A BILL

To direct the Congressional Budget Office to conduct a study with respect to the long-term economic impact of Trump Administration immigration policies, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “Studying Disastrous
5 Impacts of Mass Deportation Act”.

1 **SEC. 2. CONGRESSIONAL BUDGET OFFICE STUDY ON ECO-**
2 **NOMIC IMPACT OF TRUMP ADMINISTRATION**
3 **IMMIGRATION POLICIES.**

4 (a) IN GENERAL.—Not later than the earlier of the
5 date that is 180 days after the date of the enactment of
6 this Act or the last day of the One Hundred Nineteenth
7 Congress, the Director of the Congressional Budget Office
8 shall, in collaboration with the Council of Economic Advis-
9 ers, conduct and make publicly available a study with re-
10 spect to the long-term economic impact of the immigration
11 policies implemented and in effect beginning on January
12 20, 2025.

13 (b) ELEMENTS.—The study conducted under sub-
14 section (a) shall assess the twenty to forty year economic
15 impact of the immigration policies described in subsection
16 (a), which shall include the economic impact as a result
17 of—

18 (1) specific industry breakdowns (including but
19 not limited to public sector, service workers, farm
20 workers, healthcare workers, and innovation and re-
21 tention with respect to the academic and profes-
22 sional disciplines of science, technology, engineering,
23 and mathematics);

24 (2) the impacts on public safety and crime due
25 to pervasive fear;

1 (3) immigration flows out of the country and
2 overall demographic changes;

3 (4) effects on productivity and technological in-
4 novation, remittances, consumer spending and in-
5 vestment, and GDP contribution;

6 (5) effects on small businesses; and

7 (6) effects on tax revenue due to the net fiscal
8 impact of mass deportation at the Federal, State,
9 and local level.

10 (c) DATA SHARING REQUIREMENT.—The Depart-
11 ment of Homeland Security, the Bureau of Labor Statis-
12 tics, and the Internal Revenue Service shall, upon request
13 from the Director of the Congressional Budget Office,
14 share such data with the Director as the Director deter-
15 mines necessary and appropriate to conduct the study
16 under subsection (a).

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
