Accordingly the House resolved itself into the Committee of the Whole House on the State of the Union for the consideration of the bill (H.R. 3120) to amend title 18, United States Code, with respect to witness retaliation, witness tampering, and jury tampering, with Mr. LATOURETTE in the chair.

The Clerk read the title of the bill. The SPEAKER pro tempore. Pursu-

ant to the rule, the bill is considered as having been read the first time.

Under the rules the gentleman from Florida [Mr. McCollum] and the gentleman from Michigan [Mr. CONYERS] will each be recognized for 30 minutes.

Mr. McCOLLUM. Mr. Chairman, I yield myself such time as I may

consume. Mr. Chairman, in recent years, criminal sentences have increased in re-

sponse to the scourge of drugs and violent crime, yet the penalties for retaliating against or tampering with witnesses, jurors, and court officials in criminal cases have remained unchanged. Some Federal and State prosecutors blame witness intimidation and juror tampering for the falling conviction rates in some parts of the country. Indeed, under current law, a defendant facing a Federal criminal sentence of 10 years or more may believe he or she is better off trying to influence the outcome of the trial by intimidating a witness, or tampering with a juror or court officer, because the maximum punishment for such crime is generally 10 years in prison.
