Mr. HEINRICH (for himself and Mr. UDALL) introduced the following bill; which was read twice and referred to the Committee on Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs

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# A BILL

To require the Commissioner of U.S. Customs and Border Protection to acquire and enhance technology and assets in rural or remote areas near the southern border and to establish an Agent Mobility Demonstration Program.

1       *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-  
2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

**3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4       This Act may be cited as the “Remote Areas Border  
5 Security Enhancements Act”.

1   **SEC. 2. DEFINED TERM.**

2       In this Act, the term “rural or remote area” means  
3       an area within the United States along the international  
4       border between the United States and Mexico that is not  
5       within an area defined and designated by the Bureau of  
6       the Census as an urbanized area.

7   **SEC. 3. BORDER SECURITY ENHANCEMENTS IN MOUN-  
8    TAINOUS, HIGH DESERT, AND BACKCOUNTRY  
9    TERRAIN.**

10      (a) IN GENERAL.—Notwithstanding section 102 of  
11     the Illegal Immigration Reform and Immigrant Responsi-  
12     bility Act of 1996 (8 U.S.C. 1103 note; Public Law 104–  
13     208), the Secretary of Homeland Security may not begin  
14     the construction of any infrastructure project (including  
15     a pedestrian fence, vehicle barrier, levee, gate, wall, fence,  
16     road, or port of entry) along the international border be-  
17     tween the United States and Mexico until—

18          (1) the Comptroller General of the United  
19         States conducts a study that evaluates the need for  
20         enhanced technology and maintenance on existing  
21         equipment and other resources in rural or remote  
22         areas, prioritizing mountainous, high desert, and  
23         backcountry areas, including the estimated costs for  
24         carrying out the activities described in paragraph  
25         (2); and

- 1                             (2) the Commissioner of U.S. Customs and  
2                             Border Protection—  
3                                 (A) increases the use of advanced detection  
4                             and surveillance technology;  
5                                 (B) acquires fixed and mobile technology  
6                             assets, including night vision technology;  
7                                 (C) increases and improves interoperable  
8                             communications;  
9                                 (D) acquires and deploys such additional  
10                            horses and off-road vehicles, including all-ter-  
11                            rain vehicles, as may be necessary to provide  
12                            for enhanced security in rural or remote areas  
13                            near the international border between the  
14                            United States and Mexico;  
15                                 (E) increases and upgrades facilities to the  
16                            extent necessary to accommodate personnel and  
17                            asset needs, including horse patrol facilities;  
18                            and  
19                                 (F) performs any maintenance and care  
20                            that may be necessary to preserve the oper-  
21                            ational capability of all mountainous, high  
22                            desert, and backcountry assets, including tech-  
23                            nology assets, vehicles, forward operating bases,  
24                            and horse patrol facilities.

1       (b) REQUIREMENTS.—In carrying out subsection (a),  
2 the Commissioner shall—  
3           (1) consult with agents in the field; and  
4           (2) prioritize the deployment of such technology  
5 based on the needs of remote stations and forward  
6 operating bases in rural or remote areas near the  
7 international border between the United States and  
8 Mexico.

9 **SEC. 4. REPORT.**

10      Not later than 1 year after the date of the enactment  
11 of this Act, the Commissioner shall submit a report to the  
12 appropriate congressional committees that describes the  
13 implementation of section 3, including—  
14           (1) the assets deployed in rural or remote areas  
15 near the international border between the United  
16 States and Mexico; and  
17           (2) the expenditures incurred to acquire and de-  
18 ploy such assets.

19 **SEC. 5. AGENT MOBILITY DEMONSTRATION PROGRAM.**

20      (a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary of Homeland Secu-  
21 rity shall establish a 5-year pilot program in the El Paso  
22 Sector, to be known as the “Agent Mobility Program”,  
23 under which agents assigned within the El Paso Sector  
24 may laterally transfer to a designated, hard-to-fill station  
25 within the El Paso Sector for a period of at least 3 years.

1       (b) COMPLETION OF SERVICE.—Any agent who com-  
2 pletes 3 years of service at a hard-to-fill station to which  
3 he or she transferred under the program established under  
4 paragraph (1)—

5                 (1) shall be presented to the selecting officer as  
6 a preferred agent; and

7                 (2) shall be eligible to transfer to 1 of 3 border  
8 patrol stations in the El Paso Sector of his or her  
9 choice that has an opening at the time of such  
10 transfer.

11 **SEC. 6. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.**

12       In addition to amounts otherwise authorized to be ap-  
13 propriated, there is authorized to be appropriated, to U.S.  
14 Customs and Border Protection, the amount determined  
15 to be necessary under the study required under section  
16 3(a)(1) to carry out the activities described in section  
17 3(a)(2).
