Ms. PELOSI. Mr. Speaker, I rise with overwhelming joy today in celebration of the fortieth anniversary of a beloved and iconic institution in my home City, SFJAZZ.

What began as a two-night Jazz in the City festival four decades ago has blossomed into one of our community's most cherished cultural wonders and a true national treasure. All are in awe of its world-class programming: producing more than 450 concerts every year, featuring artists from the Bay Area, from across America and from around the world. Through its committed focus on outreach and education, including the award-winning High School All-Stars initiative, SFJAZZ is also helping to foster the next generation of musical excellence.

Personally, it was my privilege to attend the grand opening of the SFJAZZ Center ten years ago—another special anniversary that we celebrate this year. This magnificent, state-of-the-art concert hall has quickly become our Nation's premier hub for jazz: not only a venue to enjoy glorious music, but also a training ground for young musicians to study their craft.

When the COVID pandemic struck, SFJAZZ swiftly pivoted to digital programming—lifting spirits by bringing beautiful music directly into people's homes, while helping keep our families safe. At the same time, through the SFJAZZ 50/50 Fund, the organization helped channel donations directly to artists during a difficult moment for the live entertainment industry.

As SFJAZZ marks four decades, San Franciscans—and all Americans—give thanks for the joy, beauty and vibrancy it continues to bring to our lives.

Mr. Speaker, I also rise today to pay tribute to Randall Kline: the visionary leader of SFJAZZ who made so much of its success possible and who is stepping down as Executive Artistic Director after an extraordinary forty-year career.

Randall's story is the stuff of legend: first hitch-hiking to San Francisco in 1974, then putting down roots by the Bay with just \$600 in his pocket, a bass and a dream. With a relentless work ethic and an inexhaustible imagination, he has transformed SFJAZZ from a community-based organization into a globally revered jazz powerhouse.

Our Nation owes him a debt of gratitude for the towering role that he has played in preserving and promoting an all-American art form. So, it is only fitting that Randall is honored with the SFJAZZ Lifetime Achievement Award, as his leadership has left an indelible mark on the cultural fabric of our City, our Country and our world.

On behalf of Randall's many friends in the Bay Area and beyond, we salute his four decades of dedicated service to our City and send best wishes on this joyful occasion as he prepares for his next adventure.

In 1819, Timothy S. Hopkins was elected the first supervisor for the Town of Amherst. He appointed two Constables, Joseph Hershey and Palmer Cleveland. These two men patrolled the present boundaries of Amherst (as well as portions of Cheektowaga). By 1883, the number of Town Constables had been increased to five. In 1924, the Town of Amherst Police and the Village of Williamsville Police merged, and by 1938, the department had grown to thirteen men. Since that time, the Town of Amherst Police has only continued to grow and meet the needs of their citizens in large part due to the help and representation of the Amherst Police Club.

The Amherst Police Club, Inc., is a non-profit organization that represents the sworn police officers of the Town of Amherst. They give back to the community and sponsor nu-

merous charitable causes, events, youth sports teams and youth activities that have a positive impact and touch the lives of those they serve and protect. They also host annual events for the community to benefit the Amherst Police Benevolent Association. The representation of our sworn police officers requires a deep understanding and appreciation of dedication to service, and for that, Amherst Police Club fits the bill.

Janna is well liked and respected in the 5Cities community in San Luis Obispo County. She has many agencies who consistently show support, donating their time and goods to the project she manages under the 5Cities Homeless Coalition. She has a strong connection to the Central Coast, and a proven track-record of community involvement through her partnerships with local restaurants, the Arroyo Grande Community Hospital, and other non-profit, state, and local agencies.

Janna has inspired change and empowered others by enabling her staff to know their clients and understand the situations that bring them to the 5Cities Homeless Coalition. Janna has created a safe place for people who are vulnerable in our community, developing a welcoming space to come and find the support they need.

I am honored to recognize Janna for her continued commitment to provide services and resources to individuals and families on the Central Coast. RECOGNIZING THE LIFE OF JOHN REED

Mr. KEATING. Mr. Speaker, I rise today in recognition of the life of John Reed, a history teacher, civil rights activist, and cherished member of the Cape Cod community.

The third of five children, John was born on September 28, 1950, to parents George and Rachel Reed. John was raised in Dorchester, Massachusetts. It was in this same the neighborhood where John first met his wife, Karen, in junior high. The two attended Dorchester High School together and had their first date at their junior year prom.

After graduating from Dorchester High School in 1968. John attended the University of Massachusetts Amherst, where he received both his bachelor's and master's in history and education. Tutoring his classmates and peers all throughout school, John always had a passion for mentoring and helping others from a voung age. John continued this passion as a teacher at Barnstable High School in 1973, where he taught history for 35 years. During his time at Barnstable High School, John served as a member of the Massachusetts Teachers Association and the National Education Association, as well as a member and the President of the Barnstable Teachers Association.

John constantly strove to support and better the lives of his students, especially his students of color. In 1993, John took on the role of Barnstable High School's attendance and equity officer. John also started the Imani Club, which celebrates and advocates for students of color at Barnstable High School. The club's name comes from the Swahili word for faith and belief. John's commitment to improving equity and diversity in schools did not go unnoticed, John was awarded the Human and Civil Rights Award from the Massachusetts Teachers Association in 1993 and the H. Councill Trenholm Memorial Award from the National Education Association in 2008.

John's efforts to further human and equal rights were not just limited to the classroom. John served as the President of the Cape Cod chapter of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) for 17 years from 1991 until 2008. Additionally, he founded the Barnstable County Human Rights Advisory Commission in 2005, as well as the Barnstable County Human Rights Academy for students across Cape Cod. John was also a co-founder of the Zion Union Heritage Museum in Hyannis, which celebrates the African American and Cape Verdean population on Cape Cod.

Sadly, John left us too soon on February 10, 2023, at the age of 72. A celebration of life is being held on April 29, 2023, to celebrate and reflect on the lasting impact John has left on the lives of his students and so many others across Cape Cod. Whether during his time at Barnstable High School, his years as the Cape Cod NAACP President, or his work with the Zion Union Heritage Museum, John's dedication to advancing civil rights and giving a voice to marginalized communities serves as an example to all.

Mr. Speaker, I am proud to honor the life of John Reed and ask that my colleagues join

me in recognizing his lifetime commitment to supporting and advocating for those in his community.
