Mr. ROGERS of Kentucky. Madam Speaker, I rise today to pay tribute to the memory of Bill Patrick, a tenacious public servant from Eastern Kentucky, a beloved leader of the Kentucky County Attorneys Association, and a champion for drug control policies and addiction recovery efforts in the Commonwealth.

Bill wore many hats with great success, serving in various public offices from Powell County to the state capital. He was magnanimous by nature and unafraid to effect change at an early age. When he was 26 years old, he was elected Powell County Judge Executive, courageously edging out a long-time incumbent to become the state's youngest top county executor at the time. Before his second term ended, Governor Wallace Wilkinson appointed him Commissioner of Local Government. However, his fast-paced victories didn't come without challenges. Bill valiantly battled alcoholism and spent a lifetime helping others do the same, offering his personal support through the 12-step recovery program and visiting individuals when their struggles intensified. He passionately shared his own testimony, planting seeds of hope where it was needed the most. Bill proudly earned his 21-year Alcoholics Anonymous Medallion just weeks before his battle with cancer proved to be too great a feat.

Even though we stood on opposite sides of the political aisle, Bill was a loyal friend and a stalwart partner for programs that would improve the future of Eastern Kentucky. As former Director of Kentucky's Office of Drug

Control Policy, he was one of Operation UNITE's greatest allies, working diligently to develop life-saving efforts to drive down drug overdose death rates across Kentucky. It was evident that his own recovery fueled his courage of conviction as he led this arena with tremendous gratitude and humility.

We lost this Kentucky gentleman far too soon, but Bill's family and friends should be proud of the legacy he leaves behind. My wife Cynthia and I extend our heartfelt condolences to the Patrick family and we pray for God's peace and comfort in the days ahead.

Mr. LYNCH. Michael's long career in the fields of education, government and human services began with his first assignment as a Community Organizer in the D Street Housing Development followed by his role as Administrative Coordinator at the Condon Community School and culminating in his retirement this past June as President of the Urban College of Boston (UCB).

Michael took on the responsibility as President of UCB at a time when the College was in great financial distress and on the verge of closing. Over the course of his nearly ten-year tenure, Michael built strategic partnerships with businesses and government and community organizations which solidified UCB as an effective and responsive minority serving institution. As President, Michael successfully ad-

vocated for the elimination of all student debt through 2021 and at no time during his presidency was tuition raised, helping many students afford their education without the burden of student loans. He also launched a first in the country initiative in which UCB students could become certified clinical research coordinators.

Michael himself graduated from Boston State College before receiving a Master's in Education from Harvard University. Michael served in the administrations of three of Boston's Mayors—Kevin White, Raymond Flynn, and Thomas Menino. Michael also developed a strong partnership with Mayor Martin Walsh which resulted in the development of a new and dynamic UCB campus. Michael is known for his willingness to offer counsel and his efforts to afford opportunities to anyone interested in government and community service. His passion has always been to help others and to better his community.

Michael's love of his community is only exceeded by his love for his family and friends. The son of Irish immigrant parents, Robert and Dora Taylor, Michael grew up in South Boston with his seven siblings: Martha, Doretta, Thomas, Colleen, Roberta, Mark, and Maureen. Michael and his wife Janet are the proud parents of their daughter Sara Taylor, who now resides in North Carolina. Michael is also proud of the role he played in the raising of his stepson Daniel Harlow and his nephew Thomas Taylor.

Although Michael is retiring after five decades in education, government and human services, his impact on the people of the City of Boston will last far longer.

Born in Winston-Salem in 1945, Stan Bingham was a remarkable figure exemplifying much of what it means to be a resident of the Old North State. After earning a degree in forestry from North Carolina State University, he founded the Bingham Lumber Co. in 1979 in his adopted hometown of Denton. Stan was a fierce proponent of Davidson County and its residents. From 1990 until 1994, he served his community on the Davidson County Board of Commissioners, and in 1995, he formed the weekly local newspaper, the Denton Orator. In 2000, while still working as a businessowner and publisher, Stan was elected to the North Carolina Senate.

Serving eight terms in the state senate, Stan was a giant in North Carolina's legislature. He was a problem-solver, an individual who was convicted in his beliefs yet willing to work across the aisle to accomplish what was best for his constituents. He was instrumental in the successful effort to amend the state constitution to prohibit convicted felons from running for Sheriff, and he proposed the state's Good Samaritan Law to ensure overdose victims receive the medical care they need. Thanks to his help, the Davidson County communities of Wallburg and Midway have become incorporated townships. Stan was a friend to everyone, and he was always eager to help in any way he could.

HONORING SAN ANTONIO VETERAN, EDUCATOR, AND MUSICIAN ALFRED STURCHIO

Mr. CASTRO of Texas. Madam Speaker, today I rise in honor of Alfred Sturchio, who celebrated his 94th birthday on October 30, 2022. Mr. Sturchio—or as many in San Antonio call him, Al—is a quintessential example of leading through public service. Al Sturchio is a staunch defender of our nation's values and freedom, a passionate educator shaping our city's youth, and a musician who uses the power of sound to transcend any culture, religion, or race.

In May of 1951, Al Sturchio graduated from St. Mary's University in San Antonio, Texas, with a Bachelor of Music Education and a commission in the United States Army Reserves. After graduation, Hondo ISD hired him to begin their first band program—an all-girls Drum and Bugle Corp.

As Mr. Sturchio settled into his new role, he was called upon to bravely serve his country. On one Saturday in 1951, Mr. Sturchio went home to play golf, only to find a telegram reading "You will report on Oct. 31st to Fort Still Oklahoma, for active duty." He reported for duty, and on October 18, 1952, Mr. Sturchio was wounded in action while in Korea. He would spend the following two months in hospitals in Korea and Japan. Mr. Sturchio was discharged in May 1953 and received the distinguished Purple Heart Medal.

From January 1953 to June 1959, Mr. Sturchio began teaching at Sidney Lanier High School in San Antonio. He would lead the school's band to receive First Division during their first-ever UIL Marching Contest.

In the summer of 1959, Mr. Sturchio received a Master of Education degree and returned to his alma mater, St. Mary's University, to teach with his father, Frank G. Sturchio.

In 1966, Mr. Sturchio joined South San Antonio High School as band director and Coordinator of Music for South San Antonio ISD. He later accepted the band director position at Theodore High School in Northeast ISD, and after one year, became Vice-Principal for student discipline.

In 1977, Mr. Sturchio served as Grand Marshal during San Antonio's coveted Fiesta Flambeau Parade.

And in July 1985, Mr. Sturchio was given the distinct pleasure of serving as Executive Secretary of the Texas Bandmasters Association. In this role, he worked with the finest musicians in San Antonio and assisted band directors in improving skills with the association's educational offerings.

After thirty-four years of assisting students and teachers with their musical desires and abilities, Mr. Sturchio retired from teaching in June 1986.

Mr. Sturchio's contributions to music do not end in San Antonio. He has toured with Johnny Carson and Jack Benny; he's played the trumpet and conducted for the Ringling Brothers Circus, Ice Capades, the 1968 San Antonio World's Fair, Stevie Wonder, James Brown, Kenny Rodgers, Sonny and Cher, and many more.
