A BILL

To designate and expand wilderness areas in Olympic National Forest in the State of Washington, and to designate certain rivers in Olympic National Forest and Olympic National Park as wild and scenic rivers, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

1 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

2 This Act may be cited as the “Wild Olympics Wilder-
3 ness and Wild and Scenic Rivers Act”.

4 **SEC. 2. DESIGNATION OF OLYMPIC NATIONAL FOREST WIL-
5 DERNESS AREAS.**

6 (a) IN GENERAL.—In furtherance of the Wilderness
7 Act (16 U.S.C. 1131 et seq.), the following Federal land
8 in the Olympic National Forest in the State of Wash-
9 ington comprising approximately 126,554 acres, as gen-
10 erally depicted on the map entitled “Proposed Wild Olym-
11 pics Wilderness and Wild and Scenic Rivers Act” and
12 dated April 8, 2019 (referred to in this section as the
13 “map”), is designated as wilderness and as components
14 of the National Wilderness Preservation System:

15 (1) LOST CREEK WILDERNESS.—Certain Fed-
16 eral land managed by the Forest Service, comprising
17 approximately 7,159 acres, as generally depicted on
18 the map, which shall be known as the “Lost Creek
19 Wilderness”.

20 (2) RUGGED RIDGE WILDERNESS.—Certain
21 Federal land managed by the Forest Service, com-
22 prising approximately 5,956 acres, as generally de-
23 picted on the map, which shall be known as the
24 “Rugged Ridge Wilderness”.

25 (3) ALCKEE CREEK WILDERNESS.—Certain
26 Federal land managed by the Forest Service, com-

1 prising approximately 1,787 acres, as generally de-
2 picted on the map, which shall be known as the
3 “Alckee Creek Wilderness”.

4 (4) GATES OF THE ELWHA WILDERNESS.—Cer-
5 tain Federal land managed by the Forest Service,
6 comprising approximately 5,669 acres, as generally
7 depicted on the map, which shall be known as the
8 “Gates of the Elwha Wilderness”.

9 (5) BUCKHORN WILDERNESS ADDITIONS.—Cer-
10 tain Federal land managed by the Forest Service,
11 comprising approximately 21,965 acres, as generally
12 depicted on the map, is incorporated in, and shall be
13 managed as part of, the “Buckhorn Wilderness”, as
14 designated by section 3 of the Washington State
15 Wilderness Act of 1984 (16 U.S.C. 1132 note; Pub-
16 lic Law 98–339).

17 (6) GREEN MOUNTAIN WILDERNESS.—Certain
18 Federal land managed by the Forest Service, com-
19 prising approximately 4,790 acres, as generally de-
20 picted on the map, which shall be known as the
21 “Green Mountain Wilderness”.

22 (7) THE BROTHERS WILDERNESS ADDITIONS.—
23 Certain land managed by the Forest Service, com-
24 prising approximately 8,625 acres, as generally de-
25 picted on the map, is incorporated in, and shall be

1 managed as part of, the “The Brothers Wilderness”,
2 as designated by section 3 of the Washington State
3 Wilderness Act of 1984 (16 U.S.C. 1132 note; Pub-
4 lic Law 98–339).

5 (8) MOUNT SKOKOMISH WILDERNESS ADDI-
6 TIONS.—Certain land managed by the Forest Serv-
7 ice, comprising approximately 8,933 acres, as gen-
8 erally depicted on the map, is incorporated in, and
9 shall be managed as part of, the “Mount Skokomish
10 Wilderness”, as designated by section 3 of the
11 Washington State Wilderness Act of 1984 (16
12 U.S.C. 1132 note; Public Law 98–339).

13 (9) WONDER MOUNTAIN WILDERNESS ADDI-
14 TIONS.—Certain land managed by the Forest Serv-
15 ice, comprising approximately 26,517 acres, as gen-
16 erally depicted on the map, is incorporated in, and
17 shall be managed as part of, the “Wonder Mountain
18 Wilderness”, as designated by section 3 of the
19 Washington State Wilderness Act of 1984 (16
20 U.S.C. 1132 note; Public Law 98–339).

21 (10) MOONLIGHT DOME WILDERNESS.—Certain
22 Federal land managed by the Forest Service, com-
23 prising approximately 9,117 acres, as generally de-
24 picted on the map, which shall be known as the
25 “Moonlight Dome Wilderness”.

1 (11) SOUTH QUINAULT RIDGE WILDERNESS.—
2 Certain Federal land managed by the Forest Serv-
3 ice, comprising approximately 10,887 acres, as gen-
4 erally depicted on the map, which shall be known as
5 the “South Quinault Ridge Wilderness”.

6 (12) COLONEL BOB WILDERNESS ADDITIONS.—
7 Certain Federal land managed by the Forest Serv-
8 ice, comprising approximately 353 acres, as gen-
9 erally depicted on the map, is incorporated in, and
10 shall be managed as part of, the “Colonel Bob Wil-
11 derness”, as designated by section 3 of the Wash-
12 ington State Wilderness Act of 1984 (16 U.S.C.
13 1132 note; Public Law 98–339).

14 (13) SAMS RIVER WILDERNESS.—Certain Fed-
15 eral land managed by the Forest Service, comprising
16 approximately 13,418 acres, as generally depicted on
17 the map, which shall be known as the “Sams River
18 Wilderness”.

19 (14) CANOE CREEK WILDERNESS.—Certain
20 Federal land managed by the Forest Service, com-
21 prising approximately 1,378 acres, as generally de-
22 picted on the map, which shall be known as the
23 “Canoe Creek Wilderness”.

24 (b) ADMINISTRATION.—

1 (1) MANAGEMENT.—Subject to valid existing
2 rights, the land designated as wilderness by sub-
3 section (a) shall be administered by the Secretary of
4 Agriculture (referred to in this section as the “Sec-
5 retary”), in accordance with the Wilderness Act (16
6 U.S.C. 1131 et seq.), except that any reference in
7 that Act to the effective date of that Act shall be
8 considered to be a reference to the date of enact-
9 ment of this Act.

10 (2) MAP AND DESCRIPTION.—

11 (A) IN GENERAL.—As soon as practicable
12 after the date of enactment of this Act, the Sec-
13 retary shall file a map and a legal description
14 of the land designated as wilderness by sub-
15 section (a) with—

16 (i) the Committee on Natural Re-
17 sources of the House of Representatives;
18 and

19 (ii) the Committee on Energy and
20 Natural Resources of the Senate.

21 (B) EFFECT.—Each map and legal de-
22 scription filed under subparagraph (A) shall
23 have the same force and effect as if included in
24 this Act, except that the Secretary may correct
25 minor errors in the map and legal description.

1 (C) PUBLIC AVAILABILITY.—Each map
2 and legal description filed under subparagraph
3 (A) shall be filed and made available for public
4 inspection in the appropriate office of the For-
5 est Service.

6 (c) POTENTIAL WILDERNESS.—

7 (1) IN GENERAL.—In furtherance of the pur-
8 poses of the Wilderness Act (16 U.S.C. 1131 et
9 seq.), certain Federal land managed by the Forest
10 Service, comprising approximately 5,346 acres as
11 identified as “Potential Wilderness” on the map, is
12 designated as potential wilderness.

13 (2) DESIGNATION AS WILDERNESS.—On the
14 date on which the Secretary publishes in the Federal
15 Register notice that any nonconforming uses in the
16 potential wilderness designated by paragraph (1)
17 have terminated, the potential wilderness shall be—

18 (A) designated as wilderness and as a com-
19 ponent of the National Wilderness Preservation
20 System; and

21 (B) incorporated into the adjacent wilder-
22 ness area.

23 (d) ADJACENT MANAGEMENT.—

24 (1) NO PROTECTIVE PERIMETERS OR BUFFER
25 ZONES.—The designations in this section shall not

1 create a protective perimeter or buffer zone around
2 any wilderness area.

3 (2) NONCONFORMING USES PERMITTED OUT-
4 SIDE OF BOUNDARIES OF WILDERNESS AREAS.—Any
5 activity or use outside of the boundary of any wilder-
6 ness area designated under this section shall be per-
7 mitted even if the activity or use would be seen or
8 heard within the boundary of the wilderness area.

9 (e) FIRE, INSECTS, AND DISEASES.—The Secretary
10 may take such measures as are necessary to control fire,
11 insects, and diseases, in the wilderness areas designated
12 by this section, in accordance with section 4(d)(1) of the
13 Wilderness Act (16 U.S.C. 1133(d)(1)) and subject to
14 such terms and conditions as the Secretary determines to
15 be appropriate.

16 **SEC. 3. WILD AND SCENIC RIVER DESIGNATIONS.**

17 (a) IN GENERAL.—Section 3(a) of the Wild and Sce-
18 nic Rivers Act (16 U.S.C. 1274(a)) is amended by adding
19 at the end the following:

20 “(233) ELWHA RIVER, WASHINGTON.—The ap-
21 proximately 29.0-mile segment of the Elwha River
22 and tributaries from the source to Cat Creek, to be
23 administered by the Secretary of the Interior as a
24 wild river.

1 “(234) DUNGENESS RIVER, WASHINGTON.—
2 The segment of the Dungeness River from the head-
3 waters to the State of Washington Department of
4 Natural Resources land in T. 29 N., R. 4 W., sec.
5 12, to be administered by the Secretary of Agri-
6 culture, except that portions of the river within the
7 boundaries of Olympic National Park shall be ad-
8 ministered by the Secretary of the Interior, including
9 the following segments of the mainstem and major
10 tributary the Gray Wolf River, in the following class-
11 es:

12 “(A) The approximately 5.8-mile segment
13 of the Dungeness River from the headwaters to
14 the 2870 Bridge, as a wild river.

15 “(B) The approximately 2.1-mile segment
16 of the Dungeness River from the 2870 Bridge
17 to Silver Creek, as a scenic river.

18 “(C) The approximately 2.7-mile segment
19 of the Dungeness River from Silver Creek to
20 Sleepy Hollow Creek, as a wild river.

21 “(D) The approximately 6.3-mile segment
22 of the Dungeness River from Sleepy Hollow
23 Creek to the Olympic National Forest bound-
24 ary, as a scenic river.

1 “(E) The approximately 1.9-mile segment
2 of the Dungeness River from the National For-
3 est boundary to the State of Washington De-
4 partment of Natural Resources land in T. 29
5 N., R. 4 W., sec. 12, to be administered as a
6 recreational river through a cooperative man-
7 agement agreement between the State of Wash-
8 ington and the Secretary of Agriculture, as pro-
9 vided in section 10(e).

10 “(F) The approximately 16.1-mile segment
11 of the Gray Wolf River from the headwaters to
12 the 2870 Bridge, as a wild river.

13 “(G) The approximately 1.1-mile segment
14 of the Gray Wolf River from the 2870 Bridge
15 to the confluence with the Dungeness River, as
16 a scenic river.

17 “(235) BIG QUILCENE RIVER, WASHINGTON.—
18 The segment of the Big Quilcene River from the
19 headwaters to the City of Port Townsend water in-
20 take facility, to be administered by the Secretary of
21 Agriculture, in the following classes:

22 “(A) The approximately 4.4-mile segment
23 from the headwaters to the Buckhorn Wilder-
24 ness boundary, as a wild river.

1 “(B) The approximately 5.3-mile segment
2 from the Buckhorn Wilderness boundary to the
3 City of Port Townsend water intake facility, as
4 a scenic river.

5 “(C) Section 7(a), with respect to the li-
6 censing of dams, water conduits, reservoirs,
7 powerhouses, transmission lines, or other
8 project works, shall apply to the approximately
9 5-mile segment from the City of Port Townsend
10 water intake facility to the Olympic National
11 Forest boundary.

12 “(236) DOSEWALLIPS RIVER, WASHINGTON.—
13 The segment of the Dosewallips River from the
14 headwaters to the private land in T. 26 N., R. 3 W.,
15 sec. 15, to be administered by the Secretary of Agri-
16 culture, except that portions of the river within the
17 boundaries of Olympic National Park shall be ad-
18 ministered by the Secretary of the Interior, in the
19 following classes:

20 “(A) The approximately 12.9-mile segment
21 from the headwaters to Station Creek, as a wild
22 river.

23 “(B) The approximately 6.8-mile segment
24 from Station Creek to the private land in T. 26
25 N., R. 3 W., sec. 15, as a scenic river.

1 “(237) DUCKABUSH RIVER, WASHINGTON.—
2 The segment of the Duckabush River from the head-
3 waters to the private land in T. 25 N., R. 3 W., sec.
4 1, to be administered by the Secretary of Agri-
5 culture, except that portions of the river within the
6 boundaries of Olympic National Park shall be ad-
7 ministered by the Secretary of the Interior, in the
8 following classes:

9 “(A) The approximately 19.0-mile segment
10 from the headwaters to the Brothers Wilderness
11 boundary, as a wild river.

12 “(B) The approximately 1.9-mile segment
13 from the Brothers Wilderness boundary to the
14 private land in T. 25 N., R. 3 W., sec. 1, as
15 a scenic river.

16 “(238) HAMMA HAMMA RIVER, WASHINGTON.—
17 The segment of the Hamma Hamma River from the
18 headwaters to the eastern edge of the NW¹/₄ sec. 21,
19 T. 24 N., R. 3 W., to be administered by the Sec-
20 retary of Agriculture, in the following classes:

21 “(A) The approximately 3.1-mile segment
22 from the headwaters to the Mt. Skokomish Wil-
23 derness boundary, as a wild river.

1 “(B) The approximately 5.8-mile segment
2 from the Mt. Skokomish Wilderness boundary
3 to Lena Creek, as a scenic river.

4 “(C) The approximately 6.8-mile segment
5 from Lena Creek to the eastern edge of the
6 NW¹/₄ sec. 21, T. 24 N., R. 3 W., to be admin-
7 istered as a recreational river through a cooper-
8 ative management agreement between the State
9 of Washington and the Secretary of Agri-
10 culture, as provided in section 10(e).

11 “(239) SOUTH FORK SKOKOMISH RIVER, WASH-
12 INGTON.—The segment of the South Fork
13 Skokomish River from the headwaters to the Olym-
14 pic National Forest boundary to be administered by
15 the Secretary of Agriculture, in the following classes:

16 “(A) The approximately 6.7-mile segment
17 from the headwaters to Church Creek, as a wild
18 river.

19 “(B) The approximately 8.3-mile segment
20 from Church Creek to LeBar Creek, as a scenic
21 river.

22 “(C) The approximately 4.0-mile segment
23 from LeBar Creek to upper end of the gorge in
24 the NW¹/₄ sec. 22, T. 22 N., R. 5 W., as a rec-
25 reational river.

1 “(D) The approximately 6.0-mile segment
2 from the upper end of the gorge to the Olympic
3 National Forest boundary, as a scenic river.

4 “(240) MIDDLE FORK SATSOP RIVER, WASH-
5 INGTON.—The approximately 7.9-mile segment of
6 the Middle Fork Satsop River from the headwaters
7 to the Olympic National Forest boundary, to be ad-
8 ministered by the Secretary of Agriculture, as a sce-
9 nic river.

10 “(241) WEST FORK SATSOP RIVER, WASH-
11 INGTON.—The approximately 8.2-mile segment of
12 the West Fork Satsop River from the headwaters to
13 the Olympic National Forest boundary, to be admin-
14 istered by the Secretary of Agriculture, as a scenic
15 river.

16 “(242) WYNOOCHEE RIVER, WASHINGTON.—
17 The segment of the Wynoochee River from the head-
18 waters to the head of Wynoochee Reservoir to be ad-
19 ministered by the Secretary of Agriculture, except
20 that portions of the river within the boundaries of
21 Olympic National Park shall be administered by the
22 Secretary of the Interior, in the following classes:

23 “(A) The approximately 2.5-mile segment
24 from the headwaters to the boundary of the
25 Wonder Mountain Wilderness, as a wild river.

1 “(B) The approximately 7.4-mile segment
2 from the boundary of the Wonder Mountain
3 Wilderness to the head of Wynoochee Reservoir,
4 as a recreational river.

5 “(243) EAST FORK HUMPTULIPS RIVER, WASH-
6 INGTON.—The segment of the East Fork Humptu-
7 lips River from the headwaters to the Olympic Na-
8 tional Forest boundary to be administered by the
9 Secretary of Agriculture, in the following classes:

10 “(A) The approximately 7.4-mile segment
11 from the headwaters to the Moonlight Dome
12 Wilderness boundary, as a wild river.

13 “(B) The approximately 10.3-mile segment
14 from the Moonlight Dome Wilderness boundary
15 to the Olympic National Forest boundary, as a
16 scenic river.

17 “(244) WEST FORK HUMPTULIPS RIVER, WASH-
18 INGTON.—The approximately 21.4-mile segment of
19 the West Fork Humptulips River from the head-
20 waters to the Olympic National Forest Boundary, to
21 be administered by the Secretary of Agriculture, as
22 a scenic river.

23 “(245) QUINAULT RIVER, WASHINGTON.—The
24 segment of the Quinault River from the headwaters
25 to private land in T. 24 N., R. 8 W., sec. 33, to be

1 administered by the Secretary of the Interior, in the
2 following classes:

3 “(A) The approximately 16.5-mile segment
4 from the headwaters to Graves Creek, as a wild
5 river.

6 “(B) The approximately 6.7-mile segment
7 from Graves Creek to Cannings Creek, as a sce-
8 nic river.

9 “(C) The approximately 1.0-mile segment
10 from Cannings Creek to private land in T. 24
11 N., R. 8 W., sec. 33, as a recreational river.

12 “(246) QUEETS RIVER, WASHINGTON.—The
13 segment of the Queets River from the headwaters to
14 the Olympic National Park boundary to be adminis-
15 tered by the Secretary of the Interior, except that
16 portions of the river outside the boundaries of Olym-
17 pic National Park shall be administered by the Sec-
18 retary of Agriculture, including the following seg-
19 ments of the mainstem and certain tributaries in the
20 following classes:

21 “(A) The approximately 28.6-mile segment
22 of the Queets River from the headwaters to the
23 confluence with Sams River, as a wild river.

24 “(B) The approximately 16.0-mile segment
25 of the Queets River from the confluence with

1 Sams River to the Olympic National Park
2 boundary, as a scenic river.

3 “(C) The approximately 15.7-mile segment
4 of the Sams River from the headwaters to the
5 confluence with the Queets River, as a scenic
6 river.

7 “(D) The approximately 17.7-mile segment
8 of Matheny Creek from the headwaters to the
9 confluence with the Queets River, to be admin-
10 istered as a scenic river through a cooperative
11 management agreement between the State of
12 Washington and the Secretary of Agriculture,
13 as provided in section 10(e).

14 “(247) HOH RIVER, WASHINGTON.—The seg-
15 ment of the Hoh River and the major tributary
16 South Fork Hoh from the headwaters to Olympic
17 National Park boundary, to be administered by the
18 Secretary of the Interior, in the following classes:

19 “(A) The approximately 20.7-mile segment
20 of the Hoh River from the headwaters to Jack-
21 son Creek, as a wild river.

22 “(B) The approximately 6.0-mile segment
23 of the Hoh River from Jackson Creek to the
24 Olympic National Park boundary, as a scenic
25 river.

1 “(C) The approximately 13.8-mile segment
2 of the South Fork Hoh River from the head-
3 waters to the Olympic National Park boundary,
4 as a wild river.

5 “(D) The approximately 4.6-mile segment
6 of the South Fork Hoh River from the Olympic
7 National Park boundary to the Washington
8 State Department of Natural Resources bound-
9 ary in T. 27 N., R. 10 W., sec. 29, to be ad-
10 ministered as a recreational river through a co-
11 operative management agreement between the
12 State of Washington and the Secretary of Agri-
13 culture, as provided in section 10(e).

14 “(248) BOGACHIEL RIVER, WASHINGTON.—The
15 approximately 25.6-mile segment of the Bogachiel
16 River from the source to the Olympic National Park
17 boundary, to be administered by the Secretary of the
18 Interior, as a wild river.

19 “(249) SOUTH FORK CALAWAH RIVER, WASH-
20 INGTON.—The segment of the South Fork Calawah
21 River and the major tributary Sitkum River from
22 the headwaters to Hyas Creek to be administered by
23 the Secretary of Agriculture, except those portions
24 of the river within the boundaries of Olympic Na-
25 tional Park shall be administered by the Secretary

1 of the Interior, including the following segments in
2 the following classes:

3 “(A) The approximately 15.7-mile segment
4 of the South Fork Calawah River from the
5 headwaters to the Sitkum River, as a wild river.

6 “(B) The approximately 0.9-mile segment
7 of the South Fork Calawah River from the
8 Sitkum River to Hyas Creek, as a scenic river.

9 “(C) The approximately 1.6-mile segment
10 of the Sitkum River from the headwaters to the
11 Rugged Ridge Wilderness boundary, as a wild
12 river.

13 “(D) The approximately 11.9-mile segment
14 of the Sitkum River from the Rugged Ridge
15 Wilderness boundary to the confluence with the
16 South Fork Calawah, as a scenic river.

17 “(250) SOL DUC RIVER, WASHINGTON.—The
18 segment of the Sol Duc River from the headwaters
19 to the Olympic National Park boundary to be ad-
20 ministered by the Secretary of the Interior, including
21 the following segments of the mainstem and certain
22 tributaries in the following classes:

23 “(A) The approximately 7.0-mile segment
24 of the Sol Duc River from the headwaters to

1 the end of Sol Duc Hot Springs Road, as a wild
2 river.

3 “(B) The approximately 10.8-mile segment
4 of the Sol Duc River from the end of Sol Duc
5 Hot Springs Road to the Olympic National
6 Park boundary, as a scenic river.

7 “(C) The approximately 14.2-mile segment
8 of the North Fork Sol Duc River from the
9 headwaters to the Olympic Hot Springs Road
10 bridge, as a wild river.

11 “(D) The approximately 0.2-mile segment
12 of the North Fork Sol Duc River from the
13 Olympic Hot Springs Road bridge to the con-
14 fluence with the Sol Duc River, as a scenic
15 river.

16 “(E) The approximately 8.0-mile segment
17 of the South Fork Sol Duc River from the
18 headwaters to the confluence with the Sol Duc
19 River, as a scenic river.

20 “(251) LYRE RIVER, WASHINGTON.—The ap-
21 proximately 0.2-mile segment of the Lyre River from
22 Lake Crescent to the Olympic National Park bound-
23 ary, to be administered by the Secretary of the Inte-
24 rior as a scenic river.”.

1 (b) ~~EFFECT.—The amendment made by subsection~~
 2 ~~(a) does not affect valid existing water rights.~~

3 (b) *RESTORATION.—Consistent with the Wild and Sce-*
 4 *nic Rivers Act (16 U.S.C. 1271 et seq.) (including any regu-*
 5 *lations promulgated under that Act), the Secretary of the*
 6 *Interior or the Secretary of Agriculture, as applicable, may*
 7 *authorize, with respect to a river segment designated by the*
 8 *amendment made by subsection (a), an activity or a*
 9 *project, the primary purpose of which is—*

10 (1) *river restoration;*

11 (2) *the recovery of a species listed as endangered*
 12 *or threatened under the Endangered Species Act of*
 13 *1973 (16 U.S.C. 1531 et seq.); or*

14 (3) *restoring ecological and hydrological func-*
 15 *tion.*

16 (c) ~~UPDATES TO LAND AND RESOURCE MANAGE-~~
 17 ~~MENT PLANS.—~~

18 (1) ~~IN GENERAL.—Except as provided in para-~~
 19 ~~graph (2), not later than 3 years after the date of~~
 20 ~~enactment of this Act, the Secretary of Agriculture~~
 21 ~~shall, with respect to the designations made under~~
 22 ~~subsection (a) on lands under the jurisdiction of the~~
 23 ~~Secretary, incorporate such designations into up-~~
 24 ~~dated management plans for units of the National~~

1 Forest System in accordance with applicable laws
2 (including regulations).

3 (2) EXCEPTION.—The date specified in para-
4 graph (1) shall be 5 years after the date of enact-
5 ment of this Act if the Secretary of Agriculture—

6 (A) is unable to meet the requirement
7 under that paragraph by the date specified in
8 such paragraph; and

9 (B) not later than 3 years after the date
10 of enactment of this Act, includes in the De-
11 partment of Agriculture annual budget submis-
12 sion to Congress a request for additional sums
13 as may be necessary to meet the requirement of
14 that paragraph.

15 (3) COMPREHENSIVE MANAGEMENT PLAN RE-
16 QUIREMENTS.—Updated management plans under
17 paragraph (1) or (2) satisfy the requirements under
18 section 3(d) of the Wild and Scenic Rivers Act (16
19 U.S.C. 1274(d)).

20 **SEC. 4. EXISTING RIGHTS AND WITHDRAWAL.**

21 (a) IN GENERAL.—In accordance with section 12(b)
22 of the Wild and Scenic Rivers Act (16 U.S.C. 1283(b)),
23 nothing in this Act or the amendment made by section
24 3(a) affects or abrogates existing rights, privileges, or con-
25 tracts held by private parties, nor does this Act in any

1 way modify or direct the management, acquisition, or dis-
2 position of land managed by the Washington Department
3 of Natural Resources on behalf of the State of Wash-
4 ington.

5 (b) WITHDRAWAL.—Subject to valid existing rights,
6 the Federal land within the boundaries of the river seg-
7 ments designated by this Act and the amendment made
8 by section 3(a) is withdrawn from all forms of—

9 (1) entry, appropriation, or disposal under the
10 public land laws;

11 (2) location, entry, and patent under the mining
12 laws; and

13 (3) disposition under all laws relating to min-
14 eral and geothermal leasing or mineral materials.

15 **SEC. 5. TREATY RIGHTS.**

16 Nothing in this Act alters, modifies, diminishes, or
17 extinguishes the reserved treaty rights of any Indian Tribe
18 with hunting, fishing, gathering, and cultural or religious
19 rights as protected by a treaty.

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
