Bill Green represented the east side of Manhattan in Congress for seven terms, from 1978 through 1992. He was dedicated to the liberal Republican tradition of Mayor John Lindsey and Governor Nelson A. Rockefeller.

His memorial service will take place on Thursday, October 18, at 11:30 at Temple Emanu-El in Manhattan. Bill Green's passing marks the end of an era in east side politics. Known for his gracious manner and genuine courtesy, Bill Green was the essence of the American tradition of political civility.
