Mr. FITZPATRICK. Mr. Speaker, I rise today with a heavy heart, yet deep gratitude, to honor the life and legacy of Harvey Francis Cochran, a remarkable husband, father, grandfather, and friend, whose presence brought joy, laughter, and meaning to so many. Harvey passed away peacefully on Monday, December 22, 2025, at his home in Warrington, surrounded by the family he so deeply loved.

His Levittown home was surrounded by vibrant flowers and thriving vegetables, a reflection of the time, effort, and pride he invested in everything he touched.

Harvey was also a devoted Philadelphia sports fan, especially when it came to the Eagles, faithfully watching Sunday games and sharing in the highs and lows with those around him. Yet his love of sports went far be-

yond fandom. He valued mentorship and teamwork and gave his time generously as a coach. Known affectionately as “Coach Harv,” he left a lasting impact on countless young people, offering guidance, encouragement, and a steady presence on and off the field.

Above all, Harvey’s greatest joy was his family. He shared 54 loving years of marriage with his devoted wife, Ann Marie Cochran (McCaughey). Together, they built a life rooted in love, resilience, and unwavering support. He was a proud and loving father to Kevin Cochran and his wife Kirsten, Michelle Cunningham and her husband Jeff, and Brad Cochran and his wife Christine, and a deeply devoted grandfather to Jack, Molly, Jeffrey, Kaitlyn, Amanda, Cole, and Cali, each of whom brought him immense pride and happiness.

Harvey is also survived by his brother, Michael Cochran and his wife Maryanne, and was preceded in death by his parents and his brother, Daniel Cochran, whom he carried in his heart always.

Harvey Francis Cochran’s legacy is one of love, laughter, service, and generosity. His life reminds us that true impact is measured not only by years lived, but by lives touched. He will be deeply missed, fondly remembered, and forever cherished by those who knew him. INTRODUCTION OF THE POSTAL FACILITIES SECURITY CAMERA ACT

Ms. NORTON. Mr. Speaker, today, I introduce the Postal Facilities Security Camera Act. This bill would require, subject to appropriations, the United States Postal Service (USPS) to install security cameras at each postal facility to protect USPS employees, customers and property. This bill would also authorize appropriations to carry out the camera program.

I asked USPS to expand the use of security cameras at postal facilities in the District of Columbia and across the country after learning that a D.C. resident had been robbed in

the parking lot of a post office in D.C. The parking lot was not monitored by a security camera. USPS responded that it was not financially feasible to install and maintain security cameras at every postal facility.

USPS should have security cameras monitoring its facilities—both inside and outside—to protect employees, customers and property. Security cameras can deter crime and assist in arrests and prosecutions.

I urge my colleagues to support this bill.
