think we all feel sympathetic.

But for those folks in Arkansas, Alabama, Kentucky, Indiana, Mississippi. and Tennessee, once again we feel it very intensely. It is the road in front of our house today. As I ask for a moment of silence, I also want us to feel the community of our entire House and our entire country. I think we felt that as we have helped in other places. Again, I just remind Members that this happened in our area this time. It can happen in your area next time.
