Building Safety Month is sponsored by the International Code Council and its partners to remind the public of the professionals who ensure buildings are safe, resilient, affordable, efficient, and livable.

The Code Council brings together local, state, and federal government stakeholders, as well as those from the private sector to develop model codes and standards that protect the occupants of the buildings in which we live, work, and play. Those standards are then implemented year-round by building safety officials, the fire services, architects, engineers, builders, and other skilled tradespeople to ensure the safe construction and maintenance of buildings.

Building Safety Month is an annual celebration to remind the public of the critical role of local code officials—who ensure the safe, sustainable, and affordable buildings essential to prosperity.

In late 2020, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) released its "Building Codes Saves" report, which found that implementing modern building codes could prevent \$600 billion in disaster-related spending by 2060. FEMA further confirmed a prior report by the National Institute of Building Sciences that found that adopting modern codes provides \$11 dollars in mitigation savings for every \$1 dollar invested.

As the Ranking Member of the Transportation and Infrastructure Committee—responsible for oversight and authorization of FEMA—I have heard repeated testimony from expert witnesses on the increase in both the frequency and severity of natural disasters. Building codes and standards are critical to protecting the public from these disasters, including wildfires, hurricanes, tornadoes, snow and ice storms, and earthquakes.

As Americans rebuild after disasters, we recognize and thank those who implement and enforce building codes for protecting lives, property, and businesses, and ultimately ensuring our communities are resilient to future events.

Mr. Speaker, please join me in thanking International Code Council Board President David Spencer—a fellow Washingtonian—as well as ICC's Chief Executive Officer John Belcik, the International Code Council leadership, and ICC's Members and staff as they recognize Building Safety Month 2025.

Furthermore, Gwen served as President of the League of Women Voters of Diablo Valley. In this role, she oversaw the "You Don't Need a Home to Vote" project, which worked to increase civic engagement from unhoused and low-income individuals and help them register to vote. Gwen's fierce commitment to advocacy and social justice was evident to all who knew her.

Ms. McCOLLUM. Mr. Chair, I will vote in support of H.R. 2483, the Substance Use-Disorder Prevention that Promotes Opioid Recovery and Treatment (SUPPORT) Reauthorization Act of 2025. This bill, which was first signed into law in 2018, aims to fight the opioid epidemic in our country by improving access to treatment, increasing recovery opportunities, and strengthening prevention initiatives. The opioid epidemic has devastated communities and torn apart families across our country, and H.R. 2483 is the latest in a long line of bipartisan efforts to address this problem and ensure Americans get the help they need without stigma or other barriers.

However, we must acknowledge that this legislation came to the House Floor at a time when the Trump administration is systematically dismantling our Nation's mental health and substance use treatment programs. In the last several months, the administration has announced plans to eliminate the Substance

Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) as an independent division of the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), fired hundreds of SAMHSA employees, rescinded over \$1 billion in state funding to treat mental health and substance use disorders, and proposed eliminating some of the very programs that are authorized in the SUPPORT Act. House Republicans have also just voted to make the largest health care cut in history in their so-called "Big Beautiful Bill", taking away Medicaid from millions of Americans.

While I will vote in favor of the SUPPORT Act, my concern is that this Republican led Congress has authorized these programs with no one left at the agencies to see them through.

More recently, Jake Larson earned the nickname of "Papa Jake" from his online presence as a storyteller on TikTok and Instagram. Online, Papa Jake shares details of his time in the U.S. Army, teaching audiences about our nation's history and reminding us of the sacrifices that have been made to protect our freedom. Jake has amassed over 1.3 million followers on social media and his stories have touched countless lives.

As we commemorate the 81st anniversary of D-Day, I'd like to extend my gratitude and respect to Jake for his extraordinary bravery. Please join me in recognizing "Papa" Jake Larson for his dedicated service to our country.

Born on December 24, 1946, in Oneida, Wisconsin, to Leslie and Eva Schuyler Danforth, Jerry devoted his life to service—first to his country, and then to his people. He served honorably in the United States Navy for over three decades, retiring in 1994 with the esteemed rank of Force Master Chief, Naval Surface Force, U.S. Atlantic Fleet. He was a veteran of both the Vietnam War and Desert Storm, embodying courage, commitment, and leadership throughout his military career.

Jerry brought the same conviction and discipline to his leadership within the Oneida Nation. He was elected Chairman of the Oneida Business Committee in 1995 and again in 2005, where he advocated tirelessly for policies that advanced Indian gaming, economic development, healthcare, higher education, and the preservation of the Oneida language. His long-term vision was to build a strong sustainable economy not solely reliant on gaming and to enhance communication between tribal governance and the General Tribal Council.

A public servant in every sense, Jerry also served his Nation as a judge on the Oneida Judiciary, where his wisdom, fairness, and devotion to justice left a lasting impact.

Beyond his public service, Jerry was a man of deep personal warmth and abiding family values. He is survived by his loving wife, Pamela Johns Danforth, and their children Paul Jameson (Virna), Steve Jameson (Cathy),

Tanya Wood (Steve), Gerald Danforth Jr. (Chitra), Patrick Danforth, and stepson Keith Bimosae Johns Herman. He is also survived by his brother James Danforth (Joanne), sister Joanne Smith (late Bruce Smith), and many grandchildren who brought him great joy. He was preceded in death by his son Thomas Danforth and his parents.

Jerry lived a life rich with passion and purpose—he loved fishing, golf, entertaining with his prized green egg grill, red wine, chocolate, and pie. He cherished winters spent in South Padre Island with Pam and was happiest when surrounded by family and friends.

Mr. Speaker, Gerald "Jerry" Danforth's life was defined by service, leadership, and love. He exemplified the highest ideals of his people and of this Nation. His legacy will endure in the lives he touched, the institutions he shaped, and the Nation he served so faithfully.
