AN ACT

To designate methamphetamine as an emerging threat, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

2	This Act may be cited as the "Methamphetamine Re-
3	sponse Act of 2020".

4 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.

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- 5 Congress finds the following:
- 6 (1) Methamphetamine poses a significant public 7 health and safety threat and qualifies as an emerg-8 ing drug threat, as defined in section 702 of the Of-9 fice of National Drug Control Policy Reauthorization 10 Act of 1998 (21 U.S.C. 1701).
 - (2) Methamphetamine treatment admissions increased from 15.1 percent of all admissions in 2008 to 23.6 percent in 2017, the latest year for which data is available.
 - (3) During the timeframe described in paragraph (2)—
 - (A) methamphetamine-related treatment admissions among women increased from 19.2 percent of all drug-related treatment admissions to 28.3 percent; and
 - (B) heroin use among those admitted for methamphetamine-related treatment increased from 5.3 percent to 23.6 percent.
 - (4) By the end of 2019, methamphetamine availability, use, purity, and potency had increased nationally, as street-level prices declined.

1	(5) Methamphetamine use is a nationwide issue.
2	Its use remains widespread in Midwest and Western
3	States and is becoming increasingly prevalent in
4	Northeastern States.
5	(6) Methamphetamine is the drug most often
6	associated with violent crime.
7	(7) According to the Centers for Disease Con-
8	trol and Prevention—
9	(A) between 2018 and 2019, drug overdose
10	deaths involving methamphetamine and other
11	stimulants increased by 27 percent nationally;
12	(B) the number of deaths described in sub-
13	paragraph (A) increased in 27 of the 38 States
14	that provide drug-specific overdose data to the
15	Centers for Disease Control and Prevention;
16	and
17	(C) between January 2019 and January
18	2020, among 36 States and the District of Co-
19	lumbia, suspected stimulant overdoses, includ-
20	ing methamphetamine, treated in emergency de-
21	partments increased by 23 percent.
22	(8) Methamphetamine-related overdose deaths
23	will likely continue to increase in 2020, due in part
24	to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, which makes

- obtaining treatment for substance use disorders, including methamphetamine use, more difficult.
 - (9) The increase in methamphetamine use and the negative respiratory and pulmonary health effects associated with its use has caused the National Institute on Drug Abuse to warn clinicians to be prepared to monitor adverse effects when treating individuals using methamphetamine who also have COVID-19.
 - (10) Since the onset of COVID-19 in the United States, the number of law enforcement and first responder agencies entering data into nation-wide overdose mapping applications to track real-time suspected overdoses, including methamphet-amine overdoses, has increased.
 - (11) In the first 9 months of fiscal year 2020, there was a 52 percent increase in the amount of methamphetamine seized by U.S. Customs and Border Protection.
 - (12) Public reports indicate that Mexican cartels may be stockpiling money and illicit drugs, including methamphetamine, on both sides of the Southwest Border and that the Drug Enforcement Administration is preparing to respond to any potential surge in supply.

- 1 (13) Intentional preparation to counter any
- 2 surges in production, distribution, and use are essen-
- 3 tial in lowering methamphetamine-related overdose
- 4 deaths and substance use disorders.

5 SEC. 3. DECLARATION OF EMERGING THREAT.

- 6 (a) In General.—Congress declares methamphet-
- 7 amine an emerging drug threat, as defined in section 702
- 8 of the Office of National Drug Control Policy Reauthor-
- 9 ization Act of 1998 (21 U.S.C. 1701), in the United
- 10 States.
- 11 (b) REQUIRED EMERGING THREAT RESPONSE
- 12 Plan.—Not later than 90 days after the date of enact-
- 13 ment of this Act, the Director of the Office of National
- 14 Drug Control Policy shall establish and implement an
- 15 Emerging Threat Response Plan that is specific to meth-
- 16 amphetamine in accordance with section 709(d) of the Of-
- 17 fice of National Drug Control Policy Reauthorization Act
- 18 of 1998 (21 U.S.C. 1708(d)).
