IN HONOR OF 115TH CONGRESS HOUSE COMMITTEE ON APPRO-PRIATIONS

Mr. FRELINGHUYSEN. Mr. Speaker, for the past two years, it has been my immense honor to serve as Chairman of the House Committee on Appropriations.

This esteemed committee is charged with the "power of the purse" under the Constitution, and I did not take this responsibility lightly. In leading this committee, I had a singular focus on "getting our work done."

I am proud to say that in Fiscal Year 2019, we achieved something that hasn't been done in over two decades—passing five Appropriations bills ahead of the end of the fiscal year.

This is not a remarkable feat nor one that deserves applause. But it is historic, and it signifies that we were able to do what the American people sent us here to do: govern responsibly. This was a critical step in returning to the regular federal funding process.

These bills, which fund 75 percent of the federal government, included full funding for the Department of Defense and critical national security programs.

My deepest devotion has always been to our men and women in uniform, all volunteers—to ensure they have the resources they need to fight and succeed in our missions. For their service and sacrifice, they must know they have the full support of the government behind them. I am proud to say we achieved that, providing stability and predictability where there had been none for many years. And we were able to provide historic levels of funding for the care of our veterans who have served our nation.

Prior to this year, we laid the groundwork for this relative success. In Fiscal Year 2018, we passed all 12 bills in record time through "regular order," and three Disaster Supplemental Appropriations bills, historic in scope, to help our fellow citizens in their times of need.

It is the duty of Congress to help communities and families recover in times of great tragedy and emergencies, and the Appropriations Committee was consistently able to respond quickly and get resources into the hands of many communities, states, and regions of our nation.

We achieved this all through an open and transparent process. Over the past two years, we held 160 oversight and budget hearings, received and considered tens of thousands of requests from members, and brought many bills to the floor under an open amendment process. Of this, the committee should be very proud.

One of the hallmarks of the committee is the collegiality and bipartisan spirit in which our members work. Although we did not agree on everything, we all have great respect for the committee and our Constitutional duty to fund

the government. Working in this manner best serves our districts, our states, and our country.
