AN ACT

To reauthorize the United States Anti-Doping Agency, and
for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

1 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

2 This Act may be cited as the “United States Anti-
3 Doping Agency Reauthorization Act of 2020”.

4 **SEC. 2. PROMOTION OF YOUTH SPORTS.**

5 Section 701(b) of the Office of National Drug Control
6 Policy Reauthorization Act of 2006 (21 U.S.C. 2001(b))
7 is amended—

8 (1) in paragraph (4), by striking the period at
9 the end and inserting “; and”; and

10 (2) by adding at the end the following:

11 “(5) promote a positive youth sport experience
12 by using a portion of its funding to provide edu-
13 cational materials on sportsmanship, character
14 building, and healthy performance for athletes, par-
15 ents, and coaches participating in youth sports.”.

16 **SEC. 3. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.**

17 Section 703 of the Office of National Drug Control
18 Policy Reauthorization Act of 2006 (21 U.S.C. 2003) is
19 amended to read as follows:

20 **“SEC. 703. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.**

21 “There are authorized to be appropriated to the
22 United States Anti-Doping Agency—

23 “(1) for fiscal year 2021, \$15,500,000;

24 “(2) for fiscal year 2022, \$16,200,000;

25 “(3) for fiscal year 2023, \$16,900,000;

26 “(4) for fiscal year 2024, \$17,700,000;

1 “(5) for fiscal year 2025, \$18,500,000;
2 “(6) for fiscal year 2026, \$21,900,000;
3 “(7) for fiscal year 2027, \$22,800,000;
4 “(8) for fiscal year 2028, \$24,900,000; and
5 “(9) for fiscal year 2029, \$23,700,000.”.

6 **SEC. 4. COORDINATION AND SHARING OF INFORMATION**
7 **WITH USADA.**

8 (a) INFORMATION SHARING.—Except as otherwise
9 prohibited by law and except in cases in which the integ-
10 rity of a criminal investigation would be affected, in fur-
11 therance of the obligation of the United States under Arti-
12 cle 7 of the Convention, the Attorney General, the Sec-
13 retary of Homeland Security, and the Commissioner of
14 Food and Drugs shall coordinate with the United States
15 Anti-Doping Agency with regard to any effort to prevent
16 the use of performance-enhancing drugs or prohibit per-
17 formance-enhancing methods by sharing with the United
18 States Anti-Doping Agency all information which may be
19 relevant to preventing the use of such performance-en-
20 hancing drugs or prohibiting such performance-enhancing
21 methods.

22 (b) CONVENTION DEFINED.—In this section, the
23 term “Convention” means the United Nations Edu-
24 cational, Scientific, and Cultural Organization Inter-
25 national Convention Against Doping in Sport done at

1 Paris October 19, 2005, and ratified by the United States
2 in 2008.
