Following which, Senate will continue consideration of the nomination of Dean Sauer, of Missouri, to be Solicitor General of the United States, and vote on confirmation thereon; to be followed by a vote on the motion to invoke cloture on the nomination of Mehmet Oz, of Pennsylvania, to be Administrator of the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services.

Following the cloture vote, Senator Sanders will be recognized to make two motions to discharge in relation to S.J. Res. 33, providing for congressional disapproval of the proposed foreign military sale to the Government of Israel of certain defense articles and services, and S.J. Res. 26, providing for congressional disapproval of the proposed foreign military sale to Israel of certain defense articles and services, at 2:30 p.m.

Following the votes on the motions to discharge, Senate will vote on confirmation of the nomination of Mehmet Oz, of Pennsylvania, to be Administrator of the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services, to be followed by a vote on confirmation of the nomination of Harmeet Dhillon, of California, to be an Assistant Attorney General. Finally, if made, Senate will vote on the motion to proceed to consideration of H. Con. Res. 14, Budget Resolution.
