Mr. VASQUEZ (for himself and Mrs. KIGGANS of Virginia) introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure

A BILL

To require the Comptroller General of the United States to report on the use of unmanned aircraft systems and on systems developed to counter such unmanned aircraft systems by Federal, State, local, and Tribal agencies.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “Secure Our Skies
5 Drone Safety Act of 2025”.

1 **SEC. 2. REPORT.**

2 Not later than 1 year after the date of enactment
3 of this Act, the Comptroller General of the United States
4 shall complete a study, and submit to Congress a report
5 thereon, on the use of unmanned aircraft systems (herein-
6 after in this Act referred to as “UAS”) and on systems
7 developed to counter such unmanned aircraft systems by
8 Federal, State, local, and Tribal agencies. Such report
9 shall include the following:

10 (1) Recommendations for the following:

11 (A) What, if any, legal authorities and
12 what policies need to be changed to improve the
13 ability of such agencies to successfully counter
14 threats from such UAS.

15 (B) What actions need to be taken to bol-
16 ster the capabilities of the United States and its
17 allies to manufacture UAS and to simplify the
18 procurement process for UAS.

19 (2) Information about the following:

20 (A) The number of UAS deployed by Fed-
21 eral, State, local, and Tribal law enforcement
22 agencies as of the date of the report.

23 (B) For State, local, and Tribal agencies,
24 the number of UAS purchased from entities op-
25 erating within an adversarial nation (including
26 any countries included on the list set forth in

1 section 791.4 of title 15 of the Code of Federal
2 Regulations).

3 (C) How many UAS are domestically pro-
4 duced.

5 (D) Any cost restrictions that prevent law
6 enforcement agencies from expanding the use of
7 UAS produced in the United States or a nation
8 other than one referred to in subparagraph (B).

9 (E) How frequently UAS are used and for
10 what purposes.

11 (F) Whether the operators of UAS are
12 trained or certified in any way.

13 (G) What authorities, policies, or protocols
14 govern the use of UAS.

15 (H) What privacy protections or expecta-
16 tions are there regarding the use of UAS.

17 (I) What countermeasures or strategies
18 exist to counter UAS, and to what extent is
19 there a training or certification in their use.

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
