We need to change our campaign finance system and we cannot get a bill to do it. They want to increase influence. Not one of their Members will come down and defend their bill. America is watching today, and Republicans will pay the price in November.

Mr. FLAKE. Mr. Chairman, this morning I returned to J.F. Kennedy Airport, which is in my district, to be with the families of those who were downed in Flight 800. Thus, I missed the following votes: rollcall No. 357, I would have voted "yes"; rollcall No. 358, I would have voted "no"; rollcall No. 359, I would have voted "yes"; on final passage, I would have voted "yes"; and on the previous question, I would have voted "yes." (Mr. JACOBS asked and was given

permission to speak out of order.)
