amendment. Finally, the rule provides one motion to recommit, with or without instructions.

Two Budget Act points of order lie against the bill: section 303(a) for revenue changes preempting the coming budget resolution for fiscal year 1996; and section 311(a) for breaching the five-year revenue floor. Those points of order would also lie against the amendment in the nature of a substitute made in order as base text as well as the Gephardt substitute. In addition, both substitutes require a waiver of clause 7 of rule XVI, germaneness, since they contain matters from unrelated bills to offset the revenue losses; and the base text substitute requires a waiver of clause 5(a) of rule XXI, prohibiting appropriations in a legislative bill, because of its disposition of the Uranium Enrichment Corporation appropriations. Because all three vehicles may have other vulnerabilities, the Committee waived all points of order out of caution.
