and Children (WIC) Food Program (Agriculture).

6 (D) HOUSING.—

7 (i) Section 8 Housing (HUD).

8 (ii) Public Housing (HUD).

(2) HOUSEHOLD.—The term “household” means a householder and one or more people related to the householder by birth, marriage, or adoption.

(7) DIRECTOR.—The term “Director” means the Director of the Bureau of the Census.

10 (b) NEW POVERTY MEASUREMENT LINKING SUR-
11 VEY, ADMINISTRATIVE, AND INCOME DATA.—

(A) Data from the most recent available Current Population Survey.

24 (B) Data furnished by administering agen-
25 cies

(C) Income tax data.

13 (3) ADMINISTERING AGENCY DATA.—

(B) PAYMENT OF EXPENSES.—The Director shall pay for the data described in subparagraphs (B) and (C) of paragraph (1) in such amount, if any (not exceeding the cost of furnishing the data), as may be determined by the head of the applicable agency that furnishes the data.

1 (4) PUBLICATION OF SURVEY DATA.—

2 (A) SURVEY METHODS AND RESPONSES.—

3 The Director of the Bureau of the Census shall
4 publish the methods used to carry out the sur-
5 vey required under paragraph (1), the number
6 of households surveyed, the rate of responses,
7 and the extent of survey completion.

8 (B) RATES AND OTHER DATA.—

9 (i) IN GENERAL.—The Director of the
10 Bureau of the Census shall produce tables
11 and graphs showing for each year the pov-
12 erty rates and related data calculated
13 using the survey responses and other data
14 collected under paragraph (1), including—

15 (I) the total family income for
16 survey respondents;

17 (II) a breakdown of the amount
18 of income taxes and payroll taxes paid
19 by survey respondents; and

20 (III) for 2018 and subsequent
21 years, poverty rates calculated using
22 updated poverty thresholds as de-
23 scribed in clause (ii).

24 (ii) UPDATED POVERTY THRESH-
25 OLDS.—For 2019 and subsequent years,

1 the Director shall adjust the poverty
2 thresholds used for determining poverty
3 rates by using the personal consumer ex-
4 penditure price index (as published by the
5 Bureau of Economic Analysis).

6 (C) CREATION OF A PUBLIC DATABASE.—

7 The Director shall create a database, available
8 at the Director's discretion to researchers who
9 meet the security requirements described in
10 subsection (c)(4), that contains—

11 (i) data from the survey required
12 under paragraph (1); and

13 (ii) data described in subparagraphs
14 (A) and (B) of paragraph (1).

15 (D) NO PUBLICATION OF PERSONALLY
16 IDENTIFIABLE INFORMATION.—The Director
17 shall ensure that no personally identifiable in-
18 formation is included in any publication of sur-
19 vey information or other data collected under
20 this section, including the database created pur-
21 suant to subparagraph (C).

22 (c) PROTECTION AND DISCLOSURE OF PERSONALLY
23 IDENTIFIABLE INFORMATION.—

24 (1) IN GENERAL.—The security, disclosure, and
25 confidentiality provisions set forth in this Act and

1 sections 9 and 23 of title 13, United States Code,
2 shall apply to personally identifiable information ob-
3 tained by the Bureau of the Census pursuant to this
4 Act.

5 (2) ASSIGNMENT OF RECORD IDENTIFICATION
6 KEYS.—All personally identifiable information shall
7 be removed from individual records, which shall be
8 given record identification keys for purposes of iden-
9 tification.

10 (3) STAFF ACCESS TO PERSONALLY IDENTIFI-
11 ABLE INFORMATION.—An officer or employee of the
12 Bureau of the Census or a representative from an
13 administering agency may access personally identifi-
14 able information if such officer, employee, or rep-
15 resentative has the special sworn status require-
16 ments implemented by the Bureau of the Census
17 under section 9 and section 23 of title 13, United
18 States Code.

19 (4) PUBLIC ACCESS TO PERSONALLY IDENTIFI-
20 ABLE INFORMATION.—The Director may disclose
21 personally identifiable information to an individual
22 who has special sworn status as implemented by the
23 Bureau of the Census under section 9 and section
24 23 of title 12, United States Code.

1 (5) PENALTIES.—Any individual who knowingly
2 accesses or discloses personally identifiable informa-
3 tion in violation of this section shall be guilty of a
4 felony and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in
5 an amount of not more than \$300,000 under title
6 18, United States Code, or imprisoned for not more
7 than five years, or both.

8 (6) INADMISSIBILITY OF SURVEY DATA.—Data
9 contained in a response to a survey conducted pur-
10 suant to subsection (b)(1) shall not be admissible as
11 evidence in any proceeding of any court, agency,
12 board, or other entity.

13 (d) STATE REPORTING OF FEDERAL MEANS-TESTED
14 DATA.—Beginning with the first full calendar year that
15 begins after the date of enactment of this Act, with respect
16 to any Federal means-tested benefit that is administered
17 at the State level by a State administering agency, such
18 State administering agency shall submit each year to the
19 Federal administering agency responsible for admin-
20 istering the benefit at the Federal level a report that iden-
21 tifies each household that received such benefits during
22 such year by the Social Security number of the head of
23 the household and the amount, or cash equivalent, of such
24 benefit received by such household.

1 (e) COMPARISON OF INDIVIDUAL SURVEY DATA TO
2 CONSUMER EXPENDITURE SURVEY.—Beginning with the
3 first full calendar year that begins after the date of enact-
4 ment of this Act and each year thereafter, the Bureau of
5 the Census shall, in coordination with the Bureau of
6 Labor Statistics, provide summary statistics comparing
7 the income levels (constructed using all available adminis-
8 trative, income, and Current Population Survey data) of
9 respondents to the Consumer Expenditure Survey con-
10 ducted by the Bureau of Labor Statistics to the consump-
11 tion habits of such respondents.

12 (f) SENSE OF CONGRESS RELATING TO USING EX-
13 ISTING FUNDS.—It is the sense of Congress that no addi-
14 tional funds should be made available to carry out this
15 section.
