As home of one of the largest Hmong American populations outside of Southeast Asia, I am very proud to have six Hmong American state legislators representing constituents in my district! In total, 9 lawmakers of Hmong descent represent legislative districts at the Minnesota State Capitol.

As we celebrate Asian Pacific Heritage Month this year, it is a time to pause and reflect on these significant and historic milestones. It is also a time to look to the future. I am grateful for the rich cultural diversity our Southeast Asian Diaspora communities have brought to our nation and to Minnesota's Fourth Congressional District over the last fifty years. I look forward to the continued growth, success, partnership and collaboration with our Southeast Asian neighbors.

During their residency in Thomasville, Elsa was a homemaker and gave birth to three children, a girl and two boys. In the 1960s the family moved back to Inman's hometown, Alachua, Florida, to open a fertilizer plant and farm one of the largest tobacco farms in the area. Elsa had been a bookkeeper before her children arrived and became the bookkeeper for the fertilizer plant they owned and operated in Alachua.

She has spent her remaining years here in Alachua after retiring from bookkeeping when the fertilizer plant was sold. All three of her children and their families live close by as well as seven grandchildren and great grandchildren. She is fondly known to her great grandchildren and great, great grandchildren as "GiGi."

Even though she is approaching 100 years loved, she is still dependent and lives on her own with children and grandchildren keeping her busy.

For nearly four decades, Dr. Treviño has cared for the most vulnerable in our community. As Medical Director of the Laredo Health Department, he expanded access to maternity care, public health clinics, and preventive services. He also held leadership roles at multiple hospitals, nursing facilities, and continues to serve as a trusted physician in the community.

His leadership during the COVID-I9 pandemic was especially critical. As Health Authority, Dr. Treviño launched a binational vaccination program with Nuevo Laredo and Colombia, Nuevo León—administering nearly 300,000 vaccines and significantly reducing hospitalizations and deaths on both sides of the border.

Elected Mayor in 2022, Dr. Treviño continues to serve with compassion and a deep belief in the betterment of our city.

Mr. YAKYM. Mr. Speaker, I rise today to commend the extraordinary bravery and self-less service demonstrated by Deputy Christopher Parish of the Pulaski County Sheriffs Office.

This past April, Deputy Parish responded to a vehicle fire near a residence in Winamac, Indiana. Upon arrival, he discovered that the fire had spread to the house, which was rapidly becoming engulfed in flames. Although initial reports indicated that all occupants had evacuated. Deputy Parish heard a voice from inside the burning home. Without hesitation, he broke a window using his flashlight, but dense smoke prevented the trapped individual from escaping. At this critical moment, volunteer firefighter Mike Anderson arrived on the scene. Together, Deputy Parish and Firefighter Anderson entered the smoke-filled room through the broken window and successfully rescued the individual, pulling him to safety just before the fire overtook the room.

The rescued individual received immediate medical attention and is currently in stable condition. Deputy Parish was treated for smoke inhalation and sustained minor cuts during the rescue.

Deputy Parish's actions exemplify the highest standards of public service and courage.

His quick thinking and fearless response undoubtedly saved a life that day. His heroism serves as an inspiration to us all and underscores the vital role of first responders in our committees

HONORING REVEREND CHAU JOSEPH NGUYEN FOR HIS CONTRIBUTIONS TO CENTRAL FLORIDA DURING ASIAN AMERICAN & PACIFIC ISLANDER HERITAGE MONTH

Mr. SOTO. Mr. Speaker, Reverend Chau Joseph Nguyen and his family came to the United States as refugees after the fall of Saigon, Vietnam, on April 30, 1975, and settled in Arlington, Texas. He earned his Bachelor of Arts in Sociology at Divine Word College Seminary in Epworth, Iowa, and completed his Master of Divinity at the University of St. Mary of the Lake in Mundelein, Illinois.

On December 2, 1989, he was ordained a Catholic priest for the Diocese of Orlando. Reverend Nguyen was first assigned to the Vietnamese Catholic Community at St. Charles Borromeo Church in Orlando, Florida In 2003, he became and remains the founding pastor of St. Philip Phan Van Minh Church, a national parish for Vietnamese American Catholics in Orlando. Being its leader, he has been organizing and actively involved with many faith celebrations and cultural activities for the Vietnamese American and Asian communities in Central Florida. Most notable are the parish's annual Lunar New Year festivals. which have been held for the last 32 years. Initially hosted at the church, they were later relocated to the Central Florida Fairgrounds due to their widespread and enthusiastic attendance. This event attracts over 10.000 people annually to celebrate the Lunar New Year and showcase Vietnamese culture and customs. The other notable achievement is the growth of the parish's Vietnamese Eucharistic Youth Movement chapter, whose national organization has been recognized by the USCCB in recent years.

In October 2019, Reverend Nguyen was elected the president of the Federation of Vietnamese Catholics in the United States, which consists of more than 1,000 priests, 700 religious men and women, 175 permanent deacons, and over 700,000 Vietnamese American Catholics. He was elected to a second term in 2024 with overwhelming support and ongoing active endeavors
