#### VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN **REAUTHORIZATION ACT OF 2012**

#### H.R. 4970

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE. This Act may be cited as the "Violence

Against Women Reauthorization Act of 2012". SEC. 2. TABLE OF CONTENTS.
