MADAM SPEAKER: Pursuant to the Bipartisan Budget Act of 2019 and Congressional Budget Act of 1974, I hereby submit for printing in the Congressional Record: (1) aggregate spending levels for fiscal year 2021 and aggregate revenue levels for fiscal year 2021 and for the period of fiscal years 2021 through 2030, (2) allocations for fiscal year 2021 for the House Committee on Appropriations, (3) committee allocations for fiscal year 2021 and for the period of fiscal years 2021 through 2030 for all committees other than the Committee on Appropriations, and (4) a list of discretionary accounts identified for advance appropriations in fiscal year 2021 appropriations bills. The authorizing committee allocation is divided into current law amounts and reauthorization. Reauthoriza-

tion refers to amounts assumed in CBO's baseline for legislation that would extend current law provisions.

This filing is made for technical purposes as required by the Bipartisan Budget Act of 2019, and the budgetary material published herein is for the purposes of enforcing titles III and IV of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974 and other budgetary enforcement provisions.
