In midlife, Ann joined her current community of The Church of Saint Leonard of Port Maurice, and became a successful insurance agent, which allowed for annual family reunions at Ruttger's Bay Lake Lodge.

An avid reader, Ann also melded her love of bridge and golf with her close friend group THE GABS, and, as a music lover, the Belfast Cowboys' summer concert at Lake Harriet was one of her favorite days of the year.

I ask my colleagues to join me in celebrating Ann Hanna Walsh and her remarkable achievement of 95 years worth of family, community, values, and faith.

Born in September 1943 and raised in the Browning Road community of Greenwood, Mr. Moore was shaped by the guidance of his father, a laborer and farmer, and his mother, an elementary school teacher. Their example instilled in him a deep respect for education, hard work, and public service.

Mr. Moore attended Browning Road Elementary School and graduated from Broad Street High School in 1961. He went on to pursue higher education at Morehouse Col-

lege in Atlanta, Georgia before answering the call to serve his country. In January 1963, he entered the United States Army, serving honorably until January 1966. He continued his military commitment in the U.S. Army Reserve from 1966 to 1969, the Air National Guard, and later as a Reservist in the United States Army Reserves to the Nation spanned more than sixteen years, culminating in his honorable discharge in June 1979.

After completing his active duty, Mr. Moore attended Jackson State University, graduated in 1968, and later earned a master's degree in counseling from Mississippi State University. In 1969, he began a distinguished career at the Mississippi State Employment Service, where he served as an Employment Placement Counselor, Area Supervisor for Job Corps, and Counselor for Veterans. Through these roles, Mr. Moore devoted himself to helping countless individuals secure employment, rebuild their lives, and access new opportunities.

Mr. Moore's service extended far beyond his professional life. He is a devoted member of Morning Star Missionary Baptist Church in the Browning Road community, where he serves faithfully as a Deacon and Sunday School teacher. He is also an active member of American Legion Post 29 in Greenwood, Mississippi, honoring and uplifting fellow veterans through ongoing service.

In addition, Mr. Moore contributes to local civic life as a part-time radio commentator, providing insight, information, and connections to members of the community. In his personal time, he enjoys raising cows, a pastime that reflected his roots and his love of the land.

Mr. Speaker, the life of Charles A. Moore is a powerful example of steadfast service—to his Nation, his community, and his fellow citizens. I ask my colleagues to join me in honoring his contributions and in expressing gratitude for his lifetime of dedication.

Mr. CLYBURN. Mr. Speaker, I rise today to honor the extraordinary life of Mother Essie M. Richards, a devoted woman of faith, a respected community leader, and a beloved matriarch who will celebrate her 100th birthday on January 26, 2026. Her century-long journey stands as a remarkable testament to service, perseverance, and unwavering faith.

Born the seventh of twelve children in Colleton County, South Carolina, Mother Richards was raised in a Christian home that instilled in her strong values of devotion, humility, and responsibility. She joined Jerusalem A.M.E. Church in 1937, beginning what would become more than eight decades of dedicated spiritual service.

After relocating to Savannah, Georgia, she joined Flipper Chapel A.M.E. Church, where she distinguished herself as a committed leader and servant of the church. She served as Sunday School Teacher and Superintendent, Church Secretary, Trustee, President of the Lay Organization and Flower Club, and sang faithfully in the Senior Choir. She worked tirelessly with the Missionary Society and Youth Department, earning well-deserved recognition in 2006 for outstanding humanitarian and community service.

Her faithful service continued when she transferred to Julia Fountain A.M.E. Church in

1986. Nearly twenty years later, in 2005, she returned home to Jerusalem A.M.E—now White Hall A.M.E.—under the leadership of Reverend Robert K. White, where she was appointed to the Steward Board.

Her professional life was marked by excellence and integrity. She spent 35 years as an Office Manager with the United States Air Force and the United States Army, gaining the respect and admiration of colleagues for her professionalism, reliability, and leadership.

Perhaps her most enduring legacy is her transformational impact on the Carver Heights Community, where she served from the late 1960's through 2006. She was Community President for 23 years and served as Community Secretary. She was a driving force behind the neighborhood's development into a thriving historic community. Her leadership helped bring about vital improvements, including the establishment of the Carver Heights Community Center—breaking ground in 1994 and opening in 1997.

Mother Richards led and supported countless initiatives: Neighborhood Watch and National Night Out, senior services, Meals on Wheels, youth programs, home repair projects, community beautification, historic research, block captain programs, and numerous acts of benevolence that strengthened families and neighborhoods.

Her decades of service earned her extensive recognition, including the 1995 Block Grant Award, the Environmental Justice Pioneer Award, multiple Outstanding Community Service Awards, National Exchange Club leadership honors, and numerous certificates of appreciation from the City of Savannah. Her family affectionately named her the "World's Greatest Grandmother" in 1994.

Mr. Speaker, I ask that you and our colleagues join me in celebrating the 100th birthday of Mother Essie M. Richards. Her life of faith, leadership, and community uplift continues to inspire all who know her, and her legacy will endure for generations.

Mr. MOSKOWITZ. Mr. Speaker, I rise today to recognize the Coral Springs/Parkland Deputy Fire Chief Michael Moser for more than two decades of an exceptional career and distinguished service to his department, his community, and the residents of Broward County.

Deputy Chief Moser's career began in August of 2000 when he first volunteered with the department, followed by his hiring in July 2001. From those early days, he demonstrated a commitment to service that would shape not only his career but the very culture of the department. Over the years, he has served with distinction as a Firefighter Paramedic, Driver Engineer, Lieutenant, Captain, and later as Division Chief, a role he assumed in 2014. In 2020, he was promoted to Deputy Chief, where he continued to exemplify professionalism, integrity, and leadership.

Throughout his exemplary career, Deputy Chief Moser has earned numerous commendations, including one Lifesaving Commendation, seven Unit Citations, one Meritorious Duty Commendation, two Administrative Service Commendations, and three Team Citations. He has been a dedicated member of multiple county committees, a founding member of the department's Honor Guard, and a board chairman of the Parkland 17 Memorial Foundation, ensuring the legacy of that community remains honored and remembered.

His service extends far beyond local boundaries. He has received numerous awards, including the Fire Chiefs Association of Broward County President's Award in both 2018 and 2022, EMT of the Year in 2005, and the Firehouse Magazine Heroism and Community Service Award in 2002.
