Mr. RASKIN. Mr. Speaker, we rarely take time to recognize the hundreds of public servants who, with great diligence, work behind the scenes to support this body's work for the American people. It is a surpassing honor today to praise my constituent William (Bill) Cox's decades of excellent service to the U.S. House of Representatives.

For more than 43 years, Bill has been one of this chamber's most dedicated public servants. He's served with distinction in many capacities throughout this institution and for the past 23 years has brought his excellent leadership and fastidious attention to detail to the Office of the Clerk. On June 5, 2025, Bill will retire from the Clerk's Office.

Bill was born in Fowlerville, Michigan. After graduating from high school in 1978, Bill moved to Washington, D.C. He made ends meet by working shifts at the Grand Central Station delicatessen in downtown Washington until he got his first Capitol Hill job. It was in the House's "folding room," where government publications were prepared for distribution.

His hard work quickly led to his next position as a Publications Assistant, Data Base Manager, and Systems Administrator for Representative Lee Hamilton. During his 12 years serving Representative Hamilton and the people of Indiana's Ninth District, Bill was instrumental in computerizing the office's operational systems. Under his leadership and guidance, the office graduated from a single shared printer, monitor and keyboard unit to a 25-user Unix mini-computer system. Having found his calling, Bill burned the midnight oil to attend night school at the University of Maryland University College. In 1990, he earned a bachelor's degree in information systems management.

Three years later, Bill transitioned to serve as an Administrative Assistant and then Administrative Director for the House Committee on International Relations (now the House Committee on Foreign Affairs). In 1998, Bill briefly left the Hill to become the Director of Operations for the Computer and Communications Industry Association.

In 2002, Bill returned to the House to accept the Administrative and Technical Support position in the Office of Official Reporters, a division within the Office of the Clerk. In this role, Bill has proven to be an expert in both the digital and physical systems that enable the House of Representatives to function every day. He's been the chief IT Specialist processing committee transcripts and the chief facilitator for office renovations. He has worked for five Clerks of the House: the Honorables Jeff Trandahl, Karen L. Haas, Lorraine C. Miller, Cheryl L. Johnson, and now, Kevin F. McCumber.

Always a family man, Bill is looking forward to his next chapter in life with his wife, Toby Long; his son, Charlie and Charlie's wife, Carolyn; and his two grandchildren, Simon and Henry. His family is counting down the days until they get to spend more time with him.

Mr. Speaker, on behalf of the U.S. House of Representatives, the people of Maryland's beautiful Eighth District and the country, I want to thank Bill Cox for his wonderful public service. After completing his Ph.D. in Higher Education from Syracuse University, Dave fulfilled his lifelong dream of becoming President of Lincoln College in Illinois, where he led the school through a period of growth and achievement. Even after Lincoln's closure during the pandemic, Dave's dedication to students and learning never wavered.

In retirement, Dave moved to Houston to be near his beloved grandchildren, Harrison and Ruby. He was affectionately known as "Papa," attending every game, concert, and school play, and building a new community of friends in Texas.

Dave's legacy is one of leadership, mentorship, kindness, and unwavering commitment to family and community. His favorite Christmas movie, It's a Wonderful Life, embodied the spirit with which he lived-showing that "no man is a failure who has friends."

Mr. BILIRAKIS. Mr. Speaker, I rise today to recognize the outstanding contributions that Fernando Serrano has made through his work with the Pasco County Human Services Team. The Pasco County Human Services Team has proven itself to be a comerstone of resilience, innovation, and unwavering commitment to the community. Amidst the devastating impacts of Hurricanes Helene and Milton, they emerged as an indispensable force, transforming challenges into triumphs and ensuring no resident was left behind. The team managed and helped coordinate efforts for shelters that housed 485 residents. When Hurricane Milton struck shortly thereafter, the team rose to even greater heights, coordinating shelters for 5,800 individuals and 1,315 animals-an extraordinary feat of operational precision and compassion. Despite personal hardships, including one case manager losing her home

while another lost her rental property, the team prioritized the welfare of the community, working tirelessly to ensure safety and stability for all. Post-storm, the team was responsible for helping shelter residents whose homes were no longer safe, find appropriate alternatives for housing. Their dedication shone through in rapid response efforts. In the days immediately following Hurricane Helene, 49 residents received critical assessments and essential resources. After Hurricane Milton, they worked with 225 displaced individuals who remained in shelters, demonstrating their unparalleled ability to adapt and respond under pressure. The team leveraged the Human Services Needs app to streamline disaster case management, supporting 1,351 residents. Their follow-up system, in partnership with other agencies, ensured personalized service for every individual. This innovative approach epitomized their ability to harness technology and partnerships for meaningful impact. Beyond immediate relief, the team worked with individuals and families who would require long-term recovery efforts. For approximately 150 permanently displaced residents, they implemented a housing eligibility process, with the intent of ensuring fair and transparent allocation of resources. By securing placements at facilities like Pasco Hope, the team supported individuals and families along a pathway to rebuild their lives. Between September 28 and October 18, 2024, the team managed an overwhelming volume of calls-1,194 through their direct line and another 1,214 through work phones. Yet every call was met with care, professionalism, and actionable solutions, reflecting the team's deep commitment to being a lifeline for the community. The Pasco County Human Services Team exemplifies what it means to serve with excellence, compassion, and innovation. Their remarkable achievements during Hurricanes Helene and Milton, coupled with their dedication to long-term recovery and cuttingedge approaches to disaster management. have left an indelible mark on Pasco County.

Mr. FLEISCHMANN. Mr. Speaker, I rise today in honor of women entrepreneurs and to recognize the impact of women-owned businesses in the Third District of Tennessee and our communities nationwide.

Like many communities across the United States, East Tennessee is home to many women- and family-owned businesses, critical local employers supporting generations of employees, and local charitable efforts, including our schools and youth sports teams.

Women-owned businesses are important drivers of our local economy, employing millions of Americans nationwide and accounting for trillions of dollars in revenue annually. Women-owned businesses also include businesses of all sizes and industries, including in the healthcare, professional services, retail, real estate, and construction industries.

Mr. Speaker, I am proud that one such business—McKee Foods Corporation—is located in my district in Collegedale, Tennessee. McKee Foods, better known as the makers of Little Debbie Snack Cakes, was founded by O.D. and Ruth McKee in Tennessee nearly 100 years ago and today is a fourth-generation family business employing thousands of employees nationwide.

In March, during Women's History Month, I had the pleasure of meeting with Debbie McKee-Fowler, Chairman of the Board for McKee Foods, and representatives from several women-owned and family businesses here in Washington. These women-owned businesses were on Capitol Hill as part of an event with Family Enterprise USA and members of the Congressional Family Business Caucus to share the stories of their businesses and educate Congress on challenges in starting and growing their businesses, including how government policies like the Death Tax prevent business owners from passing down their legacy to the next generation.
