A BILL

To require the Attorney General to study whether an individual's history of domestic violence can be used to determine the likelihood of such individual committing a mass shooting.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

1 **SECTION 1. STUDY ON WHETHER AN INDIVIDUAL'S HIS-**
2 **TORY OF DOMESTIC VIOLENCE CAN BE USED**
3 **TO DETERMINE THE LIKELIHOOD OF SUCH**
4 **INDIVIDUAL COMMITTING A MASS SHOOTING.**

5 Not later than 12 months after the date of enactment
6 of this Act, the Attorney General of the United States
7 shall complete a study and submit a report to the Con-
8 gress on whether an individual's history of domestic vio-
9 lence can be used to determine the likelihood of such indi-
10 vidual committing a mass shooting.

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
