HONORING MERLE T. SCHALL

American Campaign Medal, Asiatic Pacific Campaign Medal, World War II Victory Medal, the Honorable Service Lapel Pin, and the Gold Star Lapel Button.

It was an honor to celebrate his service and his life that he sacrificed to this country at the Indiana Courthouse that day.
