# A BILL

To require a study on the public health and environmental impacts of the production, transportation, storage, and use of petroleum coke, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Petroleum Coke Trans-
- 5 parency and Public Health Protection Act".
- 6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.
- 7 Congress finds the following:
- 8 (1) In the past several years, United States
- 9 crude oil refineries have grown their coking capacity

- to accommodate the conversion of heavy crude oils
  into refined petroleum products.
- 3 (2) As coking capacity has grown, the domestic 4 production of petroleum coke is expected to grow, 5 leading to increases in the storage, transportation, 6 and use of the material.
- 7 (3) In Detroit, piles of petroleum coke have 8 been stored in the open air on the banks of the De-9 troit River.
  - (4) Uncovered piles of petroleum coke have also been stored in Southeast Chicago near homes and local baseball fields.
- 13 (5) State regulators, communities, and industry 14 stakeholders would benefit from a complete under-15 standing of petroleum coke and the potential impact 16 on public health and the environment related to the 17 production, transportation, storage, and use of pe-18 troleum coke.

### 19 SEC. 3. STUDY OF PETROLEUM COKE PUBLIC HEALTH AND

### 20 ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACTS.

- 21 (a) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 180 days after the 22 date of enactment of this Act, the Secretary of Health and
- 23 Human Services, in consultation with the Administrator
- 24 of the Environmental Protection Agency, the Secretary of
- 25 Transportation, and the Secretary of Energy, shall submit

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- 1 to Congress a report containing the results of a study con-
- 2 cerning petroleum coke that includes the following:
- 3 (1) An analysis of the public health and envi-
- 4 ronmental impacts of the production, transportation,
- 5 storage, and use of petroleum coke.
- 6 (2) An assessment of potential approaches and
- 7 best practices for storing, transporting, and man-
- 8 aging petroleum coke.
- 9 (3) A quantitative analysis of current and pro-
- jected domestic petroleum coke production and utili-
- 11 zation locations.
- 12 (b) Best Available Science.—The study under
- 13 subsection (a) shall be carried out using the best available
- 14 science, including readily available information from ap-
- 15 propriate State agencies, nonprofit entities, academic enti-
- 16 ties, and industry.
- 17 (c) Publication of Report.—Not later than 180
- 18 days after the date of enactment of this Act, the Secretary
- 19 of Health and Human Services shall publish on the Inter-
- 20 net website of the Department of Health and Human
- 21 Services the report described in subsection (a).
- 22 SEC. 4. IMPLEMENTATION OF STANDARDS.
- Not later than one year after the date of enactment
- 24 of this Act, the Administrator of the Environmental Pro-
- 25 tection Agency, in consultation with the Secretary of

- 1 Transportation, shall promulgate rules concerning the
- 2 storage and transportation of petroleum coke that ensure
- 3 the protection of public and ecological health based upon

4 the findings of the study conducted under section 3.

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
