In the event that it is necessary to do so on Monday morning, we would reconvene the House at 10 a.m. for the purpose of passing a 1-day CR. Should it continue to be necessary to do so, we would reconvene the House at 6 o'clock p.m. on Tuesday for the purpose of passing a 1-day CR.

Members šhould be advised, course, throughout all of this time frame the appropriators will continue to work on the last remaining appropriations bill, the Labor, Health and Human Services bill. Our appropriators will work on that over the weekend and, if necessary, will continue their work into the week.

On Monday, the House, of course, awaits the successful completion of that work and negotiation between the House the other body and the White House.
