# S. 3074

To amend the Congressional Budget Act of 1974 to provide for studies and reports relating to the impact of legislation on spending on children, and for other purposes.

Ms. HARRIS (for herself, Mr. MENENDEZ, and Mr. CASEY) introduced the following bill; which was read twice and referred to the Committee on the Budget

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## A BILL

To amend the Congressional Budget Act of 1974 to provide for studies and reports relating to the impact of legislation on spending on children, and for other purposes.

1       *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*

2       *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3       **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4       This Act may be cited as the “Focus on Children

5       Act”.

1   **SEC. 2. STUDIES AND REPORTS OF THE CONGRESSIONAL**  
2           **BUDGET OFFICE RELATING TO THE IMPACT**  
3           **OF LEGISLATION ON SPENDING ON CHIL-**  
4           **DREN.**

5       Section 202(g) of the Congressional Budget Act of  
6 1974 (2 U.S.C. 602(g)) is amended—

7           (1) in the heading, by inserting “AND REPORTS  
8 TO CONGRESS” after “STUDIES”; and

9           (2) by adding at the end the following:

10          “(3) SPENDING ON CHILDREN STUDIES AND  
11 REPORTS.—

12          “(A) DEFINITIONS.—In this paragraph—

13           “(i) the term ‘budget of the President’  
14 means the budget of the President sub-  
15 mitted to Congress under section 1105(a)  
16 of title 31, United States Code;

17           “(ii) the term ‘child’ means an indi-  
18 vidual under 19 years of age;

19           “(iii) the term ‘key indicator’ includes  
20 information relating to the outlays de-  
21 scribed in subclause (I), (II), (III), or (IV)  
22 of clause (iv); and

23           “(iv) the term ‘spending on children’  
24 includes—

25           “(I) outlays under an entitlement  
26 authority that go directly to children;

1                         “(II) outlays for a Federal pro-  
2                         gram or initiative that, consistent  
3                         with the mission of the program or  
4                         initiative, delivers services exclusively  
5                         to children;

6                         “(III) outlays for a Federal pro-  
7                         gram or initiative that, while not serv-  
8                         ing children directly, has as a core  
9                         mission goal the improvement of the  
10                         health, education, welfare, or general  
11                         well-being of children; and

12                         “(IV) for a Federal program or  
13                         initiative that delivers services to both  
14                         children and adults, the portion of  
15                         outlays under the program or initia-  
16                         tive attributable to providing benefits  
17                         for children, based on the best avail-  
18                         able data.

19                         “(B) STUDIES.—At the request of the  
20                         Chairman or Ranking Member of a committee  
21                         of the Senate or the House of Representatives,  
22                         the Director shall, to the extent practicable,  
23                         conduct a study of a bill, joint resolution,  
24                         amendment, amendment between the Houses,

1           or conference report containing changes in  
2           spending on children.

3           “(C) ANNUAL REPORTS ON SPENDING.—  
4           Not later than 15 days after the last day of  
5           each fiscal year, the Director shall submit to  
6           Congress a report that includes—

7                 “(i) information and data regarding  
8                 spending on children under appropriation  
9                 Acts, including continuing resolutions, for  
10                that fiscal year;

11                “(ii) information and data regarding  
12                spending on children under an entitlement  
13                authority for that fiscal year;

14                “(iii) the share of Federal spending  
15                that constitutes spending on children  
16                under appropriation Acts, including con-  
17                tinuing resolutions, for that fiscal year;  
18                and

19                “(iv) the share of Federal spending  
20                that constitutes spending on children  
21                under an entitlement authority for that fis-  
22                cal year.

23           “(D) ANNUAL REPORTS ON THE BUDGET  
24           OF THE PRESIDENT.—Not later than 15 days  
25           after the date on which the President submits

1 to Congress the budget of the President for a  
2 fiscal year, the Director shall submit to Con-  
3 gress a report on the budget of the President  
4 that includes, for the prior fiscal year, the cur-  
5 rent fiscal year, the fiscal year for which the  
6 budget of the President is submitted, and the  
7 ensuing fiscal year—

8                 “(i) a summary of the total amount of  
9 the appropriations or new obligational au-  
10 thority and outlays requested for spending  
11 on children;

12                 “(ii) an estimate of the level of spend-  
13 ing on children;

14                 “(iii) an estimate of the share of Fed-  
15 eral spending that constitutes spending on  
16 children; and

17                 “(iv) an estimate of the date on which  
18 Federal spending on children will be less  
19 than outlays for interest on the public  
20 debt.

21                 “(E) WARNING REPORTS.—

22                 “(i) IN GENERAL.—At the discretion  
23 of the Director, the Director may provide  
24 a warning report to Congress regarding a  
25 fiscal year in which outlays for interest on

1                   the public debt will exceed spending on  
2                   children.

3                   “(ii) CONTENTS OF WARNING RE-  
4                   PORTS.—The Director may include in a re-  
5                   port issued under clause (i) a list of pos-  
6                   sible budgetary options that may be used  
7                   by Congress in order to prevent such an  
8                   imbalance between outlays for interest on  
9                   the public debt and spending on children.

10                  “(F) OPEN DATA AND TRANSPARENCY.—

11                  “(i) IN GENERAL.—The Director shall  
12                  publish all of the reports and studies re-  
13                  quired under this paragraph in a publicly  
14                  accessible format, including through—

15                  “(I) the dashboard described in  
16                  clause (ii); and

17                  “(II) the open data portal de-  
18                  scribed in clause (iii).

19                  “(ii) DASHBOARD.—The Director  
20                  shall develop and maintain on an Internet  
21                  website available to the public a tool (com-  
22                  monly referred to as a ‘dashboard’) that—

23                  “(I) highlights the key indicators  
24                  identified in the reports and studies  
25                  required under this paragraph; and

1                         “(II) uses visualization tools to  
2                         assist the public in understanding  
3                         trends in spending on children over  
4                         periods of time.

5                         “(iii) OPEN DATA PORTAL.—The Di-  
6                         rector shall develop and maintain an Inter-  
7                         net website available to the public that—

8                         “(I) provides raw quantitative  
9                         data relating to spending on children  
10                         contained in reports and studies re-  
11                         quired under this paragraph;

12                         “(II) provides that data in a  
13                         widely-accessible file format that al-  
14                         lows the public to analyze the data;  
15                         and

16                         “(III) categorizes that data by  
17                         budget account.”.
